IN ANNUAL SESSION

The annual synod of the Pacific coast district of the Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran church of America held its opening session yesterday in First church, East Tenth and Grant streets. Rev. J. C. Foss, president of the district, presided. The opening sermon was delivered by Rev. O. Gransburg of San Francisco. O. M. Holden was chosen secretary of the conference.

The present's annual address, delivered in the afternoon, showed that great progress had been made in the dedication of churches and in the increase in membership. There were three sessions daily, from 9 to 12 in the morning, from 2:30 to 5 in the afternoon and from 7 to 9 in the evening. This morning Rev. C. M. Holden read a paper on "Conversion." Prof. N. J. Hang, president of Pacific Lutheran academy, is attending the synod to report the meetings for the Norwegian papers.

NICOLA VALLEY HAS COAL OIL

Reports from Nicola, Southern British Columbia, say Petroleum has been struck.

The latest reports from Nicola, southern British Columbia, are to the effect that petroleum of the very highest and best grade has been struck on Coldwater river. Letters received from Nicola last week say that great oil and quality exist and that capitalists from England, eastern Canada and the United States are eagerly seeking investment in Nicola coal and oil land, now that the Canadian Pacific and the Great Northern have bonded and secured all available coal land there and agreed to pay a high price for this land. Mrs. Pooley's big farm has been sold, and many other ranchers have bonded their land to the Standard Oil company and the Canadian Pacific officials.

A gentleman in this city interested in the Nicola coal and oil lands received two letters from there last week, which conveyed this good news. The Great Northern has already started the construction of the V. V. & B. railroad from Grand Forks, B. C., and is building west, and their road comes down Coldwater river from Princeton to Cooten, Nicola lake and Quilchena basin. Four diamond drills have recently been hauled in from Spencer's bridge to be used in exploring for coal and oil in Nicola, and development on a big scale is expected this season.

Several Portland people are interested in Nicola coal stock, and this will certainly be good news to them. The quantity of coal in the Nicola and Quilchena basins has been proven to be enormous and almost inexhaustible, and the quality is superior to any coal known west of the Rocky mountains. It is a high-class bituminous coal, for steam and domestic use unexcelled, and fully equal to the famous Crow Nest for coke. Preparations are now being made by several companies to have their mines equipped and ready to produce coal as soon as the railroad is there. The Canadian Pacific railway line from Spencer's bridge to Nicola lake is expected to be completed by next spring. No doubt a big boom is imminent in the Nicola valley, with its exhaustless riches in coal, oil, iron and copper, and all those who have secured properties there or have become interested are sure to be making big money on their investment.
