TRAINER RETURNS AT CITY'S EXPENSE

POLICE SPEED MONEY WITH NO CHANCE OF CONVERTING HIM OF ASSAULT WITH INTENT TO KILL—WALTER CLARKE'S LAUREN WILL REFUSE TO PROSECUTE.

By the frank statement of Clarence Laureau, the waiter whose head was injured by striking the floor at a concert hall, it is evident that in their zeal to prosecute, without making an investigation, the police have put the state to the expense of sending a man to San Francisco and bringing him and another man back, when there is not the slightest chance of conviction.

Laureau declares that he has no intention of prosecuting Clifford Trainer, arrested on the charge of assaulting him, because he feels that Trainer was not in a responsible condition at the time, and had always been his friend.

"The reason why Trainer took the money and fled is that he was told by Trainer's manager, W. J. Gardner, that he would be paid for his services when he got back to the city."

Eyes witnesses of the affair say Laureau has been wrongly informed, that he was shoved and not struck before he fell. The manager of the Winter Garden has denied the waiter's expense thus far, but he has no recollection of the incident.

Laureau is still in a bad condition but steadily improving.
