PORTLAND BANK STATEMENT. AMATEUR DETECTIVE

BAD AS PROFESSIONALS

J. N. Olds, an amateur detective with an ambition to secure a reward of \$500, caused the police a great deal of trouble yesterday. He thought that in the person of John Lakson, a millwright, he had secured Paul Miller, who, in 1898, murdered the three members of the Newton family at Brookfield, Mass. "Chief of Police Hunt detailed Acting Detectives Vaughn and Hellyer on the case. Lakson was taken to police head-quarters. A snapshot photograph of Lakson, taken by Olds, is said to have been identified by the police of Brookfield and Worcester, Mass., as that of the murderer. The picture is poor, however, and does not look much like Lakson.

Mrs. Alice Goodwin Finds Her Recreant Spouse on Portland's Streets.

LEFT HER AND BABE TO STARVE IN NEW YORK

Has Been Living at Leading Hotel with Woman Registered as His Wife.

Three years ago, Mrs. Alice Goodwin claims, her wealthy husband, C. R. Goodwin, deserted her in New York and left her to support herself and their little girl. She met him on the street in this city yesterday afternoon and there was a lively scene. Assistant District Attorney Haney was summoned, and with Chief Hunt and Justice Reid, who is acting as Goodwin's counsel, held a conference, the result being that a charge of sustaining unduly intimate relations with another woman was placed against Goodwin. He was arrested by Acting Detective Hellyer. He has been staying at the Portland hotel with a woman who was registered as his wife. This woman left for California November 18.

"My husband is a lawyer and is a very wealthy man," said Mrs. Goodwin. "He deserted me three years ago in New York. I have spent some time in Alaska gathering material for a book, and came down from there a short time ago. I left my rooming house and went down town to buy a few articles when I ran into my husband. I was dumfounded, but had presence of mind enough to hang on to him."

Every effort is being made to settle the affair out of court. There was to be a hearing before Police Judge Hogue this morning, but by agreement w.h. Attorney B. S. Pague, who has entered the case for Mrs. Goodwin, and Justice Reid, a postponement was granted until tomorrow.

In the meantime, it is understood, Goodwin will make financial provisior for his wife, and the charge against him will probably be dismissed.
