Japanese Retire From Mikado's War Depart Village After Hot Artillery Fight.

EXPECT A BIG BATTLE MANY IN THIS COUNTRY

Both Armies Are Being Reinforced Portland Contingent Leaves Next Week With Men and Guns, and Each Will Reassume Offensive Operations.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 22.—(Bulletin)—
A Mukden dispatch today gives the total of killed and wounded in the battle
of Shakhe river on both sides as 20,000.
It adds that there are indications of a speedy resumption of hostilities.

Washington, Oct. 22.—(Bulletin)—An official dispatch from Tokio to the Japanese legation this afternoon says Japanese legation this afternoon says that General Oyama reports that investigation up to October 22 shows the Russian losses in the Shakhe river engagement to be 500 prisoners, 10,550 bodies found and 45 guns, 7,600 shells, 5,000 rifles and 78,000 rounds of ammunition captured. The total Russian casualties he estamates at 50,000.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 22.—Despite the reports sent out by irresponsible news agencies yesterday that there had been a cessation of hostilities and that all was quiet at the front, it appears from official bulletins issued this morning that exactly the opposite was the case. Sakharoff last night reported that the Japanese yesterday fled precipitately from a resolute forward movement upon Shakhe village, which was preceded by a heavy aftillery fire.

The Japanese ammunition at that point, it was believed, was getting scarce, but the capture of the village demonstrated that this was not the case. After the hurried retreat of the Japanese to the south bank of the Shakhe river quantities of ammunition and stores were found which the Japanese had been compelled to abandon.

The active service is for a term of three years, the first reserve for a period of four years and four months. The new system subjects every male citizen of Japan to military service for a period of 17 years and 4 months. It is said that the new order will increase the mikado's forces by at least 250,000.

Japanese who reside in forcign countries and are emisted in the reserves must notify their regimental officers as must notify their regimental officers as soon and as often as a change of residence is made. In that way the officials have no difficulty in locating the recruits when they are wanted.

GOVERNMENT MAY BE DEFRAUDED

Chinese Who Have Been Sent to the St. Louis Fair.

(Journal Special Service.)
San Francisco, Oct. 22.—A discovery made by United States District Attorney Marshall B. Weodworth points to a tremendous fraud upon the government. It is a fraud which may involve already more than \$120,000 and the unhindered landing of 250 Chinese within the past two months in the guise of performers

two months in the guise of performers at the St. Louis fair.

These Chinese were brought here by Lee Toy and Eca da Silva, now under indictment for their part in importing slave women. They were permitted to go to St. Louis by the commissioner of immigration, Hart H. North, under bonds supplied by the Aetna Indemnity company, amounting to \$500 each, for their return to China within \$0 days after the close of the exposition.

These bonds, amounting to \$120,000, are practically worthless, if District Attorney Woodworth is correct, and bonds of the same nature offered for \$5 Chinese now awaiting transportation to the

Clark Admits Oregon Short Line a Share.

Through Trains From Chicago to Southern California To Be a Feature-Confirms Rockefeller Stories.

Helena, Mont., Oct. 22.—Senator Clark stated at Butte last night that he had sold a half interest in the Sait Lake, Los Angeles & San Pedro railroad to the Oregon Short Line in order to perfect arrangements for a new franscontinental system connecting Chicago with the Pacific const.

The San Pedro road will be completed in 60 days, and local trains will run between Salt Lake and San Pedro until the line is properly ballasted at all points, when two through limited Pullman trains will be run daily between Chicago and the coast via the Union Pacific and Northwestern.

It will require nine trains for this service, the San Pedro furnishing three, the Northwestern two, and the Union Pacific four.
