

DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM CAUSES BATTLE OF THE "WAR HORSES"

don't like the imputation made by the gentleman.

"Then I'll withdraw my words and say I'm glad to see you so frank," quickly responded Bryan.

The vote on the plank resulted in a decisive victory for Bryan as the resolutions committee eliminating the subcommittee plank declaring the financial question out of politics, decided to leave the question of a satisfactory financial plank to a subcommittee headed by Bryan, Williams and Hill.

On the income-tax plank Bryan received a setback. Hill opposed him and the proposed plank was withdrawn. Though the subject may be renewed in his fight for the reaffirmation of the Kansas City platform, Bryan was ignominiously routed.

In the trust and tariff planks Bryan won a notable victory by securing the adoption of amendments which make the declarations more emphatic and strictly in conformity with the Nebraska platform.

On the trust plank Bryan's proposition for prosecutions was incorporated by a vote of 23 to 20.

On the labor plank he and ex-Governor Charles S. Thomas of Colorado stood together for an amendment covering the Colorado labor situation. There is no specific reference to Colorado, but the declaration guarantees the right of the laboring man to work when and where he will, but declaring that there shall be no infliction of punishment save by due process of law.

One of the early morning events was the defeat of a plank demanding for liberal appropriations for increasing the navy.

At 5:30 o'clock the statehood plank was perfected, demanding separate statehood for Arizona and New Mexico, and statehood for Oklahoma and Indian territory, without specifying whether such statehood be granted separately or jointly.

Committee in a Snarl.

Shortly before 9 o'clock word came from the committee room that the trust plank had been taken up again and that the committeemen were in another snarl.

A trust plank had been settled upon earlier in the morning, but a resolution was ordered which made it compulsory for corporations before doing business in another state to file a statement to the effect that they did not intend to monopolize. These resolutions brought a new wrangle.

Tillman left the committee room at 9 o'clock, saying: "They are at the trust plank again, and the platform will be a mile long. Hill and Bryan knifed each other terribly. It was awful. Hill is trying to prevent Bryan from presenting a minority report to the convention to preclude the right there. Hill has kept remarkably cool. I am tired of all their talk and am not going back. Hill and Bryan have been saving this spleen for years, and now that they have let it out they will get along better together."

Member Stickney of Wyoming, coming from the committee room said Bryan and Hill had clashed rather bitterly. Hill's suave and wonderful cleverness as a manager impressed Stickney, who said that the committee reminded him of a lot of excited geese. "Actually, I couldn't tell what they were talking about when I left," said Stickney.

Balley said it might not complete its labors for many hours.

Regulating Trust Traffic.

At 10 o'clock word from the committee room said that for the first time since early this morning the platform-makers showed some indication of reaching a definite conclusion. A trust plank, which was almost unanimously adopted, declares against interstate traffic in trust-made articles.

It is authoritatively stated that the platform will not have a money plank nor an income tax plank. It is a basis of a compromise between Hill and Bryan. Probably there will be no minority report, Bryan being thus satisfied.

This afternoon Hill was asked by a delegate: "What are Parker's views on the income tax and the gold plank?" "Don't know," replied Hill.

"Well, if you don't, who in hell does," demanded his interlocutor. Hill made no answer.

When asked a question concerning the platform, Bryan said to the Scripps News association representative: "I have no more to say than my report. The platform is not what any one of us wanted, but it is such as we can all stand on."

On the same subject, Hill said: "The report will be unanimous. Of course there are some things we would like to have had in the platform that are not there, but everybody is for the platform now."

Hill and Bryan Together.

Hill and Bryan came out of the committee room together shortly after noon, both smiling to the throng of newspaper men. Bryan saluted Hill platform in right.

Hill seemed disturbed at the reference, but Bryan laughed heartily. Former Congressman Hearst of Missouri said: "Everything is now harmonious and Hill has made many additional friends because of his great efforts to bring about harmony."

The Platform.

"We, the delegates of the Democratic party of the United States, in national convention assembled, declare our devotion to the essential principles of the Democratic faith which brings us together in party communion."

"Under them, local self-government and national unity and prosperity were established. They underlie our independence, the structure of our free republic, and every democratic extension from Louisiana to California and Texas to Oregon, which preserved faithfully in all the states the tie between taxation and representation. They yet inspire the masses of our people, guarding jealously their rights and liberties, and cherishing their fraternity, peace and orderly development. They remind us of our duties and responsibilities as citizens and represent them, particularly at this time, the necessity of reform and the rescue of the administration of government from the headstrong, arbitrary and spasmodic methods which distract business by uncertainty and pervade the public mind with dread, distrust and perturbation."

of all citizens; the right of trial by jury; freedom of the person defended by the writ of habeas corpus; liberty of personal contract untrammelled by sumptuary laws; the supremacy of the civil over the military; a well-disciplined militia; the separation of church and state; economy in expenditures; low taxes, that labor may be lightly burdened; the prompt and sacred fulfillment of private obligations; fidelity to treaties; peace and friendship with a non-entangling alliance with none; adequate acquiescence in the will of the majority—the vital principles of republics. These are doctrines which Democracy has established as precepts of the nation and should be constantly invoked, preached and enforced:

Economical Administration.

"First—Large reductions can readily be made in the annual expenditures of the government without impairing the efficiency of any branch of the public service, and we shall insist upon the strictest economy and frugality compatible with vigorous and efficient civil, military and naval administration as a right of the people too clear to be denied or withheld."

Jeffersonian Simplicity.

"We believe that one of the best methods of procuring economy and honesty in the public service is to have public officials return as nearly as may be possible to Jeffersonian simplicity of living."

"Third—We favor the nomination and election of a president, trained in the ways of the constitution, who shall place his face sternly against corruption of legislation and judicial functions, whether veiled under the guise of executive construction of existing laws, or whether it take refuge in the assertion of superior wisdom."

Against Tariff for Trusts.

"Fourth—The Democratic party has been, and will continue to be, the consistent opponent of that class of tariff legislation which certain individuals have been permitted, through congressional favor, to draw a heavy tribute from the American people."

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"Sixth—We favor the reduction of the tariff by the foreign goods of the masses and for the commonwealth, and not by the friends of its abuses, its extortions and its discriminations, keeping in view the ultimate end of equality of burdens and equality of opportunity to the citizen."
