

VANCOUVER ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE

FIRST ACTION TAKEN BEFORE CITY COUNCIL TO DOWNGRADE TRAFFIC—BOY CAUSES TROUBLE—CUPID BUST AGAIN—BAPTIST CHURCH SOCIAL TO BE HELD.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Vancouver, Wash., June 7.—The regular session of the city council of Vancouver was held last night at the council rooms. Little business was transacted beyond the monthly reports of the different city officers, which were referred to committees.

The council members, however, was the scene of the first action to be taken by the Anti-Saloon league in the proposed fight to down the liquor traffic in Vancouver. This was in the nature of a protest by a number of women against the granting of the request of James Crowley for a license to operate a saloon at the corner of Sixth and C streets.

The building in which this saloon is to be conducted is at the southeast corner of these streets, directly opposite the Star brewery. The license was granted in face of the protest.

The saloon men have no comments to make whatsoever on the proposed fight, but the patrons of the saloons claim that a vigorous fight precipitated at this time will result in a complete wide open town and very disastrous to the temperance cause.

Boys Cause Trouble.
The merry-go-round, which has been the sole attraction for a number of the young folks in Vancouver, last night was the scene of considerable excitement, caused by A. F. Wilson slapping Charles Silderburg. Wilson is one of the employees with the merry-go-round, and for several evenings past the manager has been greatly annoyed by a number of the boys raising disturbances and finally winding up last night in some one cutting the rope of the tent in several different places. Thereupon Wilson rushed out to put a stop to further demonstrations. Silderburg was the first boy he met, and believing him to be one of the persons making the trouble, slapped him severely. Wilson was afterward arrested for striking an innocent lad. He pleaded guilty and Justice Harris, taking in consideration the provocations for several evenings past by unknown boys, fined the accused man only \$5 and cost, amounting in all to \$10.

THROWN FROM BUGGY AND NECK BROKEN

BROTHERS PERISH IN DENSE FOREST

BODY OF MARTIN BATTLE, WHO WITH HIS BROTHER DISAPPEARED THREE MONTHS AGO, IS FOUND—REMAINS OF L. SIEVERTSON RECOVERED.

Hoquiam, Wash., June 7.—The body of Martin Battle, who, with his brother, disappeared from their ranch, near the Mora postoffice, in the Quillayute valley, nearly three months ago, was yesterday discovered on Dickey river.

When the fact that they were missing became known, search was instituted and kept up as long as there was a possibility of finding them alive. It was finally conceded that they had perished in the forest and the search was given up and not until the finding of one of the bodies today had any trace of the missing men been found.

Appearances indicate that Martin had died from exhaustion and starvation. Not a trace of his brother, Mathias, has as yet been found, and it is supposed that he has met with a similar fate.

Mystery Is Solved.
The body of a man was found on the beach near here by some children yesterday. It was later identified as that of L. Sievertson, who mysteriously disappeared while on his way home in a boat up the Hoquiam river last December. Sievertson's boat was found, but it was thought at that time he had eloped, notwithstanding the reports by a bridge tender that he had seen a man drown near here on the evening of Sievertson's disappearance.

Only the skeleton remained but identification was completed by the clothing.

KALAMA COMPANY IS BUILDING BIG DAM

Kalama, Wash., June 7.—Twenty-five men are at work on the big dam which is being built on the river above the upper falls. The snow is all gone from the low mountains and the work will be pushed as fast as possible.

The reservoir created by the dam will contain sufficient water to flood the river to its mouth, and will be ready for use next winter.

DRAGGED TO DEATH BY RUNAWAY HORSE

THIRTEEN-YEAR-OLD BOY'S LEG BECOMES ENTAILED IN KAL- THE HORSE AND FRIGHTENED ANIMAL DRAGS HIM MORE THAN A MILE, FATALITY INJURING HIM.

Eugene, Or., June 7.—Alvin Lane, aged 13 years, residing with his brother three miles above Waterville and about 30 miles east of Eugene, was killed Saturday evening by being dragged by a runaway horse for a distance of a mile or more.

The boy and his elder brother went out to catch the horse, which had broken out of the pasture into the public road. The horse had on a long rope, which the boys succeeded in getting hold of, but the horse at once started to run.

The elder brother let go of the rope, but the younger one's leg in some manner became entangled in the rope and he was thrown to the ground. At a breakneck speed the horse tore down the road, dragging the helpless boy with him. Every few feet the boy's head would strike a rock, and his agonizing cries could be heard a great distance away.

His brother at once mounted another horse and took after the runaway animal, and succeeded in stopping it about a mile from where it started. The boy was dead when his brother reached him. The back of his head had been nearly torn off, and his back and limbs were badly lacerated. The horse, in its mad flight down the road, passed several men, but they were powerless to stop it. The boy was an orphan and is the son of the late Al Lane, a prominent farmer in that vicinity.
