### Pretty Display of Japanese Art.

In the Japanese art display at Wood-ard, Clarke & Co.'s there has been re-cently received a very choice collection of what is known as eggshell incquer in boxes of various designs and sizes, each one in itself portraying the remarkable mechanical skill, artistic ideas and un-limited patience of the Japanese people, who are now becoming famous in a more

To people who are unfamiliar with what is known as lacquer, a word as to its meaning may be of interest. Lacquer is the name of a juice which is taken by incision from the lacquer tree, growing luxuriantly in Japan and portions of China. After incision these portions of the tree are cut into two-foot lengths, and after scaking in water are cut into smaller pieces and the lacquer scraped away.

The foundation for lacquer-ware is a soft wood, usually magnolia, which is highly polished with pumice-stone or charcoal, and the different layers of lacquer applied by a successive drying and polishing, treated finally with a coat of raw varnish and the same finished with decorating and coloring in gold, pearl, eggshell and other ideas peculiar to the artist, the whole requiring weeks and even months for completion of each piece.
