

MRS. FRAZIER SEEN AT OREGON CITY

WITH HER SISTER AND FOLLOWED BY BLACK DOG, SHE INQUIRED OF CAPTAIN GRAHAM BEST ROUTE TO NEWBERG AND LEAVES IN THAT DIRECTION.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Oregon City, June 27.—Mrs. C. W. Frazier, who suddenly left her home in Newberg, was seen here yesterday. She had her bicycle with her and was followed by her black dog. She was seen early yesterday morning by Capt. A. B. Graham of the Oregon City Police Department and was immediately recognized. She asked if there was any boat going to Newberg and seemed disappointed when she learned that there was not. She seemed to be acting a little strange, but evidently wanted to get back to Newberg, where her friends are anxious for her return.

Mrs. Frazier left her home at Newberg about 4 o'clock on the afternoon of June 24. That afternoon a married daughter was invited to a dinner that was to be held at the house. Mrs. Frazier left shortly before and there was no suspicion aroused that she would not be back soon. She took her wheel and dog with her and when she did not return a search was made for her.

She was reported to be seen at Rex, which is four miles from Newberg, riding on her wheel. The Portland police were notified but did not learn anything of her whereabouts. She probably rode all the way to Portland and from there to this place. She inquired from Captain Graham the best way to Newberg and she was directed to the road across the river and probably arrived home some time yesterday afternoon.

Street Drains Sanitary.
Drains on Center street are being put down in a sanitary condition as far as possible, and the law in this respect is being complied with. It was thought at first that sewer gas might be coming from the sewer to the streets, and from there to the open air. The drains run to a catchbasin, which in turn empties into the sewer. In all sewers there is an opening left at the manhole so that some of the gas can escape, and as the sewers on Center street are constructed in this manner, this was what gave occasion to the talk that the work was not being done properly. The air is allowed to escape so that there could be no explosion in the sewer. In a properly constructed sewer there is no gas and the air is allowed to escape. Gas does not arise from a sewer unless there is an obstruction.

F. P. Hutton Buried.
One of the largest funerals ever held in the county was held yesterday at Stone, when F. P. Hutton, who was killed in a runaway accident Saturday, was buried from the Christian church. Mr. Hutton was a well-known farmer and had a large acquaintance throughout the county. The services were conducted by the Rev. G. P. Rich of Kelso, and the interment took place in Arthur Prairie cemetery.

Farmers from all over the county drove in their wagons to Stone to attend the services and afterward followed the remains to the grave.

County Recorder Henry Stevens met with a serious and painful accident to his foot. He was splitting wood at his home in Milwaukie, when he missed a blow and the ax struck his foot, cutting a deep gash that bled freely. He was brought to Oregon City and the wound dressed by Dr. J. M. Lowe. He was away from the office this morning, but is reported improving.

Cleaning Up Oregon City.
Oregon City is having a brushing-up and scrubbing-down, as bright women are getting more presentable every day. The city council at the last meeting ordered that the street commissioner remove some of the eyesores that have been intruding themselves on the public gaze for many years, and this is being

done. The old houses along the railroad track are being torn down and Seventh street from the Southern Pacific station to the river bank will be cleaned up and the brush on the river bank and underneath the suspension bridge will be cleared out. The town will be put in shape for the critical eyes of visitors and now is a good time for the Women's League and Clark club to make some of its wants known to the city while the cleaning fever is on.

COWLITZ COUNTY HAY AND FRUIT OUTLOOK

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Kalama, Wash., June 27.—The continuous dry weather on the strawberry crop a little short this season, but the quality in a great measure made good the loss. The season is practically over and the results quite satisfactory.

The cherry season is just beginning and the crop is much better than was expected early in the season. The Royal Ann variety, while not as full of fruit as usual, are of a most excellent quality, the continuous sunshine bringing out the beautiful red color and ripening them to perfection. The cherries on the low lands are ripe and are being put on the market in large quantities at good prices.

The late fruit and vegetables are needing rain badly, no rain of any consequence having fallen since the first of May. The upland hay is good and is being cut and cured rapidly. The low lands that overflow from the Columbia will probably not produce any hay this year on account of having been under water for over three months.

The dairy farmers along the river depend on the wild grass that grows on the overflooded lands for their winter's hay and it is feared their supply will be cut short this year.

Several forest fires were visible yesterday from here, only one appearing to do much damage, that being just back of Columbia City. The water in the small streams is lower than ever before known at this season of the year, and the down timber and other combustible material in the forests are dry as tinder and a danger from destructive fires is very great.

The local fire wardens are doing everything possible to prevent fires from being started, as under the present climatic conditions control after once started, would be impossible.

ROSEBURG TO HAVE NEW ARMORY BUILDING

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Roseburg, Or., June 27.—Company D, Oregon National Guard, of this place, is going to have a new armory, though the one proposed a few months ago fell through. The lodge of Elks of this city is going to erect a brick building of two stories, the upper to be used as a lodge room and the lower as an armory for the local militia men. Most of the stock from which funds will be obtained for the building will be subscribed by the local members as there are nearly 325 men in the organization.

The Macabees also are going to build a hall in the form of a two-story brick building here and with several other proposed brick buildings the town will not be so badly crowded for space for business enterprises.

Ross and his wife were drifting down stream in a skiff and before approaching a rapid she landed to walk around. Her husband started to ride over the perilous waters and was seen by his wife riding on the bottom of the overturned craft. He was soon out of her sight and the skiff was picked up, fanned down stream, but Ross was missing.

