

GOVERNOR ISSUES PROCLAMATIONS

Local Option Liquor Law and Direct Primary Nominating Election Law Are Now Declared to Be in Full Force and Effect.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., June 28.—Governor Chamberlain has issued a proclamation declaring that the votes cast for the local option liquor law and the direct primary nominating election law had been canvassed by the secretary of state in his presence and had received the necessary votes to become laws, and declaring them in full force from this date.

The proclamation covering the local option liquor law reads:
"Whereas, There was submitted to the electors of the state at the last general election, as required by law, an initiative petition for a local-option liquor law; and,
"Whereas, On the 24th day of June, 1904, the secretary of state, in my presence, as governor of the state of Oregon, did canvass the votes given for said law; and,
"Whereas, It was ascertained and determined upon such canvass that there were 56,285 votes cast for said direct primary nominating election law, and 16,354 votes against the same, and that said law received an affirmative majority of the total number of effective votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provisions of law,
"Now, therefore, I, George E. Chamberlain, as governor of the state of Oregon, in obedience to section 9 of an act entitled 'An act making effective the initiative and referendum provisions of section 1 of article 4 of the constitution of the state of Oregon, and regulating elections thereunder, and providing penalties for violations of provisions of this act,' approved February 24, 1904, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the state of Oregon, and do announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast in the state of Oregon for said local-option liquor law was 43,516 votes, and the whole number of votes cast in the state against said local-option liquor law was 40,198 votes, and that said local-option liquor law received an affirmative majority of the total number of votes cast on said measure and entitled to be counted under the provisions of law, and that said local-option liquor law shall be and is in full force and effect as the law of the state from the date of this proclamation."

"Done at the Capitol at Salem this 24th day of June, A. D. 1904."

WHITE HOUSE IS BUT A MEMORY

FAMOUS RESORT COMPLETELY DESTROYED BY FIRE LAST NIGHT AND CROWDS OF CURIOUS VISITORS VIEW THE RUINS IN SEARCH OF SOUVENIRS.

In two brief hours last night fire completely destroyed the White House, the celebrated resort six miles south of the city on the Willamette river. Blackened foundations and charred timbers are the only remnants of the place that for years has been a favored pleasure resort of Portland.

The fire started in the attic, from a defective flue, it is said. The moss-covered roof and dry material of which the building was constructed were fine food for the flames which, in 15 minutes, had wrapped a crimson mantle over the entire structure. There was no opposition to the flames other than the spasmodic efforts of a few attaches of the place. Their efforts were undirected and of no avail.

The house was situated on the west bank of the river, alongside the White House road. A dense forest stretches to the roadway while to the south and north of the house there was a magnificent view of the Willamette. The country for miles around was illuminated by the fire last night. It was plainly seen from the city.

A gust of wind seized burning embers and tiny sparks and cast them spitting upon the water. Pieces of burning wood were also tossed into the forest by the breeze. No damage was done, however. Two young men who were at the place were the first to discover the fire and hastened to warn John Barry, manager of the house.

All the employees of the place were called but their work was futile. Seeing that the building was doomed the men endeavored to save the fixtures and stock of liquor, cigars and other articles with which the house was provided. There was soon a number of helpers.

A gang of railroad laborers soon arrived and in a few minutes there was a hurrying crowd which did the best it could to save the liquor. Large quantities of it were saved and contributed largely to making a gala event of the conflagration.

The house was owned by H. C. Leonard and was valued at \$17,000. It was insured to the amount of \$5,000. It is said that a syndicate of members of the Portland club intended to acquire the property in a short time. It is also said that numbers of others had planned to secure the place and several short-lived options have been held upon it within the past few months.

The place has been the scene of many incidents of interest and it has so long been a favorite resort of city people that an element of almost legendary romance lingers about the ruins. Great crowds of people went to the place last night and today.

