

Drennan's Double Saved the Day

BRILLIANT PLAYING
DEFEATS OAKLAND

BROWNS WERE ON THE ALERT AND BY MANY STARS PLAYS TOOK THE SECOND STRAIGHT FROM COMMUTERS—DRENNAN, BECK AND THIELMAN ARE HEROES.

Portland 2, Oakland 1.
Roach and Steelman; Schmidt and Byrnes.

In probably the fastest, most exciting and best played game on the local diamond in many months, the Portland Browns succeeded in defeating the Oakland Commuters yesterday by the close score of 2 to 1. From the first man up in the initial inning to the death of Devereaux and Moshman by Kirby Drennan, unassisted, in the ninth chapter of the story, the spectators were kept on the uneasy seat, either applauding brilliant plays or holding their breath lest something dreadful would happen to Portland toward the close of the game.

The expected almost came in the ninth. Everybody who knows the Oakland team is aware of its dangerous pranks at all times, and yesterday the faithful had good reason to be nervous on more than one occasion. Portland had a proud lead of one until the sixth inning, when Ganley made a safe one to center and it bounced over Drennan's head and before the ball was returned—and it came quickly too—Ganley had reached third by a beautiful slide. Then here the hungry Lohman longed for that run in order to tie the score, and while Roach was unbending, Ganley started for home, and Buck Franks at the bat, knowing the signal, connected with the ball for a few feet and the irrepressible Ganley was home and "Peter the Great" was happy.

The game was all features. Roach and Schmidt were putting them over in lightning order, and but few of the batters on either team hit their offerings. Drennan's double in the ninth, Thielman's fielding and batting, Beck's superb hitting and McCredie's batting were the principal points of the struggle. Castro and Franks at short played gift edge ball, while Shaffer, Schaffley, Streib and Schmidt were there with the goods also.

Those who witnessed the game will always recall it as one of the best ever played in Portland.

Now the Game.

Portland started scoring in the first inning when after Nadeau fouled out to the Red Top, McCredie singled, stole second, and took third on Drennan's out, from whence he registered on Beck's double to right. Francis retired the side on a chance to Franks. Schaffley's single, a fielder's choice and Nadeau's error allowed two Oaks life on the sacks in the second, but Streib and Byrnes failed to negotiate and the side was out. In the sixth Ganley, always a dangerous man at bat, hit one to center field which, by daring base running, he stretched into a triple. White Roach was pitching to Franks, Ganley kept daring off third and suddenly darted like a flash for the plate, which he attained by a fine piece of work by Buck Franks, who dimpled the ball down by McCredie, who had no chance to get Ganley and so retired Franks at first. It was as neat a piece of sacrificing as has been seen here this season.

The winning run was scored by McCredie in the eighth, when he led off with a single, was sacrificed to second by Drennan, and registered at the glad gum terminal on Beck's second double-bagger, which was hit past Devereaux so fast that the Red Dog was not aware of the fact that the sphere was near his territory. It was a corking war, and like the previous one, came at the right time.

The game came to a sensational close in the ninth when with third and second and population, Drennan captured Devereaux's Texas leaguer back of second and completed an unsolicited double play retiring the side. The score:

