

NOTTINGHAM WINS BY 260 PLURALITY

His Success Over Courtney for Senator Makes Complete the Rout of the Republican Machine.

Manning Elected District Attorney with 3515 and Word Sheriff with 2266 Votes to Spare—Returns Show Strength of Independents.

The defeat of the Republican machine in the county election has been rendered complete by the triumph of C. W. Nottingham, independent Republican candidate for the state senate. The latest returns show that Nottingham has defeated A. E. Courtney, the machine nominee, by over 260 votes.

The majorities of John Manning, for district attorney, and Tom Word, for sheriff, have been somewhat reduced by belated reports from a few of the outlying precincts, but their victory is so sweeping a few hundred votes more or less cut little figure.

Returns from all the precincts in the county except precinct No. 75, where through a mistake no election was held, the pluralities are as follows: Manning, district attorney, 3,515; Word, Democrat, sheriff, 2,266; Nottingham, independent Republican, 260; plurality against local option, 1,558.

Among the rank and file of the Republican voters, complaints against the machine are loud and frequent. The loss of the two most important offices at stake in the county election, and the defeat of a regular Republican nominee for the state senate by an independent candidate, whose fight was made without the backing of party or organization, is universally laid at the door of the Matthews machine.

Every one of the three defeated candidates was forced on the ticket against the strong protests of influential Republicans, who predicted defeat if the machine insisted upon ignoring the wishes of the party. Stott's nomination was opposed by Judge Carey and many of his friends, but their counsels were unheeded. Charlie Burkhardt and Cader Powell had planned to make Stott sheriff and his election would have given them rich profits out of the "side graft" of the office. As the known agents of Jack Matthews they were able to line up enough of the delegates to the county convention to nominate Stott in spite of the vehement opposition of Carey and his friends.

Matthews' Hand Visible.

Matthews has always disclaimed responsibility for the course taken by his two lieutenants in this fight, but there is little doubt that he was playing double and that he secretly connived at Stott's nomination, while pretending to be for Mitchell. Handicapped by the public knowledge of his alliance with Burkhardt and Powell, Stott's defeat was inevitable.

Sanderson Reed's nomination was another of the blunders of a machine grown arrogant from past successes. But for Jack Matthews, Reed would not have been on the ticket. In Reed's case, as in Stott's, influential Republicans urged the selection of some stronger man, but Matthews was insistent and declared that Reed must be nominated. He ridiculed the argument that Reed

