

FRAUD PRACTICED BY REPUBLICANS

Affidavits for Repeaters Manufactured at the County Headquarters and Sent Broadcast Over City--Try to Save Reed and Stott

In the desperate effort to save Sanders and James Stott from defeat in today's election, the managers of the Republican campaign are resorting to direct fraud. Hundreds of pretended affidavits are being manufactured at the headquarters of the Republican county central committee and sent out to the polling places all over the city to be used in swaying the votes of unregistered voters.

Without filing in the name of the voter for whom they pretend to vouch, half a dozen Republicans have been engaged for hours this morning and early this afternoon in signing a printed form of affidavit which recites that "we, the undersigned witnesses, do swear that our names and signatures are genuine; that we are each personally acquainted with the elector and his residence as stated; that we believe all his other statements are true, and that we are each freeholders in this county."

This "affidavit" is certified as follows: "Subscribed and sworn to by the elector and six witnesses before me this 6th day of June, 1934."

"JOHN T. M'KAY," "Notary Public for Oregon." This pretended affidavit is signed by C. A. Burkhardt and five other Republican workers. It is a part of a printed form, the first part of which is designed to be sworn to by the voter who seeks to cast his ballot, and then follows on the same sheet the attesting affidavit by the six freeholders in this county.

At 3 o'clock this afternoon a dozen men were busily engaged at the Republican headquarters in preparing these papers and sending them out for use at the polls. It is apparent that a determined effort is being made to save Sanders and Stott from defeat in the election before the polls close to run in at 3 p. m.

ARMY SCANDALS NICOMEDIA SAVES WAIT TILL AUGUST DISABLED PLEIADES

GENERAL DIVORCE SUIT OF CAPTAIN AGAINST EDITH MADDEN POSTPONED--MANY REPUTATIONS EXPECTED TO BE TORN TO TATTERS DURING TRIAL

(Journal Special Service.) San Francisco, June 6.—In anticipation of a very sensational trial, the court room was crowded this morning when the divorce suit of Captain J. J. Madden against Edith Madden was called. The spectators were disappointed inasmuch as the hearing was postponed on the request of the defense on the ground that one of its most important witnesses was absent. The case was set for August 29.

Unless all signs fall the names of many army post people, male and female, will be dragged into the case already full of ramifications, and when the smoke clears away it is expected that several reputations will be badly in need of repairs.

The first chapter was written when Lieut. Hector Robichon, a handsome and dashing young officer, was dismissed from the army after a court-martial had decreed that he was guilty of conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman. A party of his friends, including the lieutenant's mother-in-law, overheard the latter's mother-in-law and the testimony of a post nurse who told of a visit to Robichon by Mrs. Madden when Robichon was in the hospital, were the basis for the findings.

Hardly had Robichon been stripped of his epaulettes when Captain Madden filed suit for divorce naming the lieutenant as co-respondent. Mrs. Madden soon followed with a counter-suit charging her husband with neglect and cruelty, non-support and infidelity, naming a number of white and native women in the Philippines. She charged him with being extremely filthy, of refusing to send her a cent, of molesting her when their first child died; of compelling her to remain in this country when he went to the Philippines leaving her unprotected from the snares and temptations that fall in the path of a pretty woman; of other channels as to leave her practically without funds.

It is not entirely the troubles of the Madden, however, that will prove so diverting to the morbid, but the possibility of a scandal involving a domestic crasher. It is hinted that more than one officer of high degree is in a very nervous and uneasy frame of mind, not knowing when he will be hailed before a court martial to answer embarrassing questions. Captain Madden has a very little to say, but it is generally understood that he will not spare the public and diligently searched for the indiscretions of his wife. Grand Sire John B. Goodwin of the Order of Odd Fellows and son, William M. Goodwin, secretary to the mayor of Atlanta, arrived from that city today en route to Tacoma, where they will attend the Washington grand lodge meeting of the order.

At Hood River the grand sire was met by a reception committee of Portland Odd Fellows, consisting of Dr. W. T. Williamson, past grand master, chairman; Thomas F. Ryan, representative of the grand lodge, and E. S. Baran, grand secretary. From Boise the grand sire was accompanied by A. G. Ansell of Spokane, one of the leading Odd Fellows of the state of Washington.

In this city the grand sire was escorted to the Hotel Scott, where he was later taken for a trip on the river. It was also arranged for Mr. Goodwin to return to Portland Friday afternoon. On Friday evening there will be a grand meeting in Odd Fellows' temple. Saturday an excursion will be made to Cascade locks. In the evening there will be a reception to be followed by a banquet at the Hotel Scott. On Sunday there will be a tallie trip to the Lewis and Clark falls ground to be followed by a trolley ride to the Odd Fellows' home. As planned, the grand sire will leave the city Monday morning for California.

BANCROFT CHARGE IS INSUFFICIENT

MITCHELL SAYS INSPECTORS SHOW NO PERSONAL USE OF FUNDS ON I. O. U.'S SINCE DECEMBER—CASE IS NOW UNDER CONSIDERATION

(Washington Bureau of the Journal.) Washington, June 6.—Senator Mitchell finished his examination of the papers and reports in the Bancroft case today. He says the additional charge made since those of December last is not sufficient, in his opinion, to warrant Bancroft's removal.

The inspector's report that since December Bancroft has not made a personal use of postal funds on his I. O. U.'s. That report, however, that he sold waste paper for \$25 and retained \$4.00 of the amount received to reimburse himself for rubber stamps purchased for the use of the office, but which amount was disallowed by the department.

The inspectors report that Bancroft has been in discipline and also disapproved his action in discharging Clerk Steel and the general treatment of his clerks and subordinates. Mitchell will take the case up with the postmaster-general this week, but will not say whether he will insist on the retention of Bancroft or acquiesce in his resignation or removal.

KUROPATKIN REPORTS RUSSIAN SUCCESSES

(Journal Special Service.) St. Petersburg, June 6.—General Kuropatkin reports that on June 3 the Japanese tried to cross the river Kou-lindir. A Russian force opposed their advance and continued on the heights of Lovapudsa, for four hours. The Russian cavalry won, losing one officer killed and two officers and 73 men wounded.

Kuropatkin also gives the details of a fight at Wafangon last week when the Russians lost three killed and 24 wounded and the Japanese dragons lost 70 men killed and wounded.

REPORTS ANOTHER CLASH

Tokio, June 6.—Another clash is reported to have taken place between the Japanese and Russians near Chuchun on June 2.

The Russian forces numbering about 2,000 men retired to Telissu. The Japanese report their losses small, while that of the Russian forces is reported as being heavy.

REINFORCEMENTS FOR COL. YOUNGHUSBAND
