FOOTBALL SEASON

CARLIELD INDIANS INAUGURATE

New York, Sept. 17.—Today marks the first appearance of football on the athletic stage for 1984. In the east the season opens today with a game between the Carlisle Indians and Lebanon Valley college at Carlisle, and in the west the University of Chicago plays Lombard college.

At most of the big colleges the teams have been engaged in practice for soveral weeks and with the opening of the college year the sport will be taken up in earnest. Pennsylvania will inaugurate its schedule next Saturday with n game with Franklin and Marshall. Yale and Princeton will not start their schedule until September 28, while Harvard's first contest is down for October 1. On that date all the teams throughout the country will be in action, and from then on there will be football galore until the army and navy closes the season in Philadeiphia on November 26.

With the opening of the season the thousands of enthusiasts the country over are interested to know what changes will result from the amended rules which govern this greatest of college sports. When the intercollegiate rules committee met this year it made a careful study of the experiments tried during the last year, consulting the best coaches east and west before deciding on any innovations. After careful deliberation the committee voted to change the provision for seven men to be on the line of scrimmage, between the 25-yard lines, by a new rule whereby at least six men must be on the line of scrimmage, in every part of the field. This allows five men to be behind the line at any time, but, in order to protect the players from the much dreaded mass formations, a provision was added in accordance with which the fifth player back must stand in a position outside of either extremity of the line. This will permit a great many variations in attack, but will leasen a massing on any one point.
