

of Portland, Or., I give and bequeath the sum of \$5,000 in trust, to be securely invested, and the net income therefrom arising expended under the direction of the trustees and pastor of said church.

Tenth. To the Home, a charitable society, incorporated under the laws of the state of Oregon July 15, 1871, located at the city of Portland, I give and bequeath the sum of \$5,000, to be set aside by said society as a permanent and irreducible maintenance fund, the income therefrom arising to be used only to meet current expenses of said society.

Eleventh. To the Boys' and Girls' Aid society of Portland, Oregon, I give and bequeath the sum of \$1,000.

Twelfth.—To the Baby home and Patton home, both of Portland, Oregon, and to the Homeopathic Hospital and Dispensary, also of Portland, Oregon, I give and bequeath each and severally the sum of \$1,000.

Thirteenth. To the Portland Free Kindergarten I give and bequeath the sum of \$2,000.

Public Library \$10,000.
 Fourteenth. To the Portland Library association I give and bequeath the sum of \$10,000, to be and become a part of the book fund of said association. I also give and bequeath to said Portland Library association all my books, excepting only the works of Hubert H. Bancroft.

Fifteenth. To the city board of charities of Portland, Oregon. I give and bequeath the sum of \$2,000, to be by said board securely invested as a permanent maintenance fund.

Sixteenth. To the Oregon Humane society I give and bequeath the sum of \$1,000.

Seventeenth. To the People's Free Reading and Library association of Portland, Oregon. I give and bequeath the sum of \$1,000.

Eighteenth. To the Refuge Home for Women of Portland, Oregon, I give and bequeath the sum of \$1,000.

Nineteenth. To the Portland Women's union of Portland, Oregon, I give and bequeath the sum of \$1,000.

Twentieth. To the Good Samaritan hospital of Portland, Oregon, I give and bequeath the sum of \$1,000, for the purpose of endowing a free bed in said hospital, to which a priority of nominating an occupant shall be given to the pastor of the First Unitarian society of Portland, Oregon.

Twenty-second. To the Portland Art association (Incorporated December 13, 1892), of Portland, Oregon, I give and bequeath all my oil paintings, statuary and bronzes of every description, except my "Sheep at Rest," hereinafter disposed of.

Old Folks Remembered.
Twenty-third. To the Old Ladies Home of Portland, Oregon, a corporation under the laws of Oregon, I give, devise and bequeath all of block 124 of the city of Portland, Multnomah County, state of Oregon, and the improvements thereon. Provided, that should I at any time sell or otherwise dispose of said real property in this item described and devised, in lieu thereof, and not otherwise, I give and bequeath to it, the said Old Ladies' Home of Portland, Oregon, the sum of \$40,000.

Twenty-fourth. To my nephew, Martin Winch, of Portland, Oregon, a large oil painting "Sheep at Rest," by Morris, and \$100.00 in money, to be taken, used, held and enjoyed by him in his own right absolutely. I do further give, devise and bequeath unto my said nephew Martin Winch, his wife and children forever, the right of burial, if he, she or they shall desire the same, in my said cemetery, in that place where the body of my departed husband is buried, and where I direct that my own body shall be interred at my decease. I do further give, devise and bequeath at the date of my decease I give and bequeath in equal proportions all my jewels, jewelry, paraphernalia, household furniture and ornaments, except my large magic lantern and the pictures for the same, which I give and bequeath to the Reed Institute, hereinafter referred to, and I do give, devise and bequeath to my said nephews and nieces, share and share alike, to be distributed and divided between them in such manner as will insure a just and equitable division thereof, or as I shall be agreed upon by them.

Twenty-fifth. To Amos Newton Reed and Georgiana Reed, mentioned in items second and third of this my will, I give and bequeath all my sterling silverware, to be received by them in equal proportions, and to be divided between them in such manner as they shall themselves determine.

Twenty-sixth. All and singular the foregoing bequests of money shall be and hereby become payable in the order in which such bequests are made herein, but only when and as my said estate is in condition to pay the same, without sacrifice to any interest therewith connected.

Founders School. Twenty-seventh. All the rest, residue and remainder of my estate and property of every kind, real, personal and mixed, whatever its character, and wherever situated, the same to be sold, conveyed and bequeath to my friends, Rev. T. L. Elliot, C. B. Bellinger, C. A. Dolph, William E. Robertson and Martin Winch, all of Portland, Or., and their successors, in trust, to use the same and the income therefrom arising in the founding, equipping, establishing and maintaining of a city of Portland, Or., of an institution of learning having for its object the increase and diffusion of practical knowledge among the citizens of said city of Portland, and for the promotion

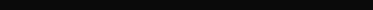
For literature, science and the fine arts, the said trust shall be named and known as the Reed Institute in memory of my departed husband, and in honor of my said wife, Edna M. Reed. In it shall be established such departments of learning, and such galleries of art, natural and technical history, and museums, for maintaining and increasing the same, and such endowments and appointments as such trustees or their successors in the trust hereby created may from time to time prescribe. Such instruction shall be given therein by competent teachers and lecturers in literature, science, music, the arts and the fine arts, and such other things for the people, and especially for the deserving young men and young women earning their livelihood, as said trustees and their successors

Moderate fees for admission or tuition may in the discretion of said trustees be charged when necessary, or by said trustees deemed advisable.

Building to Cost \$150,000.
Property may be purchased and such suitable buildings and appurtenances erected and constructed as in the judgment of said trustees may be deemed necessary. Provided, however, that not more than \$150,000 of the principal of this bequest shall be used for such purposes.

It is my desire and intention that the institution so founded and established shall be the means of general enlightenment, intellectual and moral culture, the cultivation and development of fine arts, manual training and education for the people.

And I hereby give and grant said trustees full power and authority to make such rules and regulations for the government of said institute and mission of applicants thereto not inconsistent with the purposes therein herein expressed, as to them or a majority of them shall seem proper, with power in their discretion to incorporate said institute in the name herein designated under the laws of the state of Oregon, providing for the incorporation of religious, benevolent and charitable societies, if and whenever the incorporation thereof shall tend to the better perpetuation thereof, and the promotion of a objects for which this bequest is made. Provided, that no compensation shall be demanded or received by any trustee hereunder, nor by any officer of said corporation.

Mr. Winch Executor.

Lastly, I hereby nominate and appoint my nephew, Martin Winch, of Portland, Oregon, executor of this my will; and I hereby direct that no bond or other security be required of Martin Winch executor, and as far as I may can have the power so to do, I hereby give and grant unto said executor full power and authority to sell and convey any portion of the real property, both real and personal, belonging to my estate, upon such terms and conditions, and for such prices as to him shall seem best, where in his judgment such sale is necessary for the purposes of carrying out the provisions of this my will.
