

ARE UNABLE TO GO TO AMERICAN LAKE

CONNECT SALEM WITH PORTLAND

MEETS DEATH IN AWA ACCIDENT

TWO PRIVES OF COMPANY AT VANCOUVER SERVING 30 DAYS IN JAIL ACCUSED OF FURNISHING A CASE OF LIQUOR FROM A LOCAL DISPENSARY.

Vancouver, Wash., June 25.—Privates Thomas Cahill and Edward Branch, of Company F, 15th Infantry, have got in trouble with the civil authorities to the extent of preventing them from participating in the fall maneuvers at American lake.

Night before last Frank Lockoff, who runs a wholesale and retail liquor store on the corner of Fifth and B streets, missed a case of Jennie Moore A. A. whiskey when he was reported to have been stolen.

This case of whiskey disappeared completely, as did also the culprit. Last night an attempt was repeated and resulted in the capture of the two men above named.

In Lockoff's establishment are a large number of cases of liquor piled in tiers to the left of the door on entering the store. Heretofore the lowest tier was in front and made the chance for piling a case and walking out comparatively easy and without detection, especially when the bartender's attention was engaged in waiting on a large number of customers. Yesterday, after missing the case of whiskey, the arrangement of the cases was changed by placing the lowest in the rear and the highest in front so it could be seen from the bar.

At about 9 o'clock ex-Chief of Police Norton, who is now engaged in the business as agent for Lockoff, was acting as bartender when he was apprised of the fact that an attempt was being made to get away with another case of liquor. In this instance, however, the liquor was Lash's Bitters. Norton hastened out and captured the men who proved to be soldiers of the Nineteenth Infantry. It is presumed the men were trying to lay in a supply for their campaign on the way to the maneuvers.

They were promptly arrested, but not without making some resistance. It was in an endeavor to break away from Norton that he fired a shot at the men that brought them to a standstill, and which also brought the police and Sheriff Belsucker on the scene.

The men were arraigned before Justice Sparks this morning and given the full limit of the law for petty larceny, namely: Fined \$39 and costs of prosecution each, and in default of the payment of said amount were committed to the county jail for the period of 33 days.

CONSTRUCTION WORK ON KING ROAD TO BEGIN IN SIXTY DAYS — WILLAMETTE VALLEY NOT KING RETURNS FROM CALIFORNIA—CROP SITUATION.

Salem, June 25.—That there will be a railroad built in the near future to connect Salem with Portland, and to be operated by electricity, now seems to be an assured fact. The company which proposes to construct the line is the Portland, Salem and Westside Railway company, which has been incorporated with a capital stock of \$500,000. The incorporators are Robert Ballentine, Charles Atherton and Frank Brewster, all of Portland. Mr. Ballentine is also the construction engineer of the road, and was in Salem yesterday looking over the field.

Mr. Ballentine said that if all went well, construction work would begin within 60 days. This company is backed by eastern capitalists, but Mr. Ballentine refused to disclose their identity. According to the engineer, the survey for this road was made five years ago and runs from south Portland southward across the Tualatin river, and will cross the Willamette river into Marion county near Butteville, thence running direct to Salem, making the run 48 miles, the shortest distance between the two cities.

The road will cross the Willamette river near Salem and go to Independence. The survey brings it into Salem along Front street, and the station will be at some point on that street, the most convenient part of the city. The right of way has not yet been secured, but agents of the road will begin work on that proposition at once and expect to experience no trouble from the farmers along the way. They will ask nothing from Salem except the right of way along the streets and terminal grounds. The work of construction is to be pushed as rapidly as possible, but will cost in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000, and as the intention is to make a permanent road bed, on which fast time can be made, at least 18 months will be required to complete it.

Mr. Ballentine stated that the company would only build one track at this time, which was sufficient to accommodate the business of the road for many years to come. He will ask for a 40-foot right of way. It is expected to have cars from Salem to Portland in one hour and thirty minutes. The fare will be \$1, or \$1.75 for the round trip. The company will also run freight cars on regular time and expects to make this a large part of their business. They will haul with farmers and handle grain or produce from any farm along the route.

Mr. Ballentine is a railroad man of 25 years' experience and his conservative talk gave an assurance that he meant business.

He was very reticent about talking and insisted that he was not a promoter sent out to talk, but was examining the survey already made, and after having traversed the entire route, was satisfied no additional survey was necessary and the plan entirely feasible.

A meeting of the Farmers of Liberty will be held in the office of Mayor Waters this afternoon, when the Citizens' Light and Power company will make a proposition for constructing a line to Lewis and Clark.

Hop King Returns.
Conrad Krebs, president of the Krebs Hop company and family, known as the hop king of Oregon, returned yesterday from a two weeks' trip in California. He went to visit his wife, who is spending the summer with her parents in Los Angeles.

