UNDERWRITER'S RISKS ON ORIEN TAL SHIPS DROP A THIRD IN 24 MOURS BECAUSE OF CURRENT BELIEF THAT RUSSIAN SEIZURES WILL BE STOPPED.

How long the oriental liner Aragonia will be held at the mouth of the river is the question of much speculation to-day. Local representatives of the vessel say that she may sail late this afternoon at high tide, although they make no positive assurances to that effect. They explain that one of the principal reasons for her detention was for the purpose of permitting the several firms making shipments on her to take out war risks. Some of them have already done so, but others are have already done so, but others are holding back with the expectation that the rates will decline during the next

few days.

That their anticipations are likely to prove correct has been partially demonstrated within the last 24 hours. Yesterday the war risks on the Aragonia were quoted at 2½ and 3 per cent. Today they are 2 per cent, and it seems to be the prevailing opinion that the figures will get as low as 1 per cent before the expiration of another week. It is admitted that another important feature which entered into the case was the uncertainty as to what sort of disposition the Russians would

case was the uncertainty as to what sort of disposition the Russians would make of the Arabia's cargo. No official confirmation of the press dispatches stating that the freight consigned to Japanese ports is going to be held and the vessel has been released with the balance of the cargo has been received by the local officials of the company, but they presume that the report

Announcement is locally made that R. P. Schwerin, general manager of the line, is in communication with Secre-tary Hay of the state department, proline, is in communication with Secretary Hay of the state department, protesting against the freight consigned to private firms in Japan being held by the Russian authorities. It is believed that the department will either arrange for its early release or bring such pressure to bear upon the St. Petersburg government that the shippers will be paid the full value of their goods. The Portland-Asiatic company will also demand a remuneration for the delay to which the steamer has been subjected. A claim is to be made in behalf of all the shippers, not only by the general manager of the line, but by the former's attorneys. Some of them have already taken the matter up by filing protests and preparing other data bearing upon the subject.

Local officials of the Portland-Asiatic company have about arrived at the conclusion that the Vladivostok squadron will make no further seizures of merchantmen bound from the Pacific coast for the orient. By the time the Aragonia gets over there they believe that the Japanese will have put a quietus on the csar's capturing fleet. It is asserted that the Japa are becoming keenly alive to the true situation and that they are going to take steps to protect their commerce on the high seas.
