HURDLE RACING—By H. L. HILLMAN JR.



HOW TO TAKE A HURDLE AND LAND IN ONE'S STRIDE

(Copyright, 1934, by W. R. Hearst.) HURDLE racing is one of the events in athletics which finds its greatest popularity with the young athlete, who is full of snap and energy.

While it is hard to lay down any absolute rules in order to secure success as a hurdler, owing to the diversity of styles used by the athletes in starting and negotiating the hurdles, there is much in a general way which all must observe if they expect ever to lead at the tape in this class of sport.

The correct way to clear the hurdle is to take off well away from it and draw up the opposite foot from which you spring, which is usually the left, so that it passes over the hurdle first and is ready to put to the ground for another stride as soon as you are over.

The opening event of the local racing season was the showing of Portland's pony traps and single traps. There were quite a number of entries in both of these contests, and the horses which were given first prize by the judges also won this place in the hearts of those present.

Of the several pretty turn-outs for the first prize in the single trap show, the judges quickly decided that this honor be awarded to the rig driven by Mrs. E. B. Gase, whose horse, Cray, was said by many present to be one of the prettiest animals ever exhibited at the Irvington track; great was the applause of the audience when the judges announced that Mrs. Gase was the winner of this event.

The second prize was awarded to Mrs. Jonathan Bourne's rig, drawn by her famous horse, Monroe Howard.

Many handsome rigs were entered for the trophy offered as the first prize for the prettiest pony trap exhibited. The two best Shetlands, Molly and Maud, owned by Mrs. E. M. Rosenthal, were awarded first prize. A single trap owned by Master Edward Curtis, Cray drove his pony Dollar, was given the second prize.

The second event of the meet was the 2:40 trot, a mile dash, for the Oregon Progressive Alliance cup. The cup was won by Springfield, who was driven by his owner, Richard Durkin. All the horses entered in this race were driven by their owners. Following Springfield was A. C. Lohmire's Swiftwater Bill, M. Croft's Bass, F. C. Higeman's Beesie B., and W. G. Eaton's Easy Money.
