(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Balem. Oct. 7.—Jacob Siegfried was yesterday adjudged insane and ordered committed to the Oregon hospital for the insane. He is suffering from be-ligious mania. Biggfried owns a farm of 110 acres near Silverton, of which about 20 acres is set in hops. He is single and aged 35 wars.