Mr. Krebs is in California for his poor health and recently underwent an operation, but is now recovering. While Mr. Krebs was in California he made a study of crop conditions from San Diego and Los Angeles up through the Sacramento valley and in the great Riverside hop district. Speaking of his trip and observations Mr. Krebs said:

"On my trip I have visited the principal hop yards of California and I am optimistic of the crop, not as promising as last year, but better. At Wheatland and Sacramento the crop has suffered considerably from the heat and 12 days' north wind. At Sacramento, yards which would approximate 4,000 bales are under water, and there is no chance of a crop this year. The owners of hop yards adjoining the river have attempted to close the levees, but they have utterly failed. The new acreage in California cannot produce much, consequently with the best kind of weather from now on California cannot produce as many hops as last year."

"The wheat and barley crop of northern California is fair, but from San Francisco south to San Diego, inclusive, is very poor. Many of the farmers I have interviewed said that they will not get more than one-third to one-fourth of a crop. Thousands of acres of grain are being cut for hay."

"The orange and olive crop is good, but the price is below the cost of production. It might be safely stated that the average of crops of all kinds in California is one-third short. Of course the wheat, barley, and grapes, promising on account of the industry of the wealthy and retired capitalists of the east."

"For my part, give me Oregon for climate and farming."

WELL KNOWN FARMER RESIDING IN BEAVER CREEK COUNTRY WHILE DRIVING TO HIS HOME THROWN FROM WAGON AND HAS SKULL FRACTURED.

Oregon City, June 25.—F. F. Hatton, a well known farmer, residing in the Beaver creek country, while driving to his home yesterday afternoon, was thrown from his wagon by the horses running away and his skull fractured, resulting in his death about 4 o'clock this morning. He leaves a wife and three children. He was about 35 years old. Nothing can be learned as to the details of the accident as Mr. Hatton was alone. It is supposed that the horses became frightened while going down the Bygon hill and that they became unmanageable and the jolting of the wagon threw the driver out.

The first report that reached Oregon City was to the effect that a man by the name of Blum was killed also. This was a mistake, but Blum was in a runaway that did no damage and passed the spot where Hatton was lying, and in this way the injured man was found. He was taken home immediately, where he died this morning.

Graduation Exercises.
Last night in Shively's opera house was held the graduation exercises of the St. John's Catholic parochial school. The class graduated was the 19th grade and there were three graduates, Julia and Hattie Baker and Lewis Barry. Hattie Baker read the farewell poem and Julia Baker read an essay on the Panama canal. Lewis Barry read a very interesting essay on heat. The class address was given by Prof. A. B. O'Hara of Columbia university. The diplomas were presented by the principal of the school, the Rev. Father Gilhebrann. After the graduation exercises the pupils of St. John's gave a very enjoyable play, "The Fairies," that was appreciated by the large audience. The hall was tastefully decorated with school and national flags and flowers.

Fire at Wilsonville.
At Wilsonville last night fire broke out in the barn belonging to Charles Toose and spread rapidly to the house, and from there to the store building, and shortly after the valuable property was a heap of smoldering ruins on account of there being no adequate means for putting out the fire. The first report that reached Oregon City stated that fire had broken out on the Toose property and half the village of Wilsonville was burning. The property loss is about \$4,000 and it thought by friends of Toose in town that there was no insurance.

Will Meet in Jail.
William Flin and Ed Miller were haled yesterday before City Judge Bruce Curry for vagrancy and were fined \$5 each, and as they were unable to pay the money they were sent to the city jail for three days. Flin said that he was from Boston and had met Miller in Iowa and together they had decided on a tour of the western states. They said that they liked the country first rate and intended to locate here, but on account of being broke could do nothing at present.

Fireworks for Chautauque.
One of the features this year at Chautauque will be the closing night, when there will be a great display of fireworks. The secretary of the association, H. E. Cross, has advertised for bids for this work, and there will be special fireworks appropriate to Chautauque seasonally. The contract for the display was let to a man who lives in Aurora, by the name of William Kellig. He is a German and learned the trade of making fireworks in the old country. There will be 34 set pieces and there are rockets, Roman candles, fire balls, and other things, crackers by the bushel. This display will surpass anything that has been seen in years gone by.

The Mission Council Entertains.
At the Caulfield residence, on the bluff, last night Miss Edna and Clara Caulfield entertained with a lawn party. The yard and house were decorated with colored lanterns. In the early part of the evening old-fashioned games were played on the lawn that provided a great deal of fun. Dancing was the order of the entertainment of the evening, in which all joined and had a good time. Refreshments were served.

Crusade Against Saloon Pictorial.
There is on foot a movement among some of the Oregon City citizens to make an investigation of the saloons of this city and where a saloon is found that has a machine for showing obscene pictures in a peep-show there will be a remonstrance filed and the machine will be taken from the resort. The people interested in making the crusade said that one or two places were already known to have such means of entertainment in the saloons, and there would be a vigorous effort on their part to have the practice stopped.