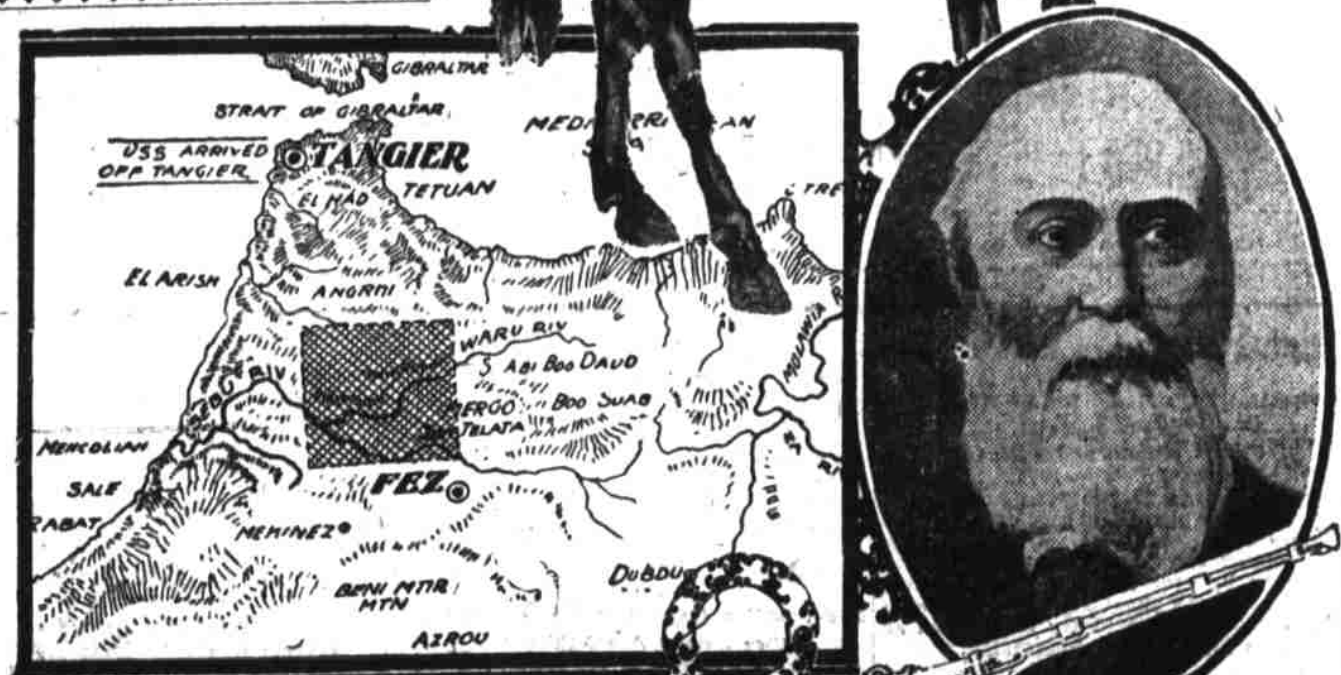

CAPTIVES ASK FOR MEDICAL ASSISTANCE

Washington, June 8.—Admiral Chadwick cables the navy department from Tangier that he has been informed that Ian Perdicaris and Cromwell Varley are in urgent need of medical assistance. THIS ENOCH ARDEN WOULD SLAY WIFE

After Trapping Nine Years in Alaska, J. A. Hockenberry Returns to Estranged Spouse.

Like his illustrious prototypes, Enoch Arden and Rip Van Winkle, J. A. Hockenberry fished and slept for nine years and came back to Portland to get the glad greetings from his wife and children at Peninsular, but instead he was told to keep on with his chosen calling. His refusal to submit and subsequent conduct led one of his daughters, Mrs. Lottie Warner, to appear at the police station today and obtain a warrant from Judge Hogue on the ground that he had threatened to murder her mother. In advance bond was fixed at \$1,000.

Hockenberry appeared at the home of his wife, during her absence Monday night, went into the house, deliberately loaded his trusty Winchester rifle in the presence of his little boy, and then waited until Mrs. Hockenberry should return from prayer meeting. When she came she was afraid to go in and the police were telephoned for from the residence of a nearby neighbor. It was the belief of the frightened woman that he intended to kill her. People living in the neighborhood were ready to do things to Hockenberry. Half a dozen men who were counting the election returns from that precinct in the house, the old stone building, called Mrs. Hockenberry and prevailed upon her to go to bed, which she did after snuffing up the door and leaving the Republican workers to count the number of votes they had given Tom Word and John Manning.

Chapter No. 2 developed at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon when Hockenberry again appeared. This time he peacefully left the premises.

At 2 o'clock this morning, the neighbors were again aroused by the report that Hockenberry had called and an officer responded from the police station, but Hockenberry took to the tall brush that abounds in that neighborhood and escaped.

This morning Mrs. Frances Rhombert, a friend of Mrs. Hockenberry, called at the police station and told the above particulars; and was there with the understanding that Mrs. Hockenberry would appear and ask for a warrant for the arrest of her husband. Mrs. Rhombert said:

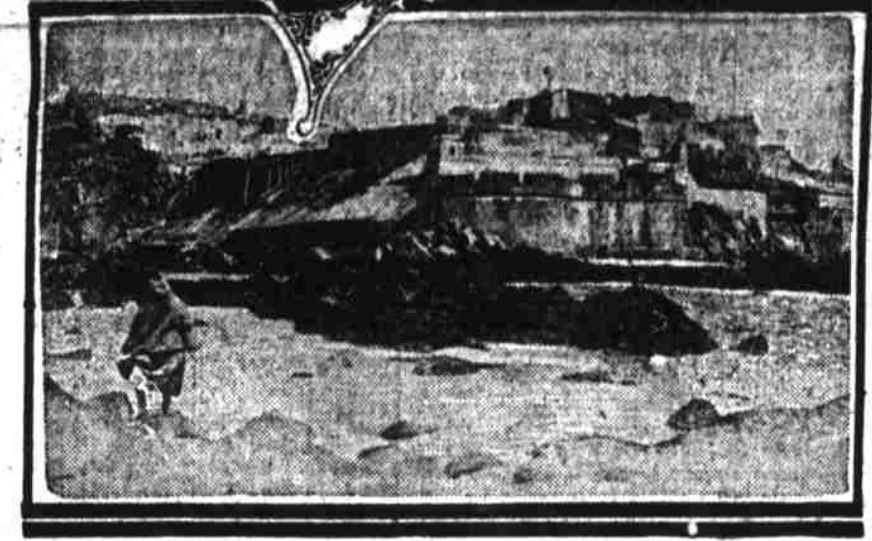
"Hockenberry deserted his wife, his baby boy and his two daughters about nine years ago to hunt and trap in the wilds of Alaska. The family was kept alive by the brave exertions of the wife. In the meantime the girls have grown to womanhood and both married, one of them being Mrs. Lottie Warner, who has a child of her own and who with her husband lives near her mother at Peninsular. The baby has grown to be a boy 13 or 14 years of age and works for Roberts Bros. at Third and Morrison streets.

