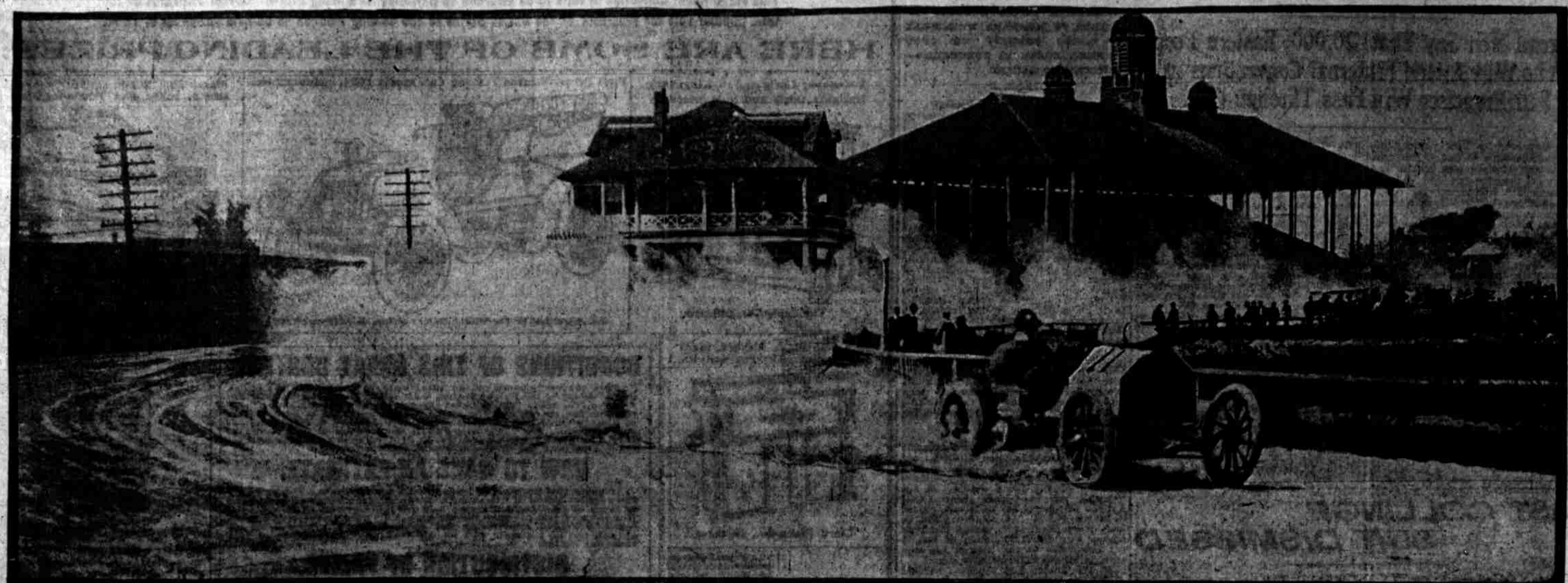


# THE BROWNS LOSE AN ELEVEN-INNING GAME

## TRACEY AND TURNER TALK ABOUT FIGHT

### GRATEFUL SPORTS FEEL CONFIDENT THAT TURNER, COLORED BOXER, WILL WHIP PORTLAND MAN—BOTH MEN CONFIRM OF THEIR ABILITY TO WIN THE GO.

Seattle, July 29.—The fight followers of this city who have always wanted to see Rufe Turner matched with a man who would make the black extend himself to the limit, feel that Rufe will be up against the real thing next Wednesday night, when he faces Tommy Tracey, one of the cleverest men in the country, in the Seattle theater.

There are men in Seattle who would be willing to bet big money that Rufe Turner can put it over Jimmy Britt, "Young Corbett," or any of the little cranks, but these same men admit that Rufe is up against the toughest proposition of his life when he takes on Tracey, who for years has been one of the most dangerous welterweights in the ring.

Rufe is not worried a bit about the outcome, however. His grin is as wide as ever, and he says he will win inside of 15 rounds. Rufe is not going to be able to feint and land at will on Tracey as he did on other men in Seattle, for Tracey is one of the best defensive fighters in the business. If Tracey ever gets the black boy as Sieger had him, the tickets had just as well be cashed in, for Tracey knows how to finish a man once he gets him going.

There is not going to be nearly so much difference in the size of the men as would appear when the match was first talked of. Turner has fought so much around here at 130 pounds that many thought he was steeped out of his class to take on Tracey. But the black boy has filled out a lot, and looks more rugged than ever, so that he will be giving only about five pounds to Tracey next Wednesday night.

Rufe figures that his youth and superior speed will more than offset the five pounds difference in weight, and he has no doubt of his ability to win. The Portland sports to a man think Tracey will win, and are willing to back their opinions with their coin. There is always plenty of Turner money in Seattle, so that the betting will probably be lively.

When Turner gets it into his head that he can whip a man he fights with a dash and confidence that makes him hard to beat. But when he gets a notion that he is taking the worse of it, he does not have heart in his work. The night he fought Joe Gans he thought he had the worst of the match, and kept complaining to his managers about it. He did not put up the fight that he was capable of, but at that he stood off the best man in the world at the weight until every man in the house at Oakland was thoroughly satisfied.

Tom Tracey is not letting any grass grow under his feet, and has told his friends that he will surely put it over the colored man.
