Indian Witnesses Tell the Story of the Killing of Foster Wachino by Louis Savage. CHIEF LISTENS STOICALLY TO THE TESTIMONY. Once Before the Prisoner Threatened the Life of His Victim.

His face wearing a smile that is meant to be conciliatory, Chief Louis Savage sits and watches the witnesses who are giving evidence in the United States court to convict him of the murder of a fellow Indian, Foster Wachino.

Two of the older Indians who were present at the killing told the story to the witness stand. One of these was Laura Tom, who acted as a peace-maker when the quarrel began in the small hours of the morning.
