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## ATKINSON SCHOOL IS ALMOST READY

SIX WEEKS DELAY IN COMPLETION OF CONTRACT FOR IMPROVEMENTS—PUBLIC SCHOOL FEELS SURPRISING — TAXPAYERS NOT GETTING THEIR MONEY'S WORTH.

Atkinson school will be ready for occupancy Monday morning for all but the two higher classes, which have been meeting in the portable rooms at the Couch school. This is the announcement made by City Superintendent of Schools Frank Rigler. By that time six weeks will have elapsed since the opening of the fall term. The building would not be ready for occupancy then had not Mr. Rigler employed men to clear the rooms of the debris left by the contractors, who are supposed to do this work as a part of their contracts. He was instructed at a special meeting of the school directors to employ the necessary labor for this work. An attempt will be made to deduct the expense of cleaning of the building from the contract price of the work on the schoolhouse.

It will be Thanksgiving before the work on the building is fully completed according to Mr. Rigler. There is much painting and a large amount of plumbing yet to be done. Although having workmen around the building during school hours, will greatly interfere with the teachers and pupils, yet Mr. Rigler thought this building preferable to the

portable rooms at the Ladd school. During the rainy weather it is nearly impossible for all the small children to attend the portables, as they are so far from the Atkinson school district.

Contractors have manifested a very indifferent attitude in doing the work on the buildings. Work that they contracted to have finished weeks ago is just now being completed. For four full weeks over 500 pupils of the Atkinson school were without any meeting place whatever and during the past two weeks they have been assembling in the portables of the Ladd school.

Besides this there were hundreds of other pupils of the Clinton Kelly, Brooklyn, Fortmouth, Ladd and High schools who were without any place in which to receive instruction for one and two weeks, on account of contractors failing to have the buildings ready on time. During this time the teachers were unemployed, and during the past two weeks had to pay salaries amounting to over \$2,000 for services which were never rendered.

While this state of affairs has existed the directors have manifested a listless spirit regarding the conditions and have done little or nothing to remedy them. They have allowed the contractors to shirk their agreements and in nearly every instance the contractors have been from one to six weeks behind with their work. To directors left all the details to Supervising Architect Jones and he also has signally failed in holding the contractors to their agreements.

Next week the small village of portable buildings at the Ladd school will disappear. Five of them will be transferred to the manual training centers as work-rooms. Others of the rooms will be transferred to schools which are badly crowded.

## TANNING HIDES TO MAKE FINE GLOVES

SKINS OF OREGON HOGS, DOGS AND SHEEP ARE USED FOR THAT PURPOSE—SHORT OF GOOD GLOVES IS EXPERT TANNING OF HIDES.

A new avenue has been opened in trade in the Oregon hog, dog and sheep, in the manufacture of gloves. Hog skin is found to make a very desirable working glove. The hide when seen on the hog hanging in a butcher's shop has the appearance of being extremely coarse and harsh. But when thoroughly tanned it becomes soft and pliable, and has the toughness that makes a glove durable. It has one peculiar characteristic after being tanned. The bristles of a hog grow in bunches of three, and the pores of these hairs are plainly visible in little groups all over the glove. Many gloves are made from the hide of the South American wild hog, and the Mexican hog.

"The skin of a dog also makes a fine glove," says George A. Luke, president of the Luke Knitting company, "but only the best tanned dog hides are good, and these are high priced. For this reason the sale of them is very limited. A good dogskin glove costs from \$1.50 to \$1.75. Cowhides and calfskins make good working gloves. A great many gloves are made of sheepskin, which has not been

regarded as a good glove leather. But recently improved methods of tanning sheep hides have brought them very largely into use. They are usually sold as goatskin gloves, there being an old prejudice in favor of the goat glove. "The buck hide of North and South America is still very largely used in the manufacture of the best gloves. Buckskin is tanned in many ways, and when tanned right it is expensive. The muleskin glove finds considerable favor among workmen, possibly owing to the general impression that a mule has a tough hide. Most of the so-called muleskin gloves are made from horsehide."

It would be supposed that the most durable gloves were made of the hide from the back of a horse that has endured the slings and arrows of misfortune that come with a lifetime of pulling a dray or an all-night hack. But the truth is to the contrary. The best horsehide gloves are made from the skin that comes from under and between the hips. From this hide the cordovan shoe is made. The dogskin has no pores and the glove made from it is nearly waterproof.

"The value of a glove depends largely on the process of tanning that the skin has undergone," said Mr. Luke. "I have heard tanners say they could do a first-class job of tanning in 24 hours, but I don't believe it. A really good job of tanning requires, possibly, to be kept in the brine from three to six months, and for some hides even longer. There is a South African animal, a cross between the goat and the sheep, that yields a fine glove leather if the hide is properly tanned, but it takes three years to tan this hide to perfection."

