B. B. Barnes, While Laying Tiling, is Smothered by Heavy Cave-in of Earth.

TWO MEN INJURED BY FALLING FROM STAGING

Fall of Twenty Feet Causes Bruises but No Permanent Disabilities.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Albany, Or., Dec. 3.—B. B. Barnes, a farmer residing near Granger, six miles west of this city on the Corvallis & Eastern railroad, was caught in a cave-in in which he was killed.

He was one of the most highly respected men in Benton county. He resided on his own farm near Granger where he lived for a number of years.

Enoch Miller and J. H. Davidson, while working on a building at Crabtree yesterday, met with an accident that resulted in both men being injured.

EXPLODES A BOMB IN JUSTICE COURT

Wholesale Arrests May Follow Expose of Clarence D. Hillman Charged with Fraud.
