

COLLEGE ATHLETIC CHAMPIONS OF OREGON

Champions of a state where champions by the score are made, the members of the Pacific University track team today occupy the front rooms in the hearts of every alumni and former student of the Forest Grove college. A series of matches, in which a number of whirlwind victories were gained, with the colleges and universities of the state placed the crack athletes of old Pacific away in the lead of the procession.

Three of the great victories won during the 1904 season by the track men of the Pacific University were taken from the Columbia University of this city, from the University of Oregon at Eugene and the Oregon Agricultural college of Corvallis. Great were the surprises that were in store for the students of these three schools that were to know the prowess of the Pacific men. It was thought by the Eugene student-body that perhaps the Congregationalists might win one or two points in the meet, but their winning the event by a score of 48 to 49, caused a great increase in the heart-failure cases at the University of Oregon.

The other two victories by the men of Pacific also caused a few remarks of the didn't-know-it-was-loaded order. "Just wait until we get a whack at the Congregationalists," the Farmers were wont to say. On Monday, May 30, they got their "whack." The score was 14 to 51, and the colors of old Pacific floated from the masthead. Owing to the fact that many of the best men in the Columbia University track team were unable to take part in the dual meet with Pacific, the latter won by a score of 58 to 26.

In the last-named meet, Fredell of

Pacific made 20 of the 33 points won, he winning the 84, 100 and 220 yard dashes and the running broad jump. In this meet Philbrook, P. U., threw the discus 93.7 feet; his throw in the meet on May 30 was 108 feet 3 inches. The 330-yard run was won by Fletcher, P. U., in 2:05 time; in the meet with O. A. C. he ran the same distance in 2 minutes 4 2/5 seconds; Fletcher also won the 120-yard hurdle from the Columbia men, his time being 6:13 2/5. Gates, P. U., won the mile runs in both the Columbia and O. A. C. meets, in the latter contest he having trotted the distance in 4 minutes 51 2/5 seconds. Peterson won the quarter mile race against Columbia.

In the match with the fleet and strong men of the Oregon Agricultural college, Gilbert won the 120-yard hurdle, as well as the pole vault; Peterson won the broad jump, Barnet the hammer throw and Frideaux the 220-yard hurdle.

The meet with the Oregon Agricultural college was said by many to be the most exciting during the season that has just closed. Every man, woman and child within 20 miles around went to Forest Grove to see the victory. The town was gaily decked with colors and the small boy was just as happy as he must be on circus day. But it was at the fall of eventide when the noise broke loose. The score was 14 to 51, and Pacific had the 74. In the meet P. U. took 9 firsts, 7 seconds and 3 thirds, while O. A. C. won 5 firsts, 7 seconds and 1 thirds.

The students of the Pacific University give great credit for the track team victories to Trainer McCoughren of Palo Alto.
