Millions of Dollars Will Be Represented at the Great Pacific Exposition.

**OUTLOOK SURPASSES** PAST EXPECTATIONS

Thirteen Foreign Nations Have Already Closed Contracts, and Others Will Make Exhibits.

The interest manifested in the Lewis and Clark exposition by exhibitors, national and international, has far surpside the expectations of the most opeful among those who are directly iterested in the coming fair. In fact, is amaxing to contemplate the regurity with which applications are pourse in upon Secretaries Freeman and ed, and the demands for space, many which cannot be compiled with unless ditional buildings are erected.

Thirteen foreign nations, to date, have beed absolute contracts for space, and any more have the matter of exposing eir industries under consideration and ill doubtless act favorably. Among one which are already booked to make hibits is Russia, which, in spite of its ials at the present time, will make a splay of its vast resources, agricultal and mineral. Canada will expend outsinds of dollars to illustrate its potion in the industrial world. Great ritain will show a sample of everying worth notice in the king's domina. Germany, the great manufactures country, will come to the front with magnificent exhibit. China and Japan ill give ideas of what is going on combercially in the orient. Austria, Huntry, France, Belgium, Holland and Ceynare no less enthusiastic in this reguland Italy will send a bewildering splay of fine arts.

An effort was made yesterday to sense from local officials of the exposition an idea as to how much these mones will expend in exhibiting their oducts. The very lowest estimate is 500,000.

California's outlay will represent \$50,200. Washington appropriated \$75,000.

Par-off New York came forward with \$35,000. A \$25,000 exhibit was decided upon by Massachusetts. Missouri, with its fair just over, will expend \$10,000, Utah \$35,000, Idaho a like amount, Montant \$10,000, Nevada and Arizona \$10,000 each, and British Columbin \$25,000. These sums total \$850,000, all of which has been officially appropriated. There will be represented besides Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin, Michigan, Minnesots, Rhode Island, Connecticut and othere, although their state governments may not participate officially.

For the installation of these state exhibits, before the gates of the expession are thrown open, upward of \$3,000.000 will be expended. California, for example, with an appropriation of \$90,000, will have probably \$500,000 worth of exhibits, and practically the same proportion exists in the case of Washington state, with an official appropriation of \$10,000. This means that the exhibits of the states, after they are installed, will represent a value of not less than \$4,500,000.

And when it is considered that all of this is to be housed in one building, some idea of the vantness of the exposition may be formed.

Eallroads Want Eitersture.

Now that the St. Louis fair is over, the railroads are seeking the officials of the Lewis and Clark exposition and de-

the Lewis and Clark exposition and demanding advertising matter. The rail-goads, of course, handle only one big exposition at a time. Within the past few days the fair corporation has received dozens of requisitions from passenger agents all over the country requesting that literature for folders and illustrative articles be supplied in order that they may properly advertise "1905." Henry E. James of St. Louis, who was in Portland yesterday, said that the first low rate from St. Louis to Portland, which goes into effect within a few days, will mean the influx of upward of 2,500 people, who are already interested or intend to become interested in the Lewis and Clark exposition. He secured this infarmation from railroad officials in his inative city, who declare that 1,900 reservations for Portland have already been made.

Besides this low rate, the fair will have the benefit of a settlers' rate, which begins February 1 and lasts until May, and the exposition rate itself, which lasts from June to October.

The launch and gondola concession was awarded yesterday to the Trescott Boat Manufacturing company, of St. Joseph, Mich. The water traffic is a big feature of every great exposition, and will be such in this. The company agrees to furnish and operate Venetian gondolas, manned by native gondollers, as at St. Louis. There will be 12 of these on the lake, accommodatiang from 4 to 15 people each. The concessionaire will also operate 25 electric launches and 20 rowboats, in all of which there will be pilots clad in picturesque contumes.
