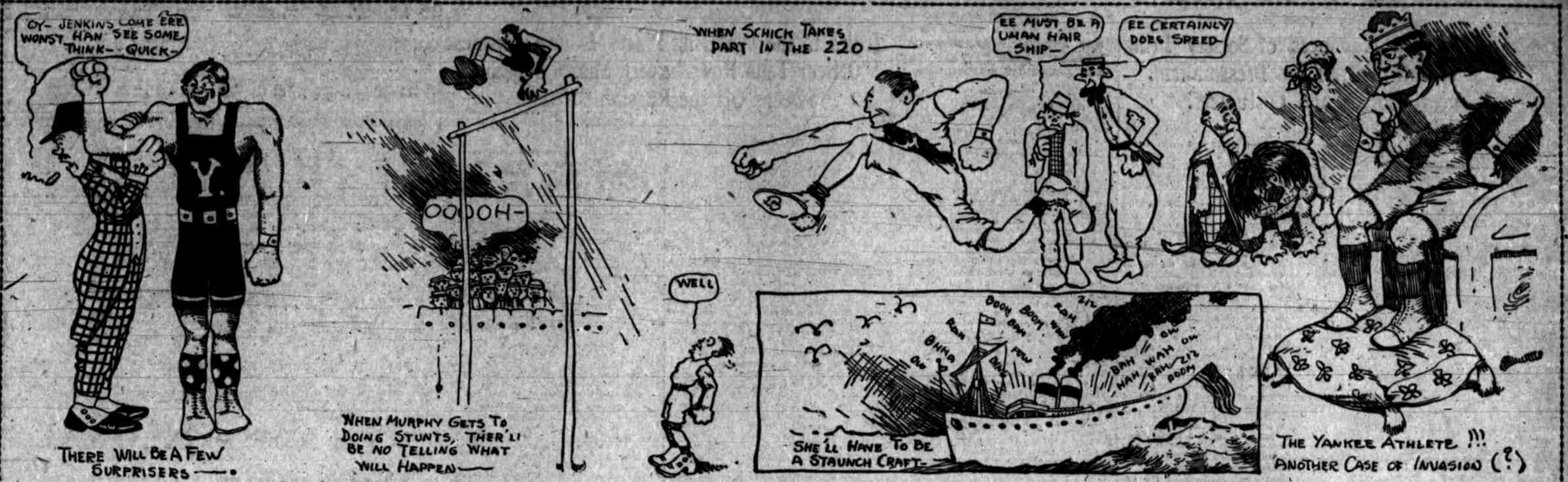


PORTLAND BROWNS WIN A SUNDAY GAME

TELEGRAM PLAYERS QUIT WHEN AHEAD

JOURNAL MEN, MARCHING BACK TO MAKE A GARRISON FINISH, GET A BRUCK WHEN THEIR OPPONENTS DROP OUT AT THE END OF THE SECOND INNING.

The Telegram Linotype ball rollers won yesterday afternoon from The Journal Mergerthalers by the score of 13 to 8, at a picnic given by the Ladies' Auxiliary of Multnomah Typographical Union No. 58, at Margone's Park. The contest was a careful and scientific exposition of the national pastime, but the outcome was not satisfactory. The Journal men started out with the impression that the game would last nine innings, and owing to the excessive heat and natural tendencies toward their brother craftsmen, decided that they would remain about four or five runs behind their opponents until the last inning, when they would make a Garrison finish. The Telegram men took advantage of the situation by deliberately quitting in the second half of the second inning, when they were four runs to velvet. The Journal men entered a dignified protest but the umpire, who was afterwards murdered, stated that all teams looking for honors must define their position on the money question before the second inning starts or else accept the consequences. The Journal men refused to accept charity, preferring to go down to defeat rather than accept any honors that were not honestly earned. Argument proved futile, logic was lost and reason went begging when an effort was made to arbitrate. The Telegram was ahead and intended to stay that way. Umpire Perry was at his worst. After a long delay, during which the Journal pitcher's arm got cold and the chances of continuing did not improve with argument, the umpire called the game.
