SEE "BETSY ROSS AND THE BIRTH OF OUR FLAG" IN FIFTH STREET WINDOW—THE FLAG; A SET OF HISTORY.
The Continental Congress, by resolution of June 14, 1777, at Philadelphia, authorized the creation of the United States flag. It was there resolved the flag of the 13 colonies be 13 alternate stripes, red and white, the red for the army, representing daring and defiance, the white denoting purity and in deference to the floating batteries. Thirteen stars on a blue field representing a new constellation. The idea emanated from the beautiful constellation Lyra, signifying harmony. The blue field was suggested by the edges of the banner of the Covenanters and had particular significance to the league and covenant against oppressing and involving the virtues of vigilance, perseverance and justice. The whole was a blending of the various flags previous to the flag of the union. General Washington, with a committee of Congress, waited upon Mrs. John ("Betsy") Ross, who lived at 229 Arch street, Philadelphia, a milliner of those times, who received them in her back parlor. There she engaged and started to make the first American flag from a drawing submitted in pencil from General George Washington. In that same humble back parlor the flag that rules the world today was completed. The scene is hinted at in one of our Fifth street windows. Bring the children to see it—imbue in them the love of the flag. Let Old Glory wave over every home during the Mardi Gras and Glorious Fourth. Let the strangers who visit our city during the next 10 days be impressed with her Americanism. The eyes of America are upon Oregon today—keep them focused on the Flag.