NO RELIEF FROM WANDERING HERDS

RESIDENTS ON FOURTEENTH STREET SUFFER FROM STRAY CATTLE AND SHEEP WHO DESTROY LAWNS AND FLOWER BEDS.

The following communication appears to voice the complaint of a number of residents of Fourteenth street, who have suffered much annoyance from the practice of driving herds of sheep and cattle through the street:

To the Editor of The Journal—In common with many of my neighbors on Fourteenth street, I have suffered much annoyance from the sheep and cattle that are driven almost daily past my home. The street is the chosen thoroughfare for driving stock from the stockyards to the packing houses in south Portland. It frequently happens that animals stray from the herd and wander over the lawns, destroying flowers and shrubbery. Clouds of dust are raised by the herds as they pass and the nuisance has become intolerable. Have we no redress?

A RESIDENT OF FOURTEENTH STREET.

The foregoing complaint seems to have substantial foundation. Fourteenth street south of Washington is wholly a residence street and many of the homes have handsome lawns with beautiful flowers and shrubbery. Many of these places have no fence and so are open to the invasion of passing cattle. Hundreds of sheep and cows are driven every month from the stockyards at the north end of Fourteenth street to the packing plant on the Macdonald road in south Portland. It has become the practice to drive these herds along Fourteenth street. Sometimes as many as two or three hundred head of cattle are taken in a single herd, and though accompanied by several herders it is not always easy to confine the animals to the streets.

When a steer or a sheep falls out of the ranks, it seems to be irresistibly attracted by the green lawns and blossoming flowers which line the street. A Marechal Neil or an American Beauty is as ruthlessly devoured as anything else and before the trespassing animal can be shooed from the premises it has usually done serious damage. Quite as much annoyance is caused by the dense clouds of dust raised by the herds as they pass, and this is especially troublesome during the summer months.

But the city ordinances seem to provide no relief from the nuisance. Within a narrow district the driving of cattle is prohibited except at night, but Fourteenth street lies beyond the pale and does not come within the protected section. Section 22 of ordinance No. 14,049 is as follows:

"That no person or persons shall drive or cause to be driven, any cattle, except milch cows, through any public streets north of Hall street, east of Ninth street and north of Tenth street, and south of Flanders street, except Jefferson street and Front and North Front streets, between the hours of 6 in the morning and 12 at night. Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction thereof before the municipal court, be punished by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50, or by imprisonment in the city jail not less than three nor more than 25 days."

Apparently the only redress for the residents of Fourteenth street lies in securing an amendment of the ordinance, extending the western boundary of the district in which cattle-driving is prohibited. Any such amendment would doubtless encounter the opposition of the stock yards and of the south Portland packers.

FORTUNES MADE IN TIDELANDS

REMARKABLE RISE IN VALUE OF LOTS ON MUDDY SWAMPS SOMETHING OF A MYSTERY—TOTALS OF PURCHASES AND TRANSFERS AGGREGATE MILLIONS.

Seattle, June 28.—The startling movement in Seattle tidelands continues, and the moving force is still something of a mystery, though it is generally supposed that the heavy purchases are in the interests of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway. John Leary, one of the wealthiest men in Seattle, has just closed a deal selling a block for \$34,000, and together the purchases of lands on the tidelands aggregate many blocks. An option is pending on the property of the Station & Post Mill company for \$750,000, and there is another transfer of \$150,000. The totals run into the millions.

In spite of the denial of President Earling that the Milwaukee is not buying terminal grounds in the west, the general belief is that the purchases are intended in the interests of the road when it builds westward. It would pass through an at present unoccupied territory a good part of the way, and a territory, railway officials declare, that could be made to pay for every foot of track within a few years.

But the close alliance of the Milwaukee system to the Harriman lines makes it questionable among railroad men that the Milwaukee needs to build all the way to the coast from Chamberlain, S. D., for traffic arrangements of the most satisfactory kind might be made without any difficulty. So there is a belief that it is in reality the Union Pacific that is planning to come to Seattle and Tacoma. Harriman recently said he in-
