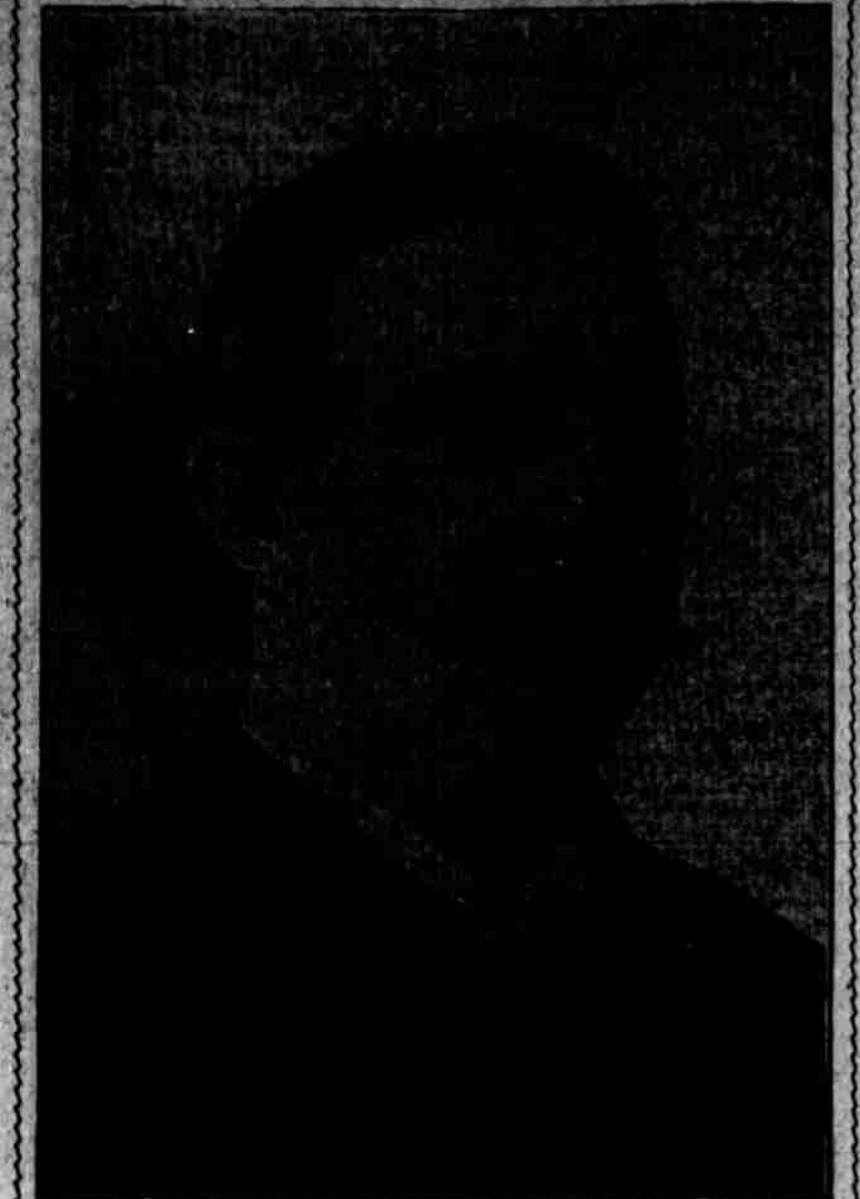


POLICY KING MAY LIVE IN EUROPE



AL ADAMS, NEW YORK'S POLICY KING. (Journal Special Service.) New York, Oct. 15.—Al Adams, the policy king, who amassed millions from the pennies of the poor and was last Tuesday released from Sing Sing, where he had served sentence for gambling, today contracted for the sale of several of his largest land holdings. This transaction is taken as proof of the statement made some weeks ago that he would dispose of his holdings in this country and buy a castle in Europe wherein to pass the remainder of his days.

MOTHER OF FIVE GOES RAVING MAD

MRS. F. CROGHINO FIGHTS WITH DEPUTY SHERIFFS WHEN THEY ATTEMPT TO TAKE HER FROM THE COUNTY JAIL TO THE ASYLUM AT SALEM.

When the time came to remove Mrs. F. Croghino, a demented woman, from a cell at the county jail yesterday to send her to the asylum for the insane at Salem, she fought like a tigress, biting, clawing and striking at every person within her reach. It was found impossible for one man to place her in a strait-jacket, and Sheriff Word and Under-Sheriff Morden had to go to the assistance of Deputy Cordano. After a hard struggle the unfortunate woman was bound, and screaming at the top of her voice, was started for Salem in charge of Mrs. Dougherty and a male assistant.

the authorities in many months. She is the mother of five young children. Attention to her condition was first drawn to County Commissioner Lightner, County Health Officer Evans listened to the story told by the woman's neighbors, and after consultation with Mr. Lightner decided that she should be sent to the county hospital, in the hope that rest and quiet under changed conditions would prove beneficial. On account of her pitiful pleading two small children were allowed to accompany her to the institution last Thursday. Instead of improving, her condition became worse, and this morning it was found necessary to bring her back to the city and incarcerate her at the county jail. On examination by Justice Seton and two physicians she was adjudged insane and was ordered sent to the Salem asylum. It is probable that the two younger children will be given into the care of the Boys' and Girls' Aid society, while the other three will be given a home by friends. Deputy Sheriff Cordano has interested himself in the case and will endeavor to raise a fund for the care of the children.

TRACY DYING; MURDER MAY BE THE CHARGE

Leigh Tracy has never regained consciousness since being struck over the right temple by a large glass tumbler in the hands of a man at Fifth and Davis streets early Friday night. He was removed at once to the Good Samaritan hospital at the order of City Physician Zan, and he still remains there. His chances for recovery are so slight that there is practically no hope.

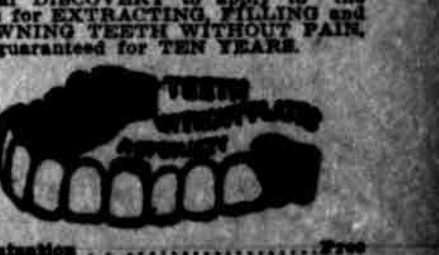
World's Fair Excursions.
