ALBANY DEFEATS
ROSEBURG PLAYERS

IN A SPLENDIDLY PLAYED CONTEST TAYLOR HOLDS THE HOME DOWN TO TWO RUNS, AND FANS RIGHT BATTERS—SUSS CRACKS OUT A HOME RUN.

The Albany team held a regular sweat-fest over the curves administered by Pitcher McDonald of the Roseburg team, and when the final man was retired by Pitcher Stats Taylor the score showed 13 tallies for Albany to only 2 for the Shamrocks.

McDonald was found for everything in the base-hit line, from a dinky scratch single to a beautiful home run over the high right-field fence. On the other hand, "Stats" Taylor demonstrated that he was a pitcher of the gilt-edge variety, and held the Roseburg sluggers safe at all stages, and besides worked his strike-out variety of twists often enough to bench eight of his opponents.

McDonald was found in bunches, and materially helped the scoring along by making three errors. His support was also guilty of some few misplays, but only a few of them were costly.

These so-called "rough league" teams contain some first-class ball players, several of whom are fit for faster company. Suss is one of these boys. Besides being a clever fielder he is an excellent batter and furnished the fans who witnessed yesterday's game with a sample of what he can do in the hitting line by lining out four hits, one of which was a homer over the elevated right-field fence. His homer came in the eighth when four runs were in and two were on bases, which brought the total up to seven tallies for the inning.

Billy Morrow, the manager of the Roseburg team, who relieved Bredemeier when the latter had a nail knocked off, demonstrated his ability as a player, and should be in the faster company.

Teelie Raymond, Sullivan, Harvey Newell, and Nadler are worthy of special mention.

This afternoon the same teams play again, and Reed and Morrow will be in the points for Roseburg; Howard and Suss will be the battery for Albany.

Umpire Derrick, who, by the way, is one of the most capable officials who have appeared here for some time, will again be the "diamond aristocrat." The score:

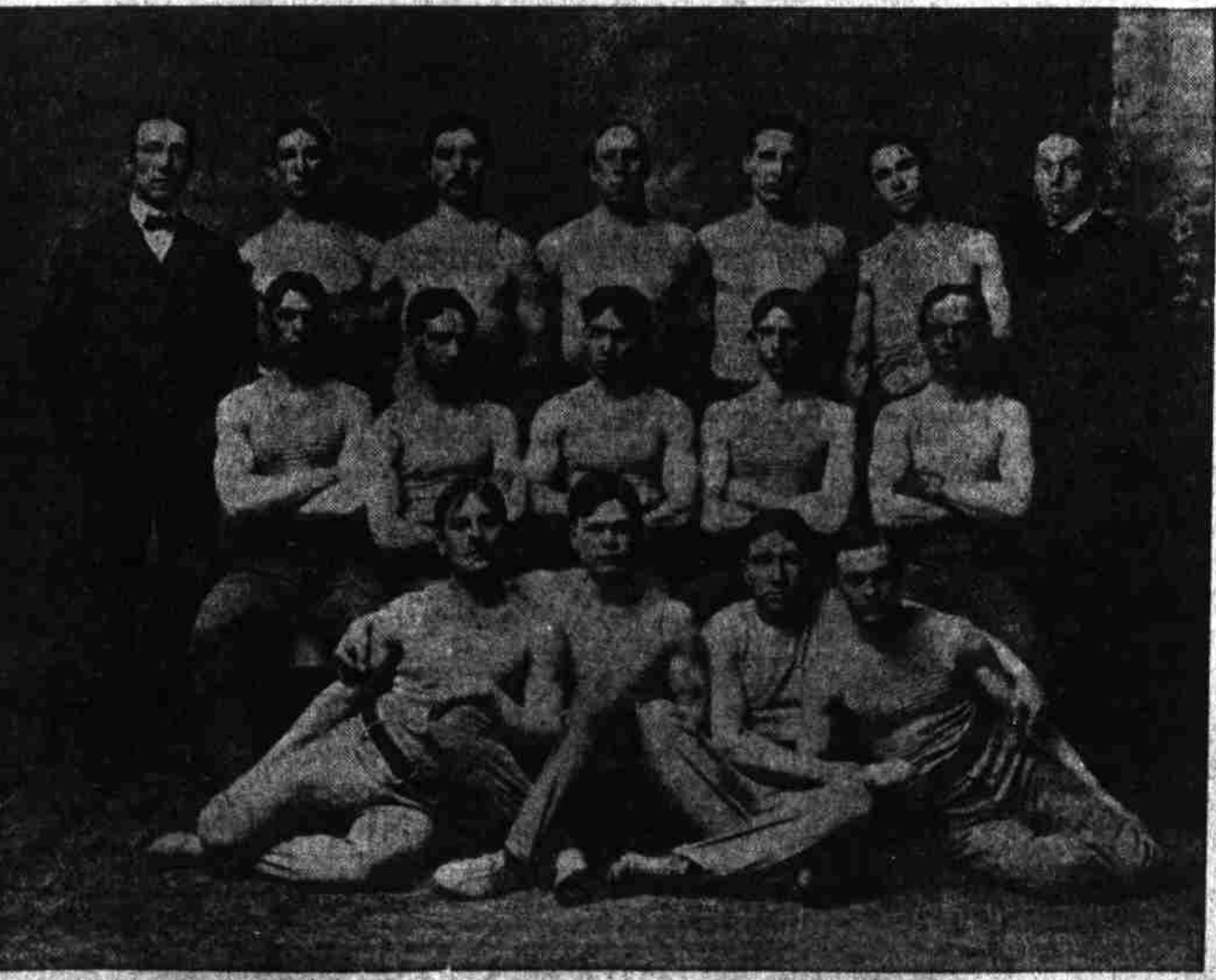

HOW LONG WILL
JEFF BE CHAMPION

REPORT NAUGHTON INTERVIEWS
JEFFRIES UPON THE LENGTH OF
TIME HE WILL RETAIN HIS
LAURELS—DICK ADAMS PLACES
THE LIMIT AT FIVE YEARS.

