TODAY'S MARKETS

HAVE ONION MEN FORMED A COMBINE

Rumor Reports Combination of Heavy Holders of This Year's Crop.

POTATOES ARE SELLING TO ARIZONA POINTS

Advance in Poultry Caused by Lighter Receipts—Oats Are Firmer.

Front Street, Dec. 7.—The principal market features:
Divers combine to corner onions.
Government will buy Oregon oats.

Dealers Combine to Corner Onions.
An onion concern is now the talk of Front Street. It is reported that the Ruth Wolf & Sons have combined forces and will take a flier in onions. It is known to a certainty that the first two parties have been large buyers of onions early in the year, when the market was weak, and were holding for an advance. The market at the moment is in very strong shape and growers are determined to hold their stock for a good advance. They will also hold onions until they are sold out, outside stocks being imported. Either way it will be a good thing for the farmer, for a while at least.

Potatoes Shipped to Arizona.
Several cars of fancy Oregon onions are now being shipped to the better feeling in the city market for fancy goods and the selling at lower prices to meet them by the local dealers. The potatoes that are being sold were purchased at a price of 65¢ per hundred pounds, which would mean 50¢ in Portland.

Government Will Buy Oats and Hay.
A new condition has set in the oats and hay markets. The United States government is about to buy grain, 1,000,000 bushels of 8,000,000 bushels for shipment to the Philippines Islands. This will leave the oats market in very good shape for an advance in prices. The market is above the norm and the movement is positive if made in this market, will certainly cause things to turn. The harry market is firm but a trifle quiet than of late.

Wheat Is Somewhat Duller.
The reaction in the eastern wheat market yesterday and today has left the feeling here that we are made in the prices. The flour market remains dull but the larger dealers are looking for better times after the turn of the year.

Poultry Market Slightly Higher.
The receipts in poultry are not quite as large as the demand and prices today on best stocks are practically 40¢ higher. There is a shortage in turkeys and prices are slightly up. White game is coming in fair supply, but the movement is positive if made in this market.
