

DECADES AGAINST EIGHT-HOUR LAW

JUDGE HELL OF WASHINGTON SUPERIOR COURT DECLARES ACT PASSED BY LAST LEGISLATURE UNCONSTITUTIONAL—LABOR UNIONS WILL APPEAL. (Special Dispatch to The Journal) Seattle, Wash., Aug. 17.—Judge Bell in the superior court yesterday afternoon handed down a decision holding that the eight-hour law, passed by the last legislature, is unconstitutional. The decision was brought by B. Normie, a local contractor for the city, after the board of public works had threatened to cancel his contract on the ground that he was violating its provisions regarding working men on the job not more than eight hours.
