

New Docket Shows a Condition of Affairs That Must Appal the Judges.

ing the past three days. It is safe to say that when the judges take the volume, peruse its contents, and see facing them the task of disposing of 158 allegations of crime, and nothing done in most of them beyond the mere recording of the case, they will wish that people would be good.

Anyone going through the pages of the docket must conclude that criminal practice in Multnomah county courts has been carried on in a very lax manner.
