San Francisco, Sept. 2.—Detective Coleman is busy today serving subpoenas on witnesses in the inquest which will be held tomorrow to deter mine the cause of the death of Martin L. Bowers. A dozen have been sum moned. In addition to Dr. McLaughlin and other physicians who attended Bowers, several of his neighbors have been notified to be present at the in-