Would Kill His Wife.

"About a month ago Hockenberry first appeared and is said to have threatened to kill his wife unless she would live with him. She is a woman probably 50 years of age, is of a firm mind, and, inasmuch as she had reared their family, she told him to go.

HERMANN HAS 5,963 PLURALITY

Republican State Chairman Reckons it at That, Estimating Much of the Vote—Local Option Wins by Nearly 3,000 Majority.

The returns from over the state show but little change in the situation from that announced in yesterday's Journal.

While the first estimates of the strength of the vote for the local option amendment proved somewhat larger than today's counting shows, it is safe to predict that the majority for the amendment is in the neighborhood of 3,000 votes, which, it must be conceded, is a remarkable hand-raising for the measure.

In the First congressional district it is now conceded by the Republicans that Hermann's plurality has been materially cut. According to official figures Tongue's plurality in the election of 1902 was 7,372. Chairman Toose of the Republican congressional committee today lays claim to but 5,963 plurality for Hermann. It therefore seems assured that Hermann's plurality has been cut nearly 20 per cent, as the victors rarely lay claim in such a fight as was this one to less than they are entitled to.

In many counties of the state the Democrats have elected local officers, but they have apparently lost several members of the legislature. Incomplete returns indicate that the Republican majority in both houses has been increased. One surprising feature of the congressional vote in the Second congressional district is the strength of the prohibition candidate, whose vote far exceeds all expectations.

The only state officers elected were a supreme judge and a dairy and food commissioner. The heavy majority given to each of them is robbed of political significance, inasmuch as Judge Moore's service upon the supreme bench has been generally regarded as entitling him to re-election regardless of politics, and Commissioner Bailey has gained a

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HOLDUP IN ROCKIES EXAMINE ENTRANCE

Brakeman Is Shot, Express Car Dynamited and Robbers Escape

NEAR PARACHUTE, COLO. ONE IS BADLY DAMAGED

Robbery of Denver & Rio Grande Train Like That at Copley, Calif.—Officers Suspect the Same Bandits.

Grand Junction, Colo., June 8.—A holdup closely resembling in its methods the recent robbery of the Oregon express train in California, took place at an early hour this morning near Parachute, a Denver & Rio Grande station on the western slope a short distance east of here.

Brakeman Charles Shellenberger was seriously, and perhaps fatally, wounded, by a gunshot fired by one of the robbers, and the conductor narrowly escaped a similar fate.

The train which was stopped was the westbound Denver & Rio Grande express which left Denver Tuesday morning and which frequently carries considerable sums of specie. The robbers were five in number.

Two of the men boarded the blind baggage at Parachute, which is a small station. Five miles west of that station the two robbers crawled over the tender of the engine and compelled Engineer Allison to stop the train.

Brakeman Shellenberger swung off from one of the car platforms to discover the cause of the stoppage and was immediately fired upon. As he fell the conductor jumped from another platform, and a bullet shattered the lantern which he was holding aloft as he peered forward into the darkness.

Threaten the Messenger.

The robbers then ordered the conductor to come forward with uplified hands, and with the engineer and fireman he was marched back to the train, where the bandits compelled the trainmen to uncouple the locomotive, baggage and express cars from the coaches. All were threatened with instant death unless they obeyed implicitly, and the conductor was told to take the brakeman's fate as a warning.

After uncoupling the train the robbers marched the conductor and baggage men back to the train, then boarded the engine and ordered the engineer to run the train down the line.

Two miles from the scene of the hold-up the train was flagged by three confederates and was brought to a standstill. The meeting-place had evidently been arranged, as five horses were tied near by.

Express Messenger's Pluck.

