IT IS ESTIMATED THAT FROM 8,000
TO 9,000 TONS OF SHEETS WILL BE
SHIPPED FROM THE VICINITY OF
TEKOA TO THE FACTORY AT
WAVERLY.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Teka, Wash., June 16.—The production of sugar beets in this locality is on the increase and is becoming an important industry. The acreage planted will be about this year in the vicinity of 7,000. Waverly factory will be over 1,000 acres more than last year, a large portion of this increase being in the country tributary to Tekoa.

D. C. Carbin, owner of the factory at Waverly, has 550 acres planted on the Indian reservation, a short distance east of Tekoa. He has a large number of men constantly employed. There are also about 400 acres more in cultivation by farmers in contiguous territory, whose product will be shipped from here. This makes a total of 950 acres, as compared with 315 acres in the same territory last year.

It is estimated that from 8,000 to 10,000 tons of sugar beets will be shipped from Tekoa the present season.
