# ANNUAL REPORT OF MARION SCHOOLS

HOWS AN INCREASE OF BOTH RESIDENTS AND REGISTRATION OVER PREVIOUS YEAR-NUMBER OF TEACHERS DECREASED-AVERAGE ATTENDANCE SHORT

Salem, Or., July 23.—County Superinguident E, T. Moores yesterday completed and filed with Superintendent kerman the annual report upon the lools of Marion county for the year ling June 19, 1904. The report shows the total number of persons of school age residing within the county to be 10,226, an increase of 353 persons over last year, and the total registration for this year is given as 6,294, against 6.686 the year previous. The number of teachers engaged in teaching in the of teachers engaged in teaching in the Marion county schools this year is only 209, whereas there were 215 engaged last year. The average monthly salary of the male teachers was \$59.99 and that of the female teachers \$38.65.

The total days' attendance for the year 1904 is given as \$28.714, a notable increase over last year's attendance, which was \$98,660, but this year's average attendance fails short of that of

age attendance falls short of that of last year by over 100. There are 120 school houses in the 114 districts of the county, of which number two were built during the period covered by the

The financial report shows a consid-rable decrease in the school fund in erable decrease in the school fund in the county treasury, the amount of cash on hand July 17, 1903, having been \$22,861.32, whereas on June 19 of this year the balance in the treasury aggregated only \$11,213.99. The total value, estimated, of the school houses and grounds in the district is placed at \$104,828, that of the school furniture and apparatus, \$25,293, while the total amount of insurance carried on all property in the county is \$110,694.