Harbin Springs, Cal., June 4.—Supposing that Big Jim Jeffries disposes of Jack Munroe as easily as he has defeated his other opponents, how long is Jeffries likely to retain the championship? Will he retire undefeated? Has he shown any signs of waning physical force up to date?

These questions and others of a like character are being asked, frequently now-a-days, especially here at Harbin Springs, where the champion is training under the eyes of a crowd of summer guests for his affairs with Munroe. Dick Adams, the friend of Jeff's boyhood, and the butt of many of Jeff's practical jokes, believes Jeffries will remain cock of the walk for the next five years, providing he stints himself in the use of stimulating fluids.

Adams does not mean to infer that Jeff will be a wreck by any means, five years from now. His argument is that Jeff, being such a ponderous fighting machine, will feel the ravages of wear and tear in the same proportion that an extra big automobile or railway locomotive does and that once his speed and stamina begin to forsake him his decline from championship form will be quite rapid. Dick is quite sure that Jeff will be a great, strong, hearty fellow five years hence, but that he will not be the king of the ring.

Occasionally references to Ruhlman and Sharkey are heard. These two and Jeff blossomed out about the same time, and as Sharkey and Ruhlman have practically reached the "all-in" stage, there are numbers who believe that Jeff must also begin to deteriorate presently.

Does Not Feel Old.

On this point Jeff, himself, says: "I can't say that I've felt the old man creeping on me. I am one of those who believe that much training has more to do with breaking a fighter down than all the dissipation and fast living put together. It not only saps a man's strength in time but it shortens his life, in my opinion. I don't know, of course, when I am going to turn up my toes but I am convinced I would live to

be 25 years older if I had never taken to pugilism.

"I must say, too, that for the past few years I arranged things so that my training is not as irksome as the work done by other fighters. I camp up here in the mountains where living is a pleasure and where I am interested every moment of my stay. I don't diet and I have turned down the weighing machine. I vary my road work with mountain climbing, and when I have a gun in the hollow of my arm the miles slip under me without being noticed. It is just a bit wearisome sometimes to get into my working flannels and hear the creaking of the wall machines and the punching bag, but when I think of the way other fighters in training are placed and the dreary old program of work they have to go through day by day, I think myself the luckiest man on earth.

"As to Sharkey and Ruhlman, I am not prepared to say why they slowed, and I remained apparently as good as ever. Men are different you know. I candidly believe that I am getting stronger all the time—that I am also getting faster and that I can give more and stand more. I suppose my system of training has a lot to do with it."

"All of the men who have to do with Jeffries speak in the same way about the big fellow.

Jack Jeffries and Joe Kennedy say his strength has increased to such an extent that it is a hardship to rub shoulders with him and the looks on their faces while they are talking at once sweep away any doubts one may entertain as to their sincerity. Then again, a visitor has only to notice the effect of the battering ram rushes of the champion when he is at work with his partners to become convinced. Men who are helping to condition Jeff for wages have anything but a soft snap.

As for Jeff himself he looks sheepish whenever he forgets himself and allows his latent fighting force to flare up, as it were. He is full of apologies to his men and then again he will sulk and complain that he doesn't see what good it is working with other fellows when a man has to be under a pull all the time.

"It was feeling this way about it, that made him install a great unwieldy sack of sand as part of his training paraphernalia. He wanted to experience the sensation of using all the power nature has endowed him with upon something and the pleased manner in which he grins while at work with the swaying monstrosity proves plainly that the sandbag is filling a long felt want. The heavy object may be as some one said, a reflection upon Jeff's training partners, but one glance at Joe and Jack as they stand with folded arms near the gymnasium wall will tell that they are not sensitive about it in the least.

Billy Delaney is about the only one of

Jeff's outfit who does not wax enthusiastic over the big fellow's strength and smiting power. At that, in probability, Delaney is the greatest admirer Jeff has.

Delaney believes that no matter how talented and how famous a man may be, he cannot retain his hold on his exalted position unless he adheres to certain fixed rules. For a pugilist champion there is nothing like systematic exercise, according to the Delaney theory. Billy was brought to the verge of distraction in the early part of the present campaign by Jeff's easy-going methods. Others were praising the champion and telling him what a wonder he is, while Delaney's warning, "Work, work, work," was as monotonous as the creak of the frogs in the marshes.

"I am fit to fight at a minute's notice," said Jeffries in one of his oft-recurring arguments with Mentor Delaney. "Just put in one good day in the gymnasium and let me judge for myself," said doubtful Delaney.

This was a week ago, and Jeff said "All right." He got through a forenoon's exercises in fair shape, but when he recommenced in the afternoon everything seemed to go wrong. The punching bag rope was too short and the swivel or something needed greasing. Working with faulty apparatus affected Jeff's temper and he finally quit his job.

He had a talk with Delaney afterwards, and the man who used to handle Jim Corbett said:

"It wasn't the punching bag. You are short of work and you blew up. That's all there is to it."

Since then Jeff has been as good as gold. He works all day and sprints in the twilight. The change in him was so marked that Delaney felt safe in going to town to attend to some business in the city with the big fighter.
