St. Petersburg, Oct. 28.—(Bulletin)—Russia has been visited by Great Britain to be represented on the board of inquiry at Hull into the North sea incident.

(Journal Special Service.) Vigo, Spain, Oct. 28.—More light has been thrown on the attack of the Russian squadron on an enemy either real or imaginary, in which the transport from Hull suffered, by an additional statement of the case made today by the Russian admiral, Rojestvensky.

Rojestvensky said that rumors had reached him that the Japanese would attack his squadron. When he saw two torpedo boats he had no doubt they were Japanese.

"We did not for one moment suppose that the attacking vessels could be Japanese," he said.
