

OLYMPIC SWIMMING RECORD IS BROKEN

St. Louis, Sept. 1.—C. M. Daniels of the New York Athletic club Broke the world's Olympic swimming record for 220 yards yesterday, when he lowered the records of David Billington of England (2:46 flat) and E. C. Schaefer of America (2:50 4-5) to 2:44 1-5.

Scotta Leary of San Francisco and Zoltan Holomay of Budapest tied in lowering the 56-yard record of 0:31 held by David Gaul of the Pennsylvania Swimming club, making the distance in 0:25 2-5. In swimming off the tie Holomay won and lowered the mark to 0:28 flat. The results were as follows:
