

HERYFORD DENIES WOMAN'S STORY

DECLARES HE WOULD HAVE MARRIED MISS MCCARTHY HAD SHE NOT TESTIFIED FALSELY AGAINST HIM—RETRIBUTION TESTIMONY FROM DEFENDANT'S WITNESS.

It was James D. Heryford's innuendo in the federal court this morning when he was placed on the stand to tell his side of the romance which Birdie McCarthy, the prim-looking schoolteacher, says resulted in her seduction. Heryford denied practically all the statements which had been made by the woman, but admitted that he had asked her to marry him.

He was alone with her only four times, he said. He drove over to the school and took her home when it was raining, but he denounced with indignation the charge that he had sustained any improper relations with the woman.

Denies Seduction Story.

"I would have married her at any time," he said, "until she got on this witness stand and said that I seduced her. Then it was all off. I wouldn't marry no woman who says such things about me."

Heryford was not attentive to his grammar in the course of his testimony, but was extremely intense. He had kissed the woman, he said, but further than that he had never tried to go. He emphatically denied her statement that he had crept into her room and refused to leave.

Among other things he also said that his wealth was greatly exaggerated. His property was encumbered with mortgages, he said, and he doubted if he could realize as much as \$20,000 if he were to convert his holdings into cash. A verdict of \$22,500 against him was returned by the jury in the former trial. The complaint alleges that he is worth something like \$100,000.

Startling Testimony Introduced. Mrs. Annie Stripling, who lives at the Heryford ranch, created a sensation in her testimony this morning by announcing some startling facts which failed to develop in the previous trial. She said that Miss McCarthy had asked her once how much money a woman could get by means of a breach of promise suit.

"She told me that a woman ought to get quite a stake by suing Jim Heryford," she said. "I told her about a woman once suing Dr. Dailey of our town for breach of promise, but he must have paid her to keep still, for it never came into court."

Mrs. Stripling was somewhat confused on cross-examination, and had forgotten just how the alleged conversation was begun. She was sure, however, that it had taken place, and she was also sure that Heryford had never gone to Miss McCarthy's room. She could hear everything that transpired in the room, she said, and a man even with bare feet could not go into that room without being heard by her.

Judge Thomas O'Day, in behalf of the plaintiff, had apparent doubts about the authenticity of the alleged interview, and his examination caused a demonstration on the part of a number of spectators. Judge Bellinger declared that a repetition of the laughter would result in an order to have the courtroom cleared.

BOXES GO ON OCTOBER 1

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building, and shall not maintain therein or connect therewith any alcove, booth or box, or shall have or maintain any private or separate entrance for any particular class of customers; or any words or sign upon any entrance signifying that such entrance is for ladies or families or for any particular class of persons or is a private entrance to such bar room, saloon or restaurant or to any other apartment used in connection therewith, provided that nothing herein contained shall prohibit the serving of such liquor to guests in a hotel having a valid license to sell the same.

Sec. 2.—It shall be unlawful for any person to conduct, carry on, open, or maintain any restaurant, bar room, or saloon within the city of Portland that has connected therewith any box, booth, stall, or any private room. Provided, however, that this section shall not apply to a private room having a floor space of more than 140 square feet, nor shall it apply to restaurants in which spirituous, malt, or fermented liquors or wines are not sold, and in which such box, booth, stall, or private room is so constructed as to be entirely open upon the side facing any hall, hallway, passageway, or room, and the sides thereof do not exceed seven feet in height.

Sec. 3.—Any person convicted of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed \$100, or by imprisonment not to exceed 30 days, and for every second or subsequent violation of this ordinance the penalty shall be doubled.

"I consider this ordinance to be a great step toward uprooting evil in this city," said Mayor Williams, after signing the ordinance. "In my opinion, one of the most important features of the ordinance is the doing away with the side and private entrances to saloons. No man will care to take a woman through an open barroom, and by the abolition of the private entrances and boxes the secret meetings of men and women will be a thing of the past."

"The doing away with these boxes will also put a stop to young girls entering saloons and hiding from all persons excepting those whom they wish to see. When the saloon boxes are removed there will be far less opportunities for young girls to be led astray than there are at the present time."

Mr. Albee expressed himself as being more than pleased with the prompt approval of his ordinance by Mayor Williams. "This is a red-letter day in Portland's history," said Mr. Albee, after he had witnessed the signing of the ordinance by Mayor Williams. "I am sure that as time goes on the people of this city will see more and more the good of this bill. mer K. Wilder. Following these statements of Reed comes a strong allegation that when he refused to sign a contract and stipulation for dismissal by paying Cake & Cake, as attorneys for Wilder, \$3,500, then, in violation of their duty to their client, they refused to carry out the agreement unless he would "bribe" them to do so by paying them the sum of \$250 under the illegal and fraudulent pretense that they had earned the same and were entitled to same as attorney's fees for the receiver, B. D. Sigler.

Attempted Extortion Alleged.

"As that attempt at extortion failed," says the affidavit, "in pursuance of said policy, Cake & Cake have since done and are doing everything in their power to prolong this unnecessary receivership, and to make same as expensive as possible to both plaintiff and defendant, and have caused said property to depreciate in value and to be wasted, so that it will cost the parties to this suit infinitely more to refuse to be robbed by Cake & Cake than it would have cost to have paid them \$250 blood money and said nothing. In pursuance of this policy of Cake & Cake to extort or ruin, this petition for \$250 as attorneys' fees for receiver is filed, and they are now attempting to get \$125 from this defendant in violation of law and their own contract."

It is further charged that the only services performed by the law firm were in getting Receiver Sigler to enter into a conspiracy to be false to his duty as receiver in order to defraud Reed.

In conclusion, Wilder declares that he wants the final decree of Judge Frazer carried out, the estate distributed, the expensive receivership ended, and the enormous waste and squandering of the property of the Hainier Mill & Lumber company and the Gray's River Logging company stopped. In order to do this he requests that the court require the parties to the suit and the lawyers to obey his order.