WILL WAGE LIQUOR WAR AT VANCOUVER

MEMBERS OF W. C. T. U. TAKE STEPS TO SECURE EVIDENCE AGAINST SALOONS REGARDING ALLEGED VIOLATION OF CITY ORDINANCES.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Vancouver, Wash., June 27.—Last night the members of the W. C. T. U. took steps to secure evidence against the saloons of the city of Vancouver regarding their alleged violation of the law and city ordinances. It is said that a committee, or committees, visited every saloon in the city and found them all wide open, excepting one. It is the intention of the W. C. T. U. to endeavor to prosecute this case to the uttermost limits with a view, if possible, to close the saloons entirely. It is the hope and desire of the organization that in this instance it will be possible to get a decree of the court annulling the licenses of every one against whom the action is brought and proved.

Several of the members claim that the organization has on several other occasions procured evidence of the violation of the closing law since the last successful prosecution, but that the matter was laid over at the time by the authorities on account of politics which was taking up the undivided attention of the officers.

It was well understood, it is stated, between the prosecuting attorney and the agents of the W. C. T. U. that the matter was laid over at the time by the county convention, partly with the hope of incurring the favor of the saloon element in securing the renomination of certain officials against whom a spirited fight was finally made.

It is now the hope of the members that a vigorous prosecution will be made of the several cases already commenced, as well as such others as may be begun before the present prosecuting attorney's term expires; and they all claim they will not rest until several, if not all, the saloons are closed by an order of the court, if it is possible for the organization to secure such order.

Selling Liquor Without License.
The county of Clark is spotted with "blind pigs" and other methods of dispensing liquor without a license. At least this is a report that has from time to time been circulated without not all the saloons are closed by the claim, at least the offenders could be prosecuted.

It is said, however, that Donald McMaisters, the prosecuting attorney, has not been idle in endeavoring to learn for a certainty just who the violators of this law are, and with positive evidence in one's pocket will not hesitate to prosecute the offenders.

August Herring is the first man to be brought before the court of justice for this offense. Herring runs a general merchandise store at Eureka, and has a flourishing trade. Among other merchandise he also dispenses "liquid hardware" by the bottle, and for so doing was arrested on complaint of James Pluss, who went into his store for the express purpose of purchasing the liquor. Information has been filed before the superior court and Herring will be prosecuted at the next January term of that court, unless he pleads guilty and gets the matter over with before then.

Herring has little to say about the matter beyond stating that he sold the liquor in that form under advice of an attorney that he believed he was within the limit of the excise law by selling the liquor in original packages, and it may be the case will be fought out along this line.

The whisky, Herring claims, was sold in sealed bottles just as he procured it from the manufacturers out of bond, excepting that the bottles were shipped to him in boxes.

In the meantime, however, the matter is in statu quo, Herring having given bond for his appearance before the court at its next session.

Lancaster-Packard Nuptials.
Miss Grace L. Packard of Eugene, Or., was married last evening to John E. Lancaster of Portland at the office of J. H. Elwell, justice of the peace, J. E. Harris officiating. The groom is a real estate dealer of Portland, and also having large business interests in eastern and southern Oregon.

Owing to the fact that Marie M. Beals has been consorting with other men and became an inmate of disreputable houses in Portland, her husband, John

G. Beals sued for a divorce. The case was tried before Judge A. L. Miller last Saturday, when the facts above stated were proven to the satisfaction of the court and the prayer of his complaint granted. There are no children as the issue of said marriage, neither is there any community property.

MUST ANSWER TO CHARGE OF MURDER

LOUIE VIVETTE, ACCUSED OF KILLING L. B. SAUNDERS, HOP GROWER OF BUTTEVILLE, TO HAVE HEARING AT WOODBURN BEFORE JUSTICE OF THE PEACE.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, June 27.—Louie Vivette was arrested in Portland on Saturday evening charged with the murder of L. B. Saunders, a prominent hop dealer of Butteville, last winter, and was yesterday brought to Salem by Marshal Amos Beach and lodged in the Marion county jail. The accused was formerly a resident of St. Paul in Marion county, and is well known by the residents of Butteville. He will be given a hearing before Justice of the Peace H. Overton in Woodburn on Tuesday afternoon.

Justice Overton and several deputies, attracted by the offer of a reward, have been working on the case for several months, and now believe they have the right man.

Saunders was found dead on the morning of November 19, 1933, with a bullet hole in his head over the left ear. A .44-caliber Colt's revolver was lying by his side as though he had committed suicide, but investigation proved that the gun had not been fired and the coroner's inquest decided he had been murdered by some unknown hand.

He left home the previous evening with \$200 in his possession, and after paying bills amounting to \$150, spent the remainder of the night playing cards in Strain's saloon with L. O. Strain, Carney W. Whitely and John McIntire, losing about \$4. When found next morning there was \$6 cents in his pocket, showing conclusively that there had been a robbery as well as a murder.

Although his name was not at that time brought out, it has since developed that Louie Vivette was also in the saloon that night, and left before Saunders. A handkerchief was found near, and it is thought if Vivette is guilty, he attempted to hold up Saunders while wearing the handkerchief as a mask, and after Saunders had jerked the cover from his face, he had committed the murder to escape detection, as he is well known in the neighborhood.

He has been working as deck hand on a river steamer and was taken into custody by the Portland police on his arrival in that city Saturday on information furnished by detectives. On the January session of the county court \$500 was offered for the arrest and conviction of the guilty party.
