

NEHALEM CREAM IS IN DEMAND

"There is some lively competition for the cream production of the Nehalem valley," said A. Peterson, a dairyman of Mist, who arrived in the city yester-day evening. "The Hazelwood Cream-ery company is competing for the busiday evening. The Haselwood Creamery company is competing for the business on the routes with the Townsend Creamery company, the latter having been in the field for some time. As a result, the dairymen and farmers are getting better prices for their product than heretofore. The Haselwood company has put in a pasteurizing plant at Mist, nine miles over the mountain from Claiskanie, on the line of the Astoria & Columbia River railroad, and the cream routes have been extended in every direction. Many of the farmers are buying cows and installing separators, and others are arranging to make dairying a specialty. The cream routes now run down the Nehalem river taking in the country over the Claisop county line, while the longer routes extend up the valley from Mist a distance of 27 miles to the Washington county line. From Mist the cream product of the upper Nehalem valley is hauled to Clatskanie, and shipped to Portland by rail.

ATTORNEY PIGGOTT PAIRTS TA WOED PIOTURE TO FUETERE A CLIENT'S SUIT AGAINST HIS RICH SISTER-LAT-TER DENIES BELATIONSHIP.

Though a decision in the case of Cor-milus W. Barrett, who is suing Mrs. Karifa J. Faling for \$30 a month on which to support himself, was to have

Xarifa J. Faling for \$30 a month on which to support himself, was to have been given by County Judge Webster, it was not forthcoming. Many difficulties have been encountered by the court in determining the case, and it is probable an opinion will not be given from the bench until next week.

The suit of Barrett, who says he is Mrs. Faling's brother, was brought March S by Attorney Charles Henry Piggott, poet, architect, bricklayer, lawyer, real estate agent and dreamer. It was alleged that out of her bountifulness-she is estimated to be worth \$100,000—Mrs. Faling refused her brother a pittance to keep him from the poor farm.
