

# WILL MAKE WHALES GIVE UP FORTUNES

**WHERE'S MILLIONS IN IT?** DR. CHARLES CAPTAIN GREGORY—**MEAN IS TO ESTABLISH FARM FOR SICK WHALES** — **RESULT: MILLIONS IN AMBERGOMIS.**

Captain Gregory, master of the light-house tender Heather, is one of the principal promoters of a project to start a whale farm in southeastern Oregon, where the big fish are said to be at their best. They believe that if they prove a serious menace to navigation, "Associated with him are a number of men in the employ of the government. Captain Gregory has located a body of water known as Becharof lake, fed by Shell-kof strait. The captain has confided to his friends that during every summer whales congregate in the lake in great numbers. The lake is circular, four miles being about 20 feet in diameter. An inlet leading to it from the strait is very narrow, and when the whales get in there the captain intends to dam up the entrance and hold them in captivity.

When he gets them corralled it is their duty to produce ambergris. In order to obtain it the whale must necessarily be made ill. Lieutenant Newman, a surgeon in the revenue cutters service, has been upon the project; it is declared, he will cause a whale to give up ambergris in short order. It is done by inoculation. It is stated that inoculation will be performed with a harpoon.

Considerable capital is explained will be necessary to carry on the enterprise, and it is the intention to organize a stock company. Lieutenant Newman is now on his way east for this purpose. The Heather recently returned to Seattle from Alaska. R. C. Hart of Portland, superintendent of the Thirteenth Lighthouse district, was a passenger on the vessel as far as the sound, and he states that Captain Gregory is very enthusiastic over the proposed plan. In speaking of it the captain is reported to have said:

"Becharof lake is an ideal place at which to conduct operations. When the whales go in there it will require but very little work to stop up the entrance so that it will be impossible for them to make their escape. There is no doubt that the surgeon's inoculation scheme will produce the desired results, and we will soon have a sufficient quantity of ambergris to supply the markets of the world. Those taking stock in the concern will be the coming millionaires of the country."
