

HOLD-UP MEN ARE PUT UNDER BONDS

Men in Masks Carelessly Select a Police Officer for Their Victim—Appear in Court—Plead Not Guilty After Confessing Crime.

Charged with assault with intent to rob Policeman Thomas Taylor, William Bowen and John Morgan were this morning arraigned before Municipal Judge Hogue. They entered pleas of not guilty, waived examination and were held to await the action of the grand jury under bonds of \$1,500 each.

The men attempted to hold up Policeman Taylor at 11:30 o'clock this morning at Twelfth and Morrison streets. They were masked and Bowen was armed with a loaded .38-caliber revolver. In the darkness they failed to recognize their intended victim as a policeman. He was ready and covering them with his revolver forced them to throw up their hands and took them to the city jail.

Although before Judge Hogue both men pleaded not guilty and waived preliminary hearing, they confessed to Taylor, Deputy District Attorney Haney and other persons that it was with the intention of holding up and robbing some one that they went forth last night; that they fully purposed making a victim of the policeman as they needed money. They failed to notice his star until they faced him. Their sudden change of front rather startled the official.

Police Have Evidence.
The masks, the revolver and all of the effects of the men, in the possession at the time of their capture, are in the hands of the police and will be used against the prisoners in the circuit court.

Bowen is a Portland man, having a wife and a year-old daughter. He has some property. A month ago he applied to Deputy District Attorney Haney for a warrant for the arrest of his wife, but investigation did not justify the of-

socials in complying. He was under arrest on a charge of assault and battery on his wife, but she refused to prosecute and he was dismissed. He suspected a local employment agent of paying undue notice to Mrs. Bowen. He secured a revolver, went to the man's office and threatened to kill both him and his son if they ever again set foot in his house. No arrest was ever made for this. Morgan is from Seattle, according to his own statement. He says he originally came from Providence, R. I. Both he and Bowen are in their first attempt at hold-up work.

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HUNDREDS STILL MUST STAY AWAY

Third Week of School Year Begins Under Distressing Circumstances—596 Pupils Are Idle—642 on Half Instruction.

On the opening day of the third week of the fall term in the city schools there are still 596 pupils without instruction and 642 are receiving only half instruction. The same number of taxpayers are paying \$25.50 a day for teachers' salaries to instructors who are not working.

At the Clinton Kelly school 148 pupils are unable to attend school on account of the unfinished condition of the building, and at the Atkinson school there are 453 children who are without instruction. Of the number who have to do with only half instruction, 385 are at the Clinton Kelly, 93 at the Brooklyn and 84 at the Atkinson.

This morning the high school reopened and the building is crowded. The heating apparatus is working satisfactorily. Although returns of the attendance were not made at a late hour to the office of the city superintendent, it is expected that the number of pupils in attendance will exceed the normal number of the week, when the registration was 922.

ended to cause the dismissal of the school during the latter part of last week has been remedied by the starting of the furnaces which were completed Saturday. All of the pupils of this school assembled for work this morning and found the building quite comfortable.

Reports from the Clinton Kelly school today are all probably that the entire building will be ready for occupancy tomorrow.

BURGLAR ESCAPES; POLICE ARE LATE

While the headquarters patrol wagon was hurrying to the residence of C. E. S. Wood, the well-known attorney, at Madison and Ford streets, at 6 o'clock this morning, carrying a squad of policemen, a burglar who had been endeavoring to effect an entrance to the house took flight and made his escape. When the officers reached the scene he had got away. Only a minute before he had been tampering with the front door.

The household was awakened shortly after 6 o'clock by the burglar trying to force his way into the house. He was not until the lights were turned on and he became aware that his presence was known. He did not know, however, that a telephone message had been sent to police headquarters and that a wagon load of policemen were coming at a rapid rate.

UNIQUE RECORD IS FLASHED IN COURT

SUIT OF SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 41 AGAINST MAN NAMED FLORES RE-VEALS PROFOUND CONDITION OF AFFAIRS IN SCHOOL BOARD—FIGHTING MEN WIN ELECTION.

It developed in the suit of school district No. 41 against L. Ferdinand Flores on trial this morning before Circuit Judge Fraser, that some merry elections have occurred in the district. The record, which was introduced, showed that "Flores" had been allowed to vote, though paying no taxes in the district and having no children, because one of them pulled off his coat and threatened to "lick" the chairman.

After pleading guilty to a charge of drunkenness, Benedetto Schulll was today also charged with assault with intent to kill Dominic Mancino with a knife. Trouble arose between the two yesterday, resulting in a fight. During the fray, a knife was used and Mancino received severe stabs in the arm and hand. He is at St. Vincent's hospital.

Green wrote the county clerk relative to the wedding of Rice and Maggie McDaniell early in April. He said McDaniell was the maiden name of his wife, which she resumed after deserting him. Mr. Fields searched the records and April 22 sent Green a communication to the effect that Rice and Maggie McDaniell were married January 1, 1931.
