

OLD RESIDENT SUDDENLY DIES

Oregon City, June 6.—John Henry Schulier, an old resident of this county, who has had partial paralysis for several months, died suddenly this morning. He leaves a wife and several grown children.

Local Option Rally.
In the Baptist church last night there was a meeting in the interests of local option that was attended by the supporters of the measure from all the churches in the city. The speakers of the evening were Gilbert Bell, H. E. Cross and W. R. U'ren. Mr. U'ren made a good argument for the support of the measure at the polls today, and was ably seconded in his remarks by H. E. Cross, who made a plea for the majority rule.

Woodmen Memorial.
The Woodmen of the World and the annex, Sola Circle, held their Memorial day exercises in their hall yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock and at 5 o'clock unveiled the monument to the late G. W. Grace at the cemetery. The Oregon City band escorted the long line of Woodmen and they were followed by members of the circle in caresses. The services were very impressive and well attended.

Grange Picnic.
Saturday afternoon the four granges, Danawac, Mt. Hood, Clackamas and Clackamas met at Clackamas in the J. O. O. F. grove and held one of the most successful picnics in the history of grange entertainments of that kind in this city. It was attended by the members of the granges and they brought their wives and children, and the occasion was happily spent. Rev. A. Leroy was the principal speaker and spoke of the exhibit of the granges at the St. Louis and Lewis and Clark fairs. There was a good program rendered which consisted of songs and other musical numbers.

Mrs. Meyer in Hospital.
Mrs. Fred Meyer, wife of F. J. Meyer, cashier of the Commercial bank, was taken suddenly ill with appendicitis Saturday night and was sent to the hospital in Portland for an operation. Dr. J. M. Lowe of Oregon City accompanied her to Portland and together with Dr. William Jones of Portland a successful operation was performed, and at the last report Mrs. Meyer is recovering rapidly.

Robert Leslie Seriously Ill.
Robert Leslie, aged about 60, was taken ill on the street yesterday and fell before aid could reach him. He has been suffering from Bright's disease for some time and his attack yesterday was caused by that ailment. Dr. J. W. Powell attended him and reported that he was better this morning, but was in a critical condition.

Pioneer Preacher Dead.
The body of the late Rev. George W. Roork, who died at his home in Lodi, was interred yesterday afternoon in Lee Mission cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. T. L. Jones of Amity. Rev. George W. Roork was born in Michigan county, Tennessee, February 15, 1830, and came to Oregon in 1854, crossing the plains with an ox team. The following year he joined the Methodist conference at Oregon City, and began preaching, which he followed until placed on the superannuated list in 1892. He was one of the pioneer circuit riders who did so much for the development of the country and has filled some of the most important positions in the church. He was prominently identified with the growth of the state.

CONFERENCE AT GEARHART CLOSES

Gearhart, Or., June 6.—The closing exercises of the Pacific Northwest Student conference Saturday evening "The Legal Profession as an Opportunity for Christian Service" was the subject of an excellent address by the Rev. J. M. Little of Chicago, who framed the local option bill, Attorney Bronaugh of Portland.

Dr. Little of Chicago, on his return from the Methodist Episcopal general conference at Los Angeles, Cal., gave a scholarly discourse on "Why Do I Accept Jesus?"

Secretaries Hill and Rhodes addressed the evening life-work meeting. The subject was "Hindrances and Helps in Choice of Life Work."

The afternoon was perfect, and every moment was utilized. Baseball, bowling, wrestling, croquet, track and novelty events, swimming and surf bathing occupied the time. The baseball championship was won by Oregon with heavy scores. In fact, Oregon distinguished herself in almost every leading event of the day.

Sunday the three regular Bible classes met as usual at 9 o'clock. At 10 o'clock the association conference held its final meeting, and at 11 o'clock Dr. Little of Chicago preached. At the evening life-work meeting a number of student volunteers for foreign missionary service were held as usual. At 8 o'clock in the evening Dr. Little made the final address of the conference. The delegates left for Portland on an early train in order to be there as many as are Oregonians, to cast their votes for local option.

The conference has been a grand success from start to finish. Surely, were the results to be no greater than what is now evident, each delegate would feel himself thoroughly repaid for his coming.