Without further parley the robbers, leaving one of their number to guard the engineer and fireman, went back to the express car and demanded of Express Messenger Shea, who is one of the veterans on the line, that he open the car doors. Shea flatly refused. One of the robbers shouted to him that they would dynamite the car, and him with it, but still Shea refused to open.

Part of a stick of dynamite tore the door from its hinges, and the robbers sprang into the car, where Shea was vainly trying to get a sawed-off shotgun into action.

Shea, finding the odds against him, surrendered, and was compelled to open the safe door. The robbers secured one sealed bag from Salda, said to contain gold, and fled.

Engineer Allison ran his engine and the two cars ahead to Uta at full speed, where an alarm was sent in. From both Rifle and Newcastle, posesses were hurriedly organized and sent in pursuit.

The Rifle posse is composed of some of the best mountaineers in that portion of the country and expects to head the bandits off before they can reach the foothills which are 18 miles distant from the scene of the hold-up.

Into Routt County.

The bandits undoubtedly will attempt to cross the range either to the head of the Pike-ance river, or some similar stream and then make their way into the inaccessible portions of Routt county, where their capture would be almost impossible.

This county is one of the wildest in America, and has within its borders many outlaws of the most desperate type. It has an abundance of game and is the country which was hunted over by President Roosevelt in his quest for big shooting.

From it the outlaws could, if so disposed, go northward, as did Tom Horn, toward the notorious Hole-in-the-wall. Their capture is therefore problematical. Several hold-ups have taken place in this vicinity in recent years, in one of which messenger Shea was once before the victim.

The wounded brakeman was brought here and placed in the hospital.

HOLDUPS ARE SIMILAR.

Express Officials Point to Similarity of Robbers' Actions.

Denver, Colo., June 8.—Express officials here, while refusing to make any statement of the losses and giving out the usual statement that the losses are small, admit a fear that the holdup may have been the work of men experienced in that line.

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Japanese Gunboats Steam Boldly Up to Port Arthur's Waterway.

ONE IS BADLY DAMAGED

One Sailor Killed and Two Wounded—Russian Ships Inactive.—Believe Obstructions Still Hold.

London, June 8.—The St. James Gazette says that a rumor which is current on the stock exchange today that Port Arthur had fallen cannot be confirmed.

The Exchange Telegraph company also reports a rumor of the fall of Port Arthur with a Japanese loss of 11,000 men.

A dispatch from Rome today says a Yipkow dispatch asserts that an attack on Port Arthur has been proceeding both by land and sea since Saturday and that the fall of the fortress is imminent.

Tokio, June 8.—Reports have been received here which indicate that the rumors of yesterday to the effect that an attack has been made on Port Arthur were premature.

The official report which leads to this belief says that Monday four Japanese gunboats made a close reconnaissance of Port Arthur for the purpose of examining the entrance to the harbor with such certainty as to make sure whether the Russian fleet inside could come out at will.

The investigating squadron was compelled to run in to a point where it was exposed to a terrific fire from the Russian batteries, but held on until reaching a place where an inspection could be made. One gunboat, on which the cannonade centered, was hit eight times and sustained considerable serious damage.

One sailor was killed and two wounded. The cannonade lasted until the gunboats withdrew. From the fact that none of the vessels inside the harbor made any show of taking part in the affair, nor came toward the entrance, it is presumed that the harbor is still blocked, or that the Russians will make no attempt to use their fleet except as a last extremity.

It is believed here in Tokio that the cannonading accompanying this reconnaissance is that which was reported by the Chinese junk.

ADMITS A LOSS.

Viceroy Alexieff Reports the Sinking of a Torpedo Boat at Kinchow.

St. Petersburg, June 8.—Viceroy Alexieff today reports as follows: "Rear Admiral Wilgert reports that the gunboat Subr strongly supported our right flank in the battle at Kinchow, aided by the torpedo boats Bourny and Boyky. He further reports that on May 28, 10 torpedo boats were sent out against the Japanese. While they were returning one struck the rocks at the harbor entrance and went down, but the crew was saved."

The Novoe Vremya prints an editorial today urging an improvement in the education of the Russian masses.

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MISCREANT MURDERS VALUABLE HORSES

Colfax, Wash., June 8.—Four horses, valued at \$600, the property of Dr. T. D. Ferguson, were shot and killed in a pasture last night near here.

LIBERTY BELL AT ST. LOUIS FAIR
