

**PIONEER'S FUNERAL SET FOR WEDNESDAY**

**AARON BECK.**

The funeral of Aaron Beck, the pioneer merchant of this city who died suddenly Sunday evening, will take place tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock from the residence. Arrangements for the services are nearly completed.

Deceased came to this city from the east in 1854, and engaged in the mercantile business. At one time he was one of the most influential business men of Portland. He retired from business in 1888. Since that time he has been associated with many works of benevolence.

The cause of his death is said to be paralysis, but this was superinduced by worry over the death of his wife, which occurred a few months ago. Mr. Beck had five sons and four daughters. He was also a great grandfather, the great-grandchild being the son of Mrs. Jesse Newbauer of San Francisco.

**CATCHES PHEASANT IN CITY'S HEART**

**HEADS OF CHURCH GATHER IN BOSTON**

**ENGLAND, BRAZIL, JAPAN AND MANY FAR AWAY LANDS REPRESENTED AT THE INTERNATIONAL EPISCOPAL CONVENTION, WHICH BEGINS TOMORROW.**

Boston, Mass., Oct. 4.—The intellect and the power of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States are concentrated in Boston today. On every main distinguished bishop, active clergymen and influential laymen from all parts of the union have been pouring into the city, until even the hotel corridors for once in their history might be mistaken for the vestibules of churches, so numerous thereabout are men of priestly mien. At many of the aristocratic residences, the bishop, district bishops and clergymen have found splendid quarters. The handsome home of Mrs. "Jack" Gardner is but one of a large number that has been placed at the disposal of the visiting bishops and clericals. The use of the palatial residence of Montgomery Sears by J. Pierpont Morgan and the use of the Head residence by Bishop Potter of New York are among the number. The Archbishop of Canterbury is being entertained as the guest of Mr. Morgan.

At Emmanuel church this morning, where the business sessions of the convention will be held, a great throng of churchmen were assembled. The gathering was informal, the gentlemen visiting the meeting place for the purpose of getting their mail and obtaining information relative to their quarters.

Prominent among the bishops from abroad who are here to attend the triennial are the Right Rev. John McKim, bishop of Tokio; the Right Rev. B. D. Ferguson, (colored), bishop of Cape Palmas, Liberia; the Right Rev. Charles H. Brent, bishop of the Philippines; the Right Rev. Henry B. Restarick, bishop of the Hawaiian Islands; the Right Rev. James H. Vane, bishop of Porto Rico; the Right Rev. Peter T. Rowe, bishop of Alaska, and the Right Rev. Lucien Lee Kinsolving, bishop of Southern Brazil.

In addition to the Archbishop of Canterbury the Church of England has as representatives here the Right Rev. William Boyd Carpenter, Lord Bishop of Ripon, and one of two other members of the Anglican Episcopate. The Anglican Church of Canada is officially represented by the Right Rev. Charles Hamilton, lord bishop of Ottawa; the Right Rev. James Carmichael, bishop coadjutor of Montreal, and a number of prominent priests and laymen.

Talks with the prominent churchmen already here indicate that the coming convention will be full of interest and importance. Among the important topics of business to be considered and acted upon is the report of the commission which was appointed three years ago to consider the question of changing the legal name of the church, "Protestant Episcopal," and to ask the opinion of the dioceses. The commission in a report made public last spring decided against a change at this time.

The agitation for a more explicit and stricter canon on the prohibition of marriage of divorced persons, except for one cause, will also be discussed at length, and the advisability of grouping the dioceses of the country into provinces, with a primate at the head of each province, will also be considered. A proposed board of review, where appeals from the diocesan courts may be heard, the question of meeting the situation in the insular possessions and other issues will also be taken up.

At 11 o'clock tomorrow morning the opening service of the convention is to be held in Trinity church, at which the speaker will be the Right Rev. William Crowwell Benson, D. D., bishop of Albany, and one of the prominent leaders of the American church. The Archbishop of Canterbury had been in-

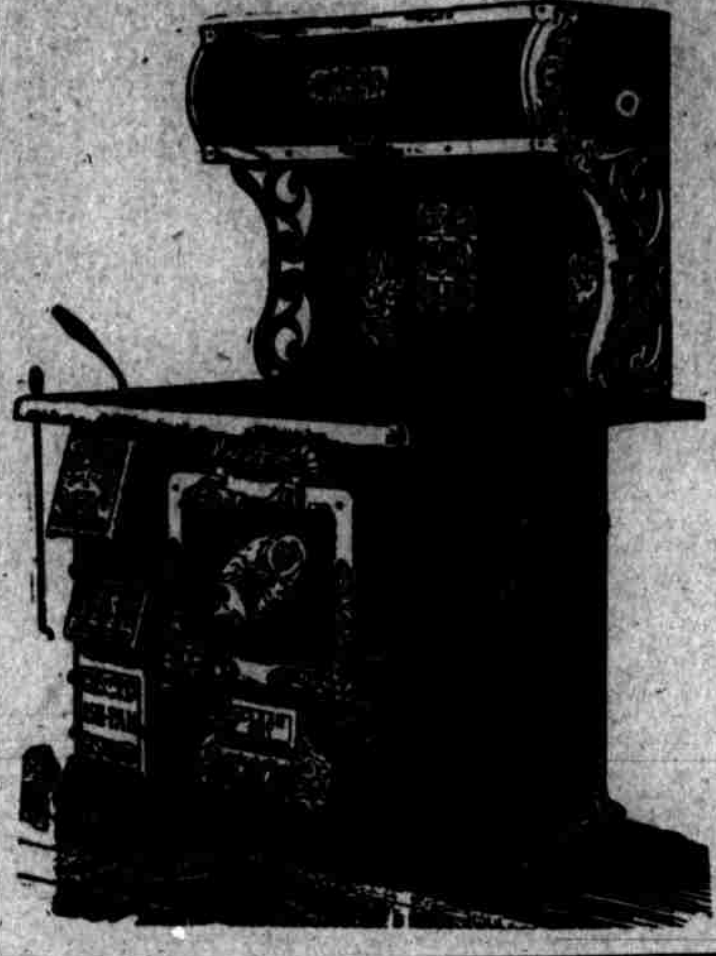
