Extension of Rolls Will Be Delayed Because of Difficulty

Increase for coming year...
Tax money to be used for city only, 9.625 mills, on \$50,828,606 valuation, 1906 123,477.00

Portland will pay \$122,477 more taxes during the coming year, upon the 1904 assessment, than during 1904 on the 1903 assessment.

The valuation of the entire county in the 1903 assessment was \$61,035,300, and in the 1904 assessment, \$56,429,007, an increase of \$5,390,727, while the decrease

in the miliage imposed is 1.375.

Of the money collected in this county \$382,567.50 was paid this year as the state tax. Multnomah county's share being a trifle more than 31 per cent of the entire taxes collected for the state

To prevent delay in getting the tax rolls in shape for extension, County Clerk Fields has written to Secretary of State Dunbar and will take other steps to expedite matters, if possible. It will be absolutely necessary to receive from the secretary of state the levy of state taxes, before the county officers may proceed to determine exactly what sum

Multnomah county, with a proportional increase in valuation, will pay proportionally more taxes in 1905, based on the 1904 assessment, than in 1904 on the 1903 assessment.

The total of the tax money to be raised in the entire county cannot now be even approximated. The state must yet receive reports from the counties, before it can decide what shall be the state tax, and the school districts's taxes must yet be figured. However, the increase yet be figured. However, the increase in valuation being greater in proportion than the decrease in the miliage tax im-posed will operate to compel the property owners to pay more money into the treasury than they have paid this

year.

The tax figures for the coming year are mostly estimates, although the city tax has been determined, the ordinance adopted for that purpose naming 9.625 or 9% mills as the levy. This will raise during the coming year, on a valuation of \$50.898,606, the sum of \$489,899.08, against \$437,910.99 this year, on a valuation of \$46,084,534, or an increase in the city taxes of \$51,986.09.

The valuation for the 1904 assessement would have been higher, in all probability, had it not been that the city councilmen would not give assurance that if the valuation was raised, they would not impose the same num-ber of mills as have been imposed hitherto, thus increasing immensely the amount of tax paid by the people.
