

SAILOR IN LOVE WOULD STAY HERE

ABLE SEAMAN ON SHIP LAMENEC
SMITH WITH CHARGE OF VA-
RIETY ACTRESS TAKES FRENCH
LEAVE AND IS RECAPTURED
AFTER DESERTER CHARGE.

Charmed by the wily graces of a local variety actress, A. Leureux, a member of the crew of the French ship Lamene, attempted some days ago to desert from the vessel. He was arrested and locked up in the county jail for safe keeping. Yesterday afternoon his ship sailed and Leureux was put on board, but not until he had escaped from a deputy United States marshal started to comply with the captain's request. Leureux was escorted by the officer to the foot of Stark street, where he was to take a launch for the French vessel, which was lying down the stream. No handcuffs were put on the sailor, and he walked along cheerfully enough until he reached the launch. The marshal turned his back for a minute, and when he looked around his prisoner was gone.

Running with all speed to Second and Morrison streets, the Frenchman boarded a streetcar and rode as far as Third and Morrison, all the while followed by a yelling crowd. At Third and Morrison the sailor jumped from the car and ran into a nearby drug store. Lingering there but a minute, Leureux again started on his run for liberty. The crowd which started to follow him had now grown to be about 100 people. Seeing the fleeing man, Patrolman Anderson rushed to the corner of Third and Yamhill streets and stopped Leureux. In a few minutes the federal officer appeared on the scene.

"I treated you well, I treated you well," yelled the officer, shaking his fist in the sailor's face. "Now, you'll come with me, and I'll put you on board that windjammer if it is the last thing I ever do."

Handcuffs were quickly slipped on the Frenchman's wrists. "I am no robber," protested the runaway, "and what for you put me on them? I am no thief, I tell you."

But despite the fact that he was neither robber nor thief, Leureux was marched away to the launch in irons. Yesterday afternoon he worked with his shipmates in heaving up the anchor of the Lamene, and within a few days will be home again.

It is said that Leureux, who is but 22 years of age, belongs to one of the leading families of the north French coast. His father is one of the best known pilots of France, and it is said that the boy was sent to sea in order to prepare him to enter the pilot service under his father. He is about 6 feet 2 inches tall, and was always well dressed. Captain Turget said that he had been a model man until he met the actress, since that time he had been restless and talked of leaving the ship.

DARING STANDS TEST.

New tug launched superior to others of her class.

After two hours' trial trip down the river yesterday afternoon the new tugboat, named Superior, now nearing completion at the Willamette Boiler Works' wharf, was pronounced superior to any towing vessel of her tonnage on the Pacific coast. Yesterday afternoon's test was a severe one, the tug being ordered to tow a barge loaded with 100 tons of coal in every way they could, and after the trial pronounced her A. No. 1 in every respect. The engines, boilers and machinery on the vessel were installed by the Willamette Iron and Steel Works, they having been the successful bidders for this work over a score of other firms. The new tug's officers will be: A. T. Stream, captain; T. W. Stream, first mate, and George Birkenhaw. The tug will be operated by the Gray's Harbor Tugboat company.

REYNOLDS AT MARATHON.

Portland shipping men are expecting to hear of the arrival of the British three-masted ship Reynolds at Mazatlan, Mexico. The windjammer sailed for the Mexican port the first of May from Newcastle, N. S. W., and being of the clipper order, she is expected to make quick time. The Reynolds, she sailed out of this port many times, she having left her last fall for South Africa with lumber; several times before she carried grain to Europe. It is thought that the vessel, which is in command of Captain E. H. Johnson, will be again chartered by a local firm, and will come from Mazatlan in ballast. He formerly lived in this city.

SCARLET BANNER ANGERS SENIORS

RIVALRY BETWEEN O. A. C.
CLASSES RESULTS IN DISAP-
POINTMENT TO CROWD—COM-
MENCEMENT WEEK CONTINUAL
ROUND OF PLEASURES.

Corvallis, June 15.—Good-natured rivalry between the senior and junior classes of the Agricultural college resulted in a disappointment to the crowd that gathered yesterday afternoon to witness the senior class-day exercises on the campus.
The juniors, during the forenoon, placed a banner on the college flagstaff, bearing in bold red characters "65." The emblem flanked in the center of the dignified seniors, aroused their antagonism, and some of the seniors mounted the roof of the administration building, tore the junior banner down, and hoisted a senior banner to the top-most point on the staff.
President Gatch then took a hand in the matter and ordered all banners off of sight. At this, the seniors declined to give their class-day exercises, and the crowd returned from whence it came, leaving the seniors ahead in the battle, even though somewhat cheated of full victory. The incident caused considerable amusement.

