# SNAKE RIVER ROUTE

LY-MINES IN IMPARA COPPER DISTRICT WILL BE RELIEVED.

D. B. Ogden, assistant United States engineer in this city, who recently returned from an inspection of the upper Snake river dredge, stated yesterday that the big obstruction mover would not likely be put on that portion of the river between Lewiston and Eureka this season. As the water becomes lower there, the current grows swifter, and it is regarded impracticable for the dredge to operate on Wild Goose and the other fifteen rapids between Lewiston and Eureka save at high or medium water. The time to take advantage of this condition of the river will be in the spring and early summer.

The Mountain Gem boat has been built especially for this run, drawing little more than 20 inches, and her burden being but 469 tons. To propel this light craft, a steam plant far stronger than the average has been put aboard. The boiler is twenty-two and a half feet long by sixty-one inches in diameter, and there are two engines of eleveninch diameter and six-foot stroke. Navigators of the upper river believe that this equipment will drive the Mountain Gem against the strongest Snake river current, when bearing a good cargo.

### LARGE DIKE WITH RICH SPECIMENS

In G. Higgins has made a strike on the headwaters of Chetco creek, just west of the Josephine county line, which promises to be of importance. It is a dike of porphyry, 300 feet in width, lying between walls of diorite and slate. On the diorite wall it shows gold 800 feet, and on the slate wall 1,000 feet.

Mr. Higgins dug into the dike and at a depth of about eight feet struck a body of ore of remarkable richness, specimens of the rock being thickly studded with free gold, which runs hundreds of dollars to the ton. The large amount of gold "spilled" by the dike satisfies him of the existence of a large deposit of gold bearing rock. The owner has a slug of amalgum worth about \$160 as the result of a few days work with a rocker in the dirt and decomposed gangue of the dike.