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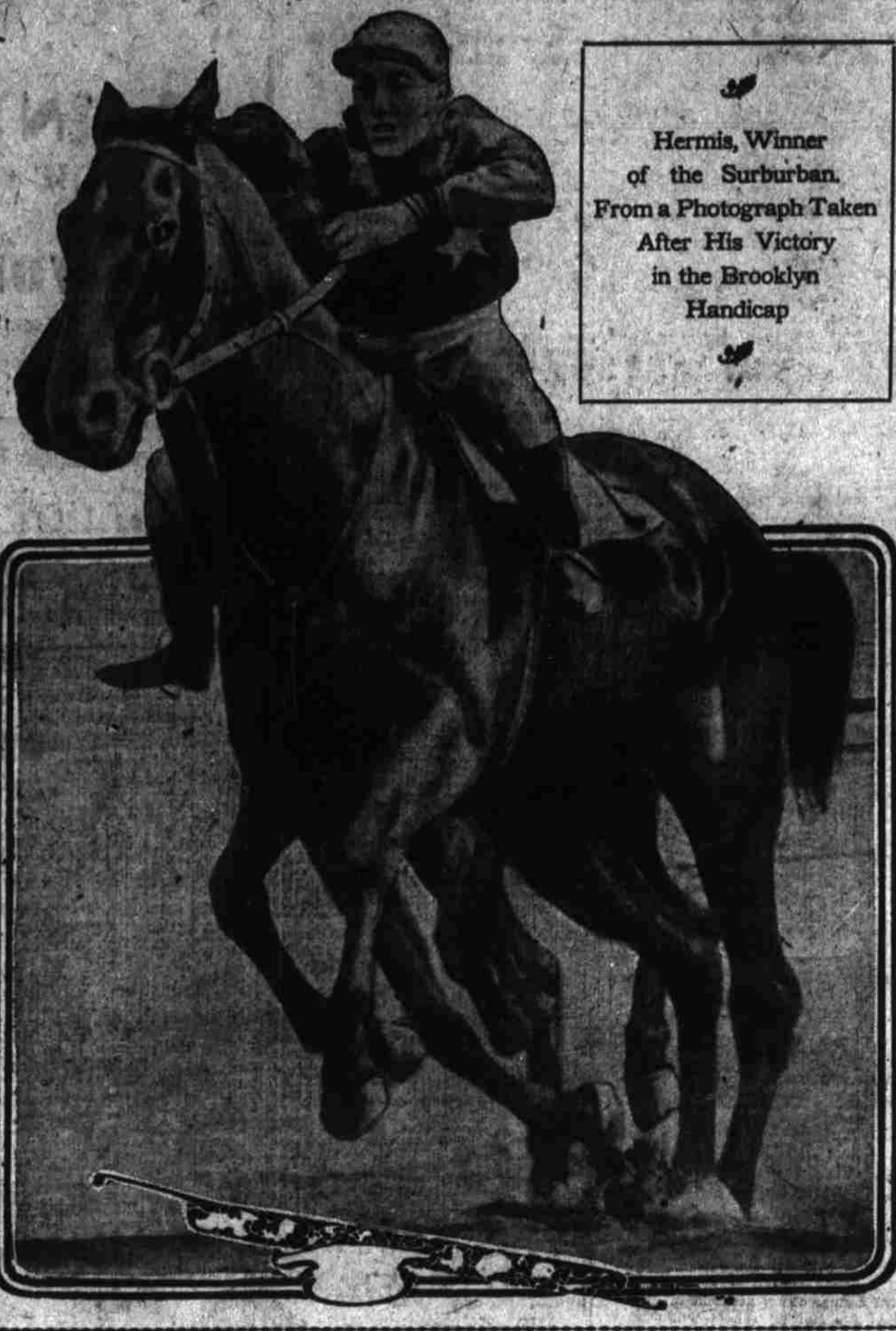

HERMIS WINS THE
SUBURBAN CLASSIC

THOMAS GREAT HORSE TAKES
LEAD AT THE START AND IS
NEVER HAZARDED, RUNNING FROM
IRISH LAD AND THE PICKET—
RECORD IS BROKEN.

(Journal Special Service.)
New York, June 17.—Hermis, captured the suburban handicap afternoon in the prettiest and fastest race ever run over the course, taking the lead from Irish Lad and the Picket at the start and maintaining it to the end in splendid fashion. The time was 2:05, the fastest ever made in the suburban, and hit 2-5 of a second lower than the track record of 2:04 3-5 held by the great McClellan. The Picket finished second, beating out the heavy played favorite, Irish Lad, by a nose. No more ideal day could be had for the classic event and 50,000 spectators witnessed the race. Long before noon the crowd was on its way to the Long Island course, in cars, automobiles, trolley-ho, afloat and on horseback.

The attendance was a record breaker and when Arthur Rodgers rode his runner back to the judge's stand the ovation given to jockey and mount could be heard in the heavens. The start was a perfect one, and when Starter Fitzgerald let the barrier fly, Hermis was off like a shot, passing the judge's stand, out ahead to the rail, and retained that position to the finish, winning easily. Irish Lad went to the post at 9 to 10, from 6 to 8, so great was the pile on, but the poor horse was a disappointment to the public and his backers. The bookmakers had taken over a half million dollars on Irish Lad, and were happy when the result was announced. The results were:

Umpire Brown's work so far as decisions went was all right, but he should be stricter with the players, compelling them to stop yelling from the bench, and insist upon the coaches keeping within the coaching lines. If Tim Brown does this, then his officiating will pass muster.

Schaffley's brilliant work is impaired by his fondness for talking and his eagerness to play dirty ball. Yesterday when Thielman made a two bagger and was springing to second, Schaffley jumped in his way and tried to stop him. Such work will not be tolerated here, Mr. Schaffley.