Mystery surrounds the animal from which the Mocha glove, a men's "undressed kid" glove that has become very popular in recent years. The manufacturers differ in opinion, and none of them knows to a certainty the animal from which the Mocha skin is taken. The glove is entirely imported from Turkey, and is a part of the stock of every glove dealer. It comes in very fine shades of brown and dark tan. "The Europeans are still beating us in tanning and dyeing," says Mr. Luke. "They evidently have secrets in these processes that we have not yet acquired in America. There is a Mocha imitation made in this country, but it is a sheepskin tanned wrong side out, and the coloring is inferior. Women's kid gloves continue to be made of the skins of kids, sheep and lambs. They are very largely imported. One San Francisco house maintains a factory in Italy, where the coloring of these gloves reaches its highest state of excellence."

## OREGON'S EXHIBIT WINS MANY PRIZES

President Jefferson Myers of the Oregon state commission takes vigorous exception to the statements of P. A. MacPherson, made upon the return of the latter from St. Louis concerning the Oregon agricultural exhibit.

Mr. MacPherson said at that time, in The Journal that the Oregon exhibit in the Agricultural building was "a slam on our good state," that the display had often been excelled at the state fair at Salem and that compared with the exhibits of Washington and California, it was "insignificant."

This report nettled Mr. Myers and now, after a week or 10 days in St. Louis, he offers a reply. A dispatch to The Journal over his signature says: "Replying to Mr. MacPherson, the Oregon agriculturists exhibits at the world's fair received the grand prize for grains and grasses, 28 gold medals, 44 silver medals and 23 bronze medals. The exhibit is equal to that of any state in the union."

Keys to local barber shops were thrown into the river at a meeting of the barbers' union in the Alsiky building last night. The meeting was for the purpose of determining on the hours in which shops in this city would be kept open.

By practically unanimous consent it was agreed that there should be no time limit, that shops could remain open 24 hours each day if the proprietors so desired. It was further specified that barbers shall work 10 1/2 hours each day, which has been the custom up to this time.

The throwing off of a time limit to the shops has been under consideration for several months by the union. It was done for the purpose of accommodating visitors in the city. It is especially for the purpose of accommodating those who will attend the Lewis and Clark fair next summer.

There was a meeting of the officials of the union at noon today when notices were prepared and forwarded to proprietors of shops throughout the city, informing them of the action of the union.

No action was decided upon with reference to the proprietors of the Portland hotel shop who have employed non-union barbers.

## ALL SORTS OF HOURS FOR RAZOR WIELDERS

ASSOCIATION WORKS FOR CITY'S PURITY

The Municipal association celebrated the first anniversary of its birth last evening at Y. M. C. A. hall by hearing a program of reports on the year's work and addresses on various subjects of interest to the institution.

President O. P. M. Jamison, in his report, paid an eloquent tribute to W. J. Hensyman, his predecessor in office. On the subject of gambling he congratulated the association on what has been accomplished and added that a watchful vigil must be kept to prevent the vice getting a new lease on life. He complimented Sheriff Wood on his work, and Mr. Manning started in well, said the president, "but I think he shows, sometimes, signs of weakening."

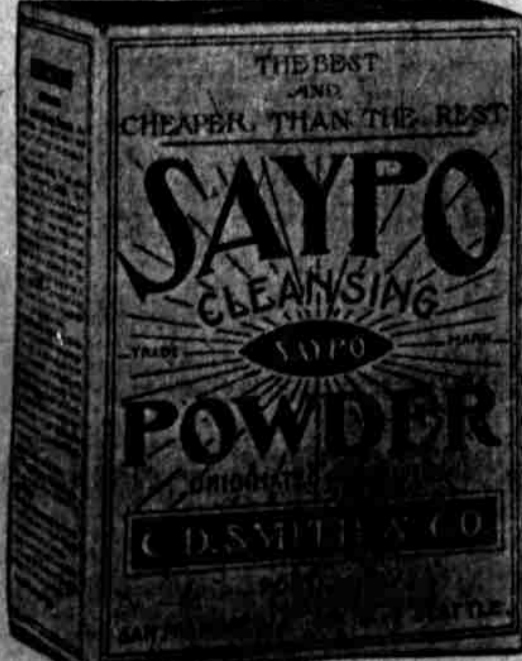

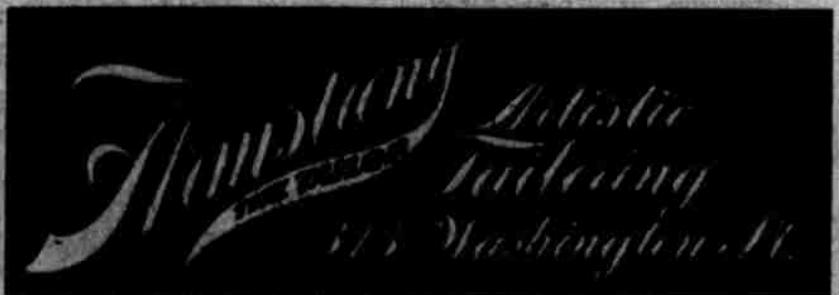
