

# NEW VESSEL FOR 'FRISCO TRAFFIC

**OWNERS OF AURELIA WILL PROBABLY LEASE A COMPANION BOAT FOR THE RUN BETWEEN PORTLAND AND THE BAY CITY IN NEAR FUTURE.**

There is a probability that the Russell & Russell, owner of the steamer Aurelia, will soon put another vessel into service between Portland and San Francisco. Fred Russell, one of the owners of the line, has been in the city for several days looking into the advisability of the move.

"As yet nothing definite has been done," said Mr. Russell last evening, "but if we do decide to add another boat to the line it will mean that we will have a vessel to give a weekly service down the coast. The additional vessel will be larger and faster than the Aurelia and will carry both freight and passengers."

While in the city Mr. Russell has conferred with a number of the shippers all of whom apparently favor the plan. Whether the addition to the service is made or not, Mr. Russell says that the Aurelia will remain on the route. She has been in regular commission up and down the coast for the past seven months and has always secured full cargoes at both ends of the line. From Portland she carries grain, lumber and grain, bringing a general cargo from the Bay City.

For some time there have been reports that the company would increase the service. Several shippers have urged the proposition, holding that there are not enough boats engaged in the coast trade to handle the growing traffic with any degree of regularity.

Those who are in touch with the situation say that there will be no flour and wheat shipped from Portland to San Francisco this fall and winter than ever before in the history of the port, for the reason that the California crop is exceptionally light.

## NEW CABLE TO PORT CANBY

North Head Will Be in Direct Communication With Local Bureau.

The weather bureau's telegraph cable between Flavel and Port Canby is designed to give the Portland office direct connection with North Head, which is in operation within 10 days.

J. H. Robinson, chief of the telegraph division of the postal department, arrived from Washington this morning to carry out this important project, and has been in consultation with District Forecaster Beals during most of the day.

The government recently appropriated \$13,000 for the cable in question, and the contract for its construction was awarded the Bishop Gutta Percha company of New York. The contract is being completed on the labor incident to the laying of the cable. Chief Robinson has worked incessantly for the early discharge of the work, and was gratified to learn on August 12 that the cable had been shipped to this city, accompanied by experts. It will arrive this afternoon, if all goes well, and within 24 hours Chief Robinson will be out in a lifeboat sounding the course to be followed.

The cable, which is one of the very best known to manufacturers, will fill a long-felt want in the Portland office. It will make possible earlier arrival of vessels entering or leaving the mouth of the river. Until now the only means of communication, the telephone, has been subject to frequent interruptions. Chief Robinson expects that the oldest officials in the service of the government weather department. He has been in the service, in fact, since it was established in 1870. He regards this improvement as of great importance, especially to shipping interests.

"I am thankful for one thing," he remarked, "to lay this cable will not be as difficult as it might be in some other sections, inasmuch as I have walked over every foot of ground that it is to traverse."

## DOCK NEEDS MEN

Contractors have been considerably hampered at the docks during the past few days on account of a shortage of labor. Several vessels have been put on the dock lately, and it is said that they have had to remain there much longer than they might have if the men who were needed had been available.

It is explained that the new drydock has opened a new avenue for skilled labor at Portland, and in time it is believed that there will be no further necessity for the delays on the wharves.

Hereafter there have been more than two or three caulkers in the city. It is believed that others will locate here when it becomes known that they can secure employment.

The Joseph Pulitzer has been launched. She left for the mouth of the river yesterday. It is probable that the schooner "Churchill" will be floated tomorrow, and the Zampa will be taken on the following day.

The "Aurelia" sailed Sunday for the California metropolis with 100,000 feet of lumber and 50,000 feet of poles.
