

AGED MOTHER DIES OF BROKEN HEART

WHILE HER SON YERRED FROM BEHIND PRISON BARS MRS. ELIZABETH MARTIN LAY DYING OF A BROKEN HEART—COULD NOT WITHSTAND SHOCK OF ARREST.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Corvallis, Or., June 1.—While Ed Martin peered from behind the bars of the city jail his aged mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Martin, lay dying of a broken heart at her home in this city.

The shock occasioned by her son's arrest broke the mother's heart and her death followed yesterday afternoon. Viewed from either side the case is one of the most pathetic nature. Mrs. Martin was a native of Michigan and has been a widow for 40 years, and during many of these years she lavished such love as only a mother can on her unfortunate son.

Martin has been subject all his life to epileptic fits, and to this is ascribed his mental unsoundness, which resulted in his being at one time an inmate of the insane asylum. He was released from that institution because he did not appear to be insane to a degree that rendered him a dangerous person to the community at large, but with the recurrence of frequent spells of epileptic fits, his mind has become gradually weaker, and produced a state of viciousness and a seeming inability to control his evil tendencies.

Through all the mother steadfastly clung to her unfortunate son, whose conduct of yesterday was more than the tottering frame of the aged woman could stand.

The cause of his arrest lay in the fact that he interfered with the work of some laborers who were dressing down telephone poles for use on Fourth street. When ordered by the workmen to leave the place and get out of their way, Martin refused, and he likewise refused to move on when ordered by Chief of Police Lane and his arrest followed. The news, when told the aged mother, caused her immediate prostration.

Ed Martin is still in the county jail, his preliminary hearing having been delayed. He is not aware that his mother is dead, nor even that she has been ill since his arrest. There is no doubt but that he will be taken to the asylum immediately after the funeral of Mrs. Martin. Martin has often been heard to remark that he only desired to live while his mother was living, and that he was ready to die as soon as she was gone.

Three sons of the dead woman are in California, and two daughters, Mrs. J. T. Tunison of Wasco county, and Mrs. A. C. Tunison of Benton, were with Mrs. Martin when death came. She was 75 years of age.

Lewis' father was the leading spirit.

WILLIAMS TO BE HANGED IN JULY

JUDGE BRADSHAW PRONOUNCES SENTENCE ON THE CONVICTED MURDERER, WHO PRESERVES AN UNCHANGED AND QUIET DE-MEANOR—JULY 22 DATE NAMED.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
The Dalles, Or., June 1.—Norman Williams has been sentenced.

At 1:30 o'clock this afternoon he was brought into the courtroom between two deputy sheriffs.

Judge Bradshaw, after addressing the defendant, said: "Have you anything to say why sentence should not be pronounced upon you?"

"Williams said without a quiver or change in expression, 'Your honor, I have not.'"

The judge then said, "Stand up." Williams sprang quickly to his feet with his head erect and eyes cast directly at the judge, and listened very attentively while the judge reviewed the important part of the evidence, rehearsing from the time the prisoner left Hood River, on March 8, 1901, on a dark and rainy night with the Neelitt women, returned next morning without them and concluded by saying: "From your own statements you dug the grave where the hair was found which was proved to be that of Mrs. Neelitt."

"You have made a fair and impartial trial and have been proved beyond any reasonable doubt guilty and no one on earth but yourself knows where those bodies are."

All this time the defendant stood, never taking his eyes from the judge and keeping his lips tightly closed with the same sickly smile as during the trial.

Judge Bradshaw then pronounced the sentence: "You are to hang by the neck until dead, in the county jailyard, on July 22, 1904."

The courtroom was crowded with standing women and men. Attorney McGinn waived the right for a new trial and filed a notice of appeal.

"QUEEN ESTHER" IS ARTISTIC PLAY

"Queen Esther," the sacred opera by William Bradbury, will be given at the Marquam this evening and tomorrow, under the direction of Mr. Robinson of Chicago. The chorus has been rehearsing daily for the past three weeks and Mr. Robinson is satisfied with the result. He speaks highly of their work as compared with other choruses he has trained. There are 12 voices in the chorus and 14 carry solo parts. These are chosen from some of the best singers of Portland. In addition to these there are the special parts of four queen's maids, two queen's pages, two king's pages, four king's guards and seven king's maids. Miss Eva Benson is the accompanist. The full theatre orchestra has been engaged.

"Queen Esther" has been produced probably more times than any other sacred cantata, but it does not outgrow its popularity. The music is inspiring, the story dramatic, the costumes elaborate, the stage setting beautiful. There is much to please the artistic eye as well as the musical ear. It is a production of effects. A satisfactory climax is reached in the fifth act in the denunciation of Haman, but as good effects are produced in various stages of the action, interest is kept up throughout the play.