Appointed to Roseburg Hatchery.
Word was received yesterday from Senator Mitchell in Washington that H. Leighton Kelly, who is now at the Baker lake station, in the United States fish commission service, had been appointed by the commissioner to fill the vacancy made by C. O. Finley, who is in charge of the Roseburg hatchery, on the Umpqua river.

OREGON CONFERENCE OF UNITED BRETHREN

Salem, Or., June 25.—The second day's session of the Oregon conference of the United Brethren in Christ began here yesterday morning at 8:10 o'clock, when Bishop Castle stepped to the chair and called the meeting to order.

After a brief song and prayer service Bishop Castle gave a second exposition on Ephesians 3, xiv-xvi. His theme for the morning was "Divine Inhabitation." For more than an hour he held the attention of the audience with his masterly presentation of his theme. This morning he gave the third and last of this series of expositions, from 8 to 9 o'clock.

Following this reports were again taken up. Reports of pastors were all by 11 o'clock, at which time the conference adjourned till 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

During the morning session Revs. A. R. and T. W. Williams of Nebraska were introduced to the conference.

At 2 o'clock Bishop Castle sounded the gavel and after a brief devotional exercise, led by Rev. Hawkins of the Minnesota conference, the business of the conference was resumed. Report on education was called for by which Prof. H. B. Emerick of Philomath college responded with a brief printed report. Following this an hour was spent in considering the interests of Philomath college. Five-minute addresses were had from each of the following:

"College Courses and Class Room Work at Philomath College," by Prof. H. B. Emerick; "Literary Societies at Philomath College," Rev. G. E. McDougald of Eugene, class of '02; "The Student Volunteer Band," by Prof. I. E. Caldwell; "The Chapel Hour at Philomath College," by Prof. Teresa McDougald of Eugene, class of '02; "The Philomath College," by Miss Minda Swabb, former student; "Influence of College Life on Character," by Miss Bessie Hastings, former student; "Philomath as an Ideal College Town," by Prof. E. E. Finley; "Added Equipment for Philomath College," by Rev. J. K. Parker, business manager.

In all the speeches not a discouraging note was sounded. Reference was made to the state prohibition oratorical contest, which was held at Philomath this year, in which Philomath college won second place. Some plans were started for increasing the income to the institution during the coming year.

The remainder of the afternoon session was spent in hearing reports of committees and discussions pertaining thereto. A motion was made that the two elders' districts be combined under the supervision of one elder. After a lengthy discussion the motion was carried. Elder Neff was reelected and will have charge of the combined districts. Rev. J. S. Rhoades preached the evening sermon.

PREPARING FOR COURT AT ALBANY

DISTRICT ATTORNEY HART OF DALLAS EXAMINES WITNESSES IN A NUMBER OF CASES FOR THE SHOOTING TERM—ACCUSED OF ASSAULT WITH DEADLY WEAPON.

Albany, Or., June 25.—District Attorney J. N. Hart of Dallas was in the city yesterday afternoon and examined witnesses in a number of criminal cases for the ensuing term of the circuit court. Among the cases under investigation is the charge against George Hughes of this city, who is accused of assault with a deadly weapon committed on election day upon Louis Maynard.

The trouble between the two men was over a team owned by the former and used by the latter in hauling about town a number of men who were said to have been more or less intoxicated, and when Hughes demanded possession of his team and same was refused him, he struck Maynard over the head with a scoop shovel. Maynard was in the hospital for a time but is now able to move about. It is possible that an indictment will be found but it will be somewhat difficult to convict the owner of the team on the charge.

Another case under investigation is that of Ira Cornett, who is charged with having forged the name of his brother-in-law to a check near Lebanon. The youth while awaiting his preliminary hearing, broke jail and escaped and is now believed to be in eastern Oregon. Should he be indicted he will be arrested and brought back for trial. He is said to be a hard character and his arrest is likely to furnish another sensation.

INSANITY WILL NOT BE GUGLIEMO'S PLEA

John F. Logan has been retained as associate counsel with Dan R. Murphy in the defense of Frank Guglielmo for the murder of Freda Garacio. The trial begins Tuesday. Logan acted as attorney for the prisoner in the settlement of his father's estate and in other civil matters.

It is learned that temporary insanity will not be the plea of the murderer. The combined endeavors of counsel will be to show that the deed was committed in the heat of passion and therefore lacked the element of malice and premeditation making it a first degree offense.

Tom Word, sworn in as a deputy by Sheriff Storey, Wednesday, served a number of subpoenas on witnesses in the case yesterday. He desires a practical knowledge of the affairs of the office before taking its duties on himself.

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