The events of commencement week are now the leading topics of conversation in Corvallis. They began with the Junior league dance Friday evening, followed by the Promenade and the Junior debate Saturday evening. Monday evening's event was the entertainment given by the pupils of Miss Helen Crawford, of the education department, and of Mrs. Florence McDowell-Green of the department of vocal music. Every number on the program was of an order of merit, and elicited hearty applause from the large and appreciative audience that filled the chapel to overflowing. Tuesday evening, at the opera house, the senior play, "The Rivals," which was given, attracted a large crowd, as the seniors of O. A. C. are famous for the success of their endeavors along this line.

Today, the graduating exercises take place in the armory, at 10 o'clock. Only two speakers appear on the program, the salutator, and the valedictorian. Miss Agnes Watt, of Portland, is to give several vocal numbers, which will be drawing crowds to the audience. Many visitors from all parts of the state are in attendance at the commencement exercises, and a large crowd is present this afternoon at the day exercises that are being given on the college campus.

OREGON AT ST. LOUIS

It is not improbable that the statesmanship of Jefferson, the genius of Gray, the hands of Lewis and Clark and the enterprise of Astor would have been all without avail. The state of Missouri has contributed through her people the greatest work and the greatest aid in acquiring and holding the Oregon territory of any state of the Union. It is a significant fact that the jurisdiction of the grand lodge of your state, the first Masonic lodge was established on the Pacific coast, in Oregon. No people have a greater admiration for the success of your wonderful enterprise, the Louisiana Purchase, than the people of the Oregon territory.

"The state of Massachusetts, through Gray, contributed her part; New York, through John Jacob Astor, contributed her part; Virginia, through the great and good President Jefferson, contributed her part; Kentucky, through her hardy sons in the great expedition contributed more than her part, but the greatest aid was your part."
"I cannot close my statement without paying due honor to the part taken by the little Indian woman, Sacajawea, who, history informs us, received no consideration for her services, though the members of the expedition, when destitute of food, were saved from starvation by her relationship with the Indians of the Rocky mountains. The noble women of the Oregon territory are now raising a fund for a monument to the memory of this little heroine of the red race, and I trust their efforts may have the support of the patriotic people of the United States."

"In 1905, in the city of Portland, the citizens of this territory will celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of the expedition of Lewis and Clark. We have about 10,000 native born Missourians in the state of Oregon. I therefore take great pleasure in inviting you one and all to be present and participate in our expedition, and meet your old pioneer friend, who left the star old state many years ago with the ox team, and the family in the old prairie schooner, assuring you that the trip which you now make will be filled with many more pleasures than the one they made, and the home which will receive you on the far Pacific shores will be more inviting than the one which presented itself to your old friend who went by prairie schooner in the '40s."

"Now, in behalf of the state of Oregon and the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition commission, I desire to dedicate this building, a fine emblem of the first building ever constructed on the Pacific coast by American citizens, for the purpose for which it was intended, a state building for the state of Oregon at the Louisiana Purchase exposition, and I most cordially invite you one and all to partake of the hospitality of this building during the whole time of this world's exposition."

LEATHER WORKERS ARE ENJOINED

Declaring that the acts of violence and intimidation practiced by strikers are increasing, four large saddlery companies secured an order from Presiding Judge George H. Egan yesterday restraining members of the United Brotherhood of Leather Workers on Horse Goods, local No. 56, from interfering in any manner with their employees, as is alleged, or further conspiring to damage their business.

The complaint alleges that the brotherhood has assumed control of the employees of the companies bringing suit; namely, the George Lawrence company, the John Clark Saddlery company, the Breyman and company and the J. J. Cronin company. It is recited that prior to last March 20 a document was submitted for the managers of the companies to sign. All its provisions were accepted except the last—that the local association should have jurisdiction over local work in the machine department except that of light machines.

Accompanying the complaints are affidavits of George Lawrence, Jr., Otto H. Spits, Arthur Oldham, Aaron Wells, Clarence Isham, Clarence De Grandpre, J. R. Barlow, W. F. Wheeler, Perry Hall and Fred Anderson, corroborating the allegations in the complaint. The strong allegations are that a deputy sheriff was assaulted and beaten by the strikers, and that Al Walden attempted to throw Wells off the Madison street bridge and threatened to "beat him to death." Walden is said to have been restrained by other strikers.

The defendants in the complaint, in addition to the brotherhood and its local officers, are: Duncan G. Jodon, Fred Anderson, John Snell, Jacob Wolseifer, John Carey, Al Walden, Jack Smith, Charles Gates, Manley Davis, Robert E. Wangeman, Jack Turper, A. Voss, A. L. Baumgarten, Joseph Snyder, D. Gleson, William Harrold, J. B. Loren, John Munro, C. L. Gathier, George Disbrow. The other members are included collectively under the title of Richard Roe.

ALLEGED ROBBERY ARRESTED.

Charles Mehan and Fred Wilson were today held to await the action of the grand jury by Municipal Judge Hogue. They were charged with attempted highway robbery and attempted burglary, preferred by Harry Kinney, proprietor of the Bank cafe. The men were arrested three days ago by Detectives Kerrigan and Snow.