FILE ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

NEW COMPANY ORGANIZED WITH
HEADQUARTERS IN PORTLAND
OBJECT IS TO REVOLUTIONIZE
DRESSMAKING—ATTORNEY-GEN-
ERAL RENDERED OPINION.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Salem, June 6.—Articles of incorporation have been filed in the office of the secretary of state by M. Shogren, A. Shogren and W. F. Fieckner of a company with capital stock of \$10,000. The object of the corporation is to conduct a general dressmaking business and purchase all material, including laces, ornaments and trimmings necessary to conduct the business. The promoters of the scheme propose to open headquarters in Portland and to revolutionize the dressmaking business of that city.

Rendered an Opinion.
Attorney-General A. M. Crawford has rendered an opinion which is of importance to school teachers and school boards throughout the state, and especially to normal schools. He decided that no person could teach school for any length of time, and draw money, who has not passed the regular teachers' examination given by the state. No person holding a certificate can provide a substitute for any length of time who has not a certificate, as such certificate can neither directly nor indirectly be made to legalize another teacher's service.

This legal question is in reply to a question propounded by N. Z. Doster of Ashland, and addressed to Governor Chamberlain, who is a member of the board of regents of the Ashland Normal school. He asked whether a majority of the legal voters of the district could authorize the school board to contract with the Normal school for students to teach the children of the district, even though such students may not have passed the teachers' examination. In the opinion of the attorney-general such power is vested in the legislature, and not in the voters, and hence no school money can be drawn in any case except by a licensed teacher.

Trainsmen's Excursion.
Several thousand people were in Salem yesterday to attend the trainsmen's picnic at the state fair grounds, six special trains bearing the people from every part of the valley. The crowds were orderly and the day passed off without accident or mishap to mar the pleasures of the excursionists. The afternoon was spent at the fair grounds, where bicycle and foot races and trick riding, with one automobile race, offered amusement and diversion.

Fingers Shot Off.
W. B. Duncan, a prominent farmer of Spring Valley, was yesterday taken to the Salem hospital and the fingers of his right hand amputated, as the result of having received a load of buckshot from a gopher gun while attempting to set it on Saturday evening. The hand was badly mangled and two fingers entirely shot off.

**MAN LIVES WITH
SKULL BLOWN OFF**

**CHARLES JONES, DESPONDENT
FROM ILL HEALTH, ATTEMPTS
TO SUICIDE BY SHOOTING HIM-
SELF THROUGH HEAD—MRS.
KURTZ INJURED IN RUNAWAY.**

The Dalles, Or., June 6.—Although the top of his skull was blown off by a charge of shot fired by himself with suicidal intent Saturday evening, Charles Jones is today living and may recover. He is at the Riley sanitarium in this city where he attracts the attention of his attendants by his remarkable vitality.

He had been cutting wood on the Hudson ranch about four miles from Mosier, but owing to ill health had become despondent. Some boys who were hunting came their gun down near by. Jones picked the weapon up and placing the muzzle against his forehead just above the left eye discharged the gun, the contents tearing away the top of his head, leaving the brain exposed.

He was brought to The Dalles Saturday night where his wound was dressed and he was removed to the sanitarium where he hoped to be entertained of his recovery. Jones came to Oregon about 17 years ago from Illinois. He has been employed at the paper mills in Oregon City, but came to Mosier a few days ago where he found work with Mr. Hudson.

Mrs. W. B. Kurtz was severely injured Saturday evening while out driving, by being thrown from her carriage by her horse running away, and colliding with a telephone pole. Her face was badly cut and her wrist sprained, but no bad results are feared.

IMPROVING TRACK ON THE P. V. & Y.

**NORTHERN PACIFIC CHANGES ITS
GRADE BEYOND VANCOUVER—G.
A. B. LAYS E. C. BULLMAN TO
REST—NEWS OF PORTLAND'S
SUBURB IN WASHINGTON.**

Vancouver, Wash., June 6.—The Northern Pacific Railway company is making important improvements on its Portland, Vancouver & Yakima division by lowering the railway track between Greenwood and Brush prairie. For this purpose a large steam shovel is now in operation at that point, and the gravel being removed is used to fill in the trestle at Greenwood.

Subpoenaed Before Grand Jury.
A. Bateman, chief of police, and Officer Martin left today for Seattle, where they have been subpoenaed as witnesses before the United States grand jury this week. This is no doubt the case of the alleged holdup on the Fifth-street road, which is within the United States military reserve, that took place early this spring.

