(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Seattle, Wash., Dec. 3.—Governor-elect Albert E. Mead is not in touch with the movement of national' guardsmen throughout the state to do away with the governor's staff. Prior to election, when the various companies of the na-tional guard, in order to carry out their plan of reform for the betterment of the service, sought a promise from the candidate for the highest office in the state. Mead gave his word that if elected he would do away with the military aide display which the guardsmen con-sider cumbersome.