It's funny to see how the entire Oakland team follows the lead of Pete Lohman. If Pete swears, they all swear; if he growls at the umpire, they all growl; if he mutters, the gang mutters, and if he keeps still, well, that's going too far, as he never keeps still.

There were 2,000 persons, including women, at yesterday's game, and it was a treat to hear the applause given both teams whenever they pulled off a good play. It is this impartial treatment that makes baseball popular.

James Thielman is about one of the most valuable men in the Coast league. Besides his star pitching he can field and bat like a Trojan.

The aggressiveness of the Oakland nine is commendable. Every man on the nine is on the go from the start to the finish. That helps a great deal.

Francis should have been given credit in the official score for a sacrifice hit the time that his bunt scored Ganley.

Walter McCredie is now hitting over the 300 mark. The two safe hits secured by him yesterday increased his average to .383.

Erve Beck is close up and at the rate he is batting at present will soon rank among the league leaders.

James Thielman is also boosting his batting average and can soon be expected to rank near the top.

TO STOP BETTING
AT THE MEADOWS

SEATTLE'S CIVIC UNION PLANS
GENERAL FIGHT ON POOL SELLING
AND ALL OTHER GAMBLING
AT THE RACE COURSE—EFFORT
TO ILLINOIS LAW.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Seattle, Wash., June 17.—Seattle's Civic Union, an organization for purity in municipal and county affairs, is seeking to stop the selling of pool and all sorts of gambling at The Meadows, where the King County Racing association's summer meet is in progress, and in the southern suburb of Georgetown.

Members of the union prompted the halt made recently on the Georgetown resorts, which "tipped off" to the poolmen, and other members now say that action was not entirely disinterested, and that if betting is to stop one place, it must stop in all places.

The plan now is to have the county authorities take up the pool question in earnest and cause a general suspension. A recent case against poolroom-keepers resulted in a decision that selling pools is not a crime, but it is openly asserted that had the proprietors been prosecuted for keeping a gambling resort the result of the case would have been far different. Illinois has a law relating to gambling said to be almost identical with that of this state, and this point was brought out in comparing the decisions.

Several peculiar circumstances have been brought out in connection with the recent raid. No warrant was sworn out for the arrest of William Carter, the pioneer poolseller there, and he had threatened to have the race track resorts closed in case his business met interference.

FRENCH AUTOIST
WINS BENNETT CUP

THOMAS CAPTURES THE GREAT AUTOMOBILE RACE AT HAMBURG—
EMPEROR WILLIAM ACTS AS
STARTER, SURROUNDED BY
SCORES OF THE NOBILITY.

Hamburg, June 17.—In the presence of Emperor William and the empress, and a large gathering of nobles, the French autoist, driving the car Richard Brainer, won the automobile race here today for the James Gordon Bennett cup, from an excited string of competitors.

The day was ideal for the race, the only disappointing feature of the occasion being the fact that there was no American interest in the contest. At sunrise the people were on their way to the course and by 8:30 o'clock the course was lined with spectators. In the imperial pavilion with the Kaiser were the empress, King of Wurtemberg, the German crown prince, Grand Duke Ernst Louis of Hesse, and Grand Duke Frederic Francis. There were numerous princes who with their suites made a striking group in which their gorgeous military uniforms were the conspicuous feature. Near the starting line on opposite sides of the course, there were two grand stands each seating five thousand and eager spectators, while twenty thousand more sightseers assembled around the enclosure of six miles' circumference. In drawing lots for the order of starting, Jenatyn, German, secured first chance and led on the Kaiser's signal at 7 o'clock sharp. His car leaped forward and in two seconds he was lost to view in the crowded lines. At intervals of seven minutes the cars started, each encouraged by rounds of applause. Following Jenatyn, in order, came Edge, England; Werner, Austria; Land Bianca, Italy; Thery, France; Hautvaat, Belgium; Baron VonCaters, German; Girling, English; Braun, Austria; Cagno, Italian; Dalleron, French; Angerles, Belgium; Opel, German; Jarrott, English; Warden, Austrian; Storere, Italian; Rougier, French; Baron DeCrawhor, Belgian; Du-faux, Swiss.

Opel didn't get very far until his axles broke and he was out of the running. It was also reported that Jenatyn ran over one of the spectators and killed him.

They came in ahead of Jenatyn by only a few minutes. He was given a rousing ovation and several French ladies embraced and kissed the victor. The Kaiser summoned Thery to the imperial box and congratulated him.
