

TOWN TOPICS

Why not commence right now to plan a Sunday trip up the Columbia to the Cascade Locks? Steamer "Haley Galt" makes this trip on Sunday and it is one well worth taking and particularly so at this time of the year. This trip gives excursionists the rare opportunity of viewing the rushing cascades which are so beautiful in the spring and early summer. As for the boat, without question it is the most comfortable and convenient of the hand-some fleet. A winter's assault of carpenters, mechanics and painters has made her one of the finest craft afloat on western waters. Together with a luxurious boat and a magnificent ride this trip is indeed most enjoyable and one not to be missed if possible to be taken. Excursionists not wishing to be bothered with lunches will find that they, too, have been looked out for in the general consideration. A restaurant will provide for those who wish their repast a la carte. In the dining room, however, meals will be served and will prove all that could be desired. The council committee of the city council, without discussion Monday decided to recommend to the council that automobiles used for hire be placed in the same class as cabs and hacks and that the same schedule of prices apply. When it was suggested that automobiles cost more than cabs and that they should receive a higher hire the committee answered that a good cab and team cost as much as the ordinary automobile and that gasoline and oil did not cost as much as hay and oats. The committee recommended that an amendment be tacked to the cab and hack ordinance that would cover all horseless machines used for hire.

Councilman John McKie of St. Helens has been in Portland for two days, and closed a contract with the City & Suburban Railway company for \$25,000 Belgian stone blocks. These blocks will be used to pave the ground between the rails on the company's tracks. The contract also was closed with the Portland Railway company for a similar number of stone blocks. Mr. McKie will put about 40 expert block makers in the St. Helens quarries at once, and the contracts will be pushed to completion.

In answer to the suit of L. Weider and S. Hochfeld to have her ejected from No. 72 Union avenue, because she is said to be second hand goods contrary to the terms of her lease, Jane M. Johnson declares the lease was obtained from her on a pretext and a clause added that second hand goods were not to be sold by her, long after the instrument was drawn. She says Weider and Hochfeld are selling second hand goods a block distant from where she is located and fear competition.

The smartest boat on the river is the Charles R. Spencer, and it runs through from Portland to The Dalles without change. The Spencer has never lost a trip on account of high water. It is not the kind that is discontinued by a little extra flow of melting snow. Her berth is at the foot of Washington street, from whence she departs every Monday, Wednesday and Thursday morning at 7 o'clock. Merchants and business men of the city enjoyed a treat in the way of a noon lunch yesterday when the Woman's Alliance of the Unitarian church served a dainty course of luncheon in the church parlors. The Woman's Alliance comprises about 50 members and every year it gives a luncheon to raise funds to help carry on philanthropic work. Over 150 was cleared yesterday. The decorations consisted of tall vases of fragrant roses and California poppies.

J. S. Holland, interested with Hilda Shaver in the rental of rooms for offices and halls for lodge meetings on the third and fourth floors of the Alinsky building, at Third and Morrison streets, filed suit in the circuit court yesterday afternoon for an accounting and the appointment of a receiver. He says Mrs. Shaver collects all the money and refuses to give him his share or to return the \$550 he invested in the business.

A decision as regards the granting of a license to the Schneider, Sr., to sell liquor at Montaville has been postponed by the county court until next Wednesday. The question is said to present a number of problems and during the last week the court has been too busy to give it consideration.

HAS SEEN NEARLY 40 YEARS' GROWTH

M. PINKERTON OF UMATILLA COUNTY COMPARES THE PORTLAND HE KNOW IN EARLY DAYS WITH THE PORTLAND OF TODAY.—EASTERN OREGON DEVELOPS.

M. Pinkerton, of Weston, Umatilla county, an uncle of W. D. Fenton, counsel for the Southern Pacific, is visiting Portland relatives, his first visit to the city in 15 years. "Since I was here last Portland has become a great city," said Mr. Pinkerton, who was a caller at the Commercial club this morning. "It is almost impossible for one to comprehend the changes that have taken place in that length of time, and the distances to which the confines of the city have extended. In those days, beyond business transacted in a small area, near the river, Portland amounted to little, and in what was then the residence part of town my nephew is now putting up a business house that will cost more than \$100,000, and it is in the center of a district of business houses—the neighborhood of Fifth and Oak streets. "Like Portland, Umatilla county has made steady progress since I went there in 1870, five years after I crossed the plains to Oregon. In those years there was little but a wilderness, whereas now there are thriving towns and wheat fields.

"Prospects for a big wheat crop in the Weston district were never better than they are this year. Spring wheat was a little bit slower, but fall wheat is as good as could be desired. The fruit crop of that entire district and on into the Walla Walla valley will also be tremendous. "Merchants in Weston are doing a thriving business, and everybody seems on the crest of prosperity. "Mr. Pinkerton goes from here to Minnville to visit other relatives, and will return in a few days for a second visit before going home.