Two Burials Yesterday.
Two burials were held yesterday in Vancouver. One interment, that of James Mathews, was held from the Methodist church in the morning, and the other was that of Edwin C. Bullman, held from the same church at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Rev. W. E. Thompson officiated at both funerals.

The funeral of Mr. Bullman was held under the auspices of the Army and Navy union, G. A. R. and I. O. O. F. Deceased was a native of New York, 56 years of age. He moved to Vancouver from Portland, Or., a year ago, since which time he had made his home at the former place.

M. M. Banister, editor of the Vancouver Columbian, returned yesterday after a pleasant visit to St. Louis, where he took in the world's fair, afterward visiting Chicago and St. Paul.

Candidates Nominated.
The following named persons were nominated Saturday evening at the mass convention held by the Prohibitionists for that purpose: State senator, D. M. Ellsworth; state representatives, Charles Goddard and Peter Onsdorf; auditor, Edwin A. Bennett; treasurer, H. M. Price; sheriff, Charles M. Allen; county clerk, L. E. Mornon; assessor, Matt H. Anderson. These are all the candidates that were nominated, and it is supposed that prosecuting attorney, supervisor, coroner and justice of the peace will be filled by the committee if there is any one on that ticket to run for those offices.

Eight Bodies Recovered.

Peoria, Ill., June 6.—It is now known that at least 14 lives were lost in the Corning distillery fire Saturday. Eight bodies were recovered from the debris yesterday, only four of which were identified. The first report indicated that not more than half a dozen lives were lost.

PICKETT WILL CONTEST DECIDED

**CASE HAS OCCUPIED ATTENTION
OF LANE COUNTY COURT FOR
SEVERAL MONTHS—LODER OF
RED MEN INSTITUTED AT EU-
GENE—WOODMEN CEREMONIES.**

Eugene, Or., June 6.—The Pickett will contest case which has occupied the attention of the Lane county court for several months, has just been decided by Judge H. R. Kincaid in favor of Agnes Joyce, W. H. Hoffman, Helen Hoffman, S. B. Eakin and George B. Dorris, the defendants and contestants in the case.

The will was contested by Kate White, E. M. McGinnis, James McGinnis, Julia A. Vaughn, George Fullerton, Mary Woods, John Trout and wife, nieces and nephews of George W. Pickett, the testator.

The contestants alleged that the beneficiaries of the will used undue influence in inducing the testator to will his property to them and that he was mentally unfit to make a will.

The will given to Kate White, a niece, \$1,000; D. W. Hoffman and Helen Hoffman, his wife, each \$500; to each of his brothers and sisters, or if they are not living, to their children, \$250; provides for a monument over his grave, and gives the rest of the estate, valued at about \$30,000, to his sister, Mrs. Agnes Joyce.

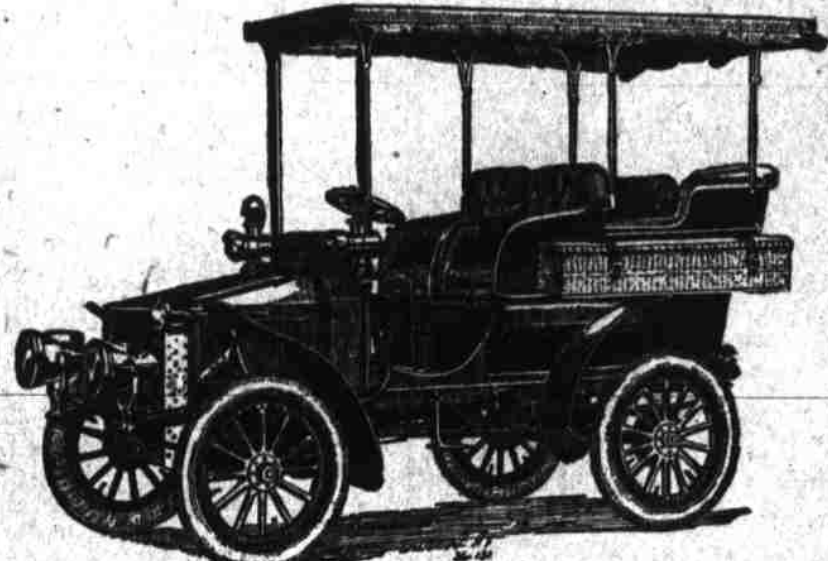
