Provincial Department of Agriculture Issues Report on Different Cereals.

AREA PRACTICALLY SAME AS THAT OF YEAR AGO

Butter and Cheese a Big Factor and Corn to Be Important Crop in the Future.

(Journal Special Service.)

Winnipag, Man., Jan. 2.—The final crop report of the Manitoba provincial department of agriculture has just been issued and shows that this year there has been produced in Manitoba a total agrain crop of \$5,305,735 bushels, as compared with \$2,576,515 bushels, as compared with \$2,576,515 bushels in 1905.

Despite the talk of rust, a blight never before experienced to any extent, and in the face of bad weather just at harvest time, the results as demonstrated by the department's report are marvelous, and once again prove this province's claim to be the finest wheat-producing country on the globe.

The total yield of wheat is placed at \$3,162,465 bushels to an acreage of 2,412,235 bushels to an acreage of 2,412,235 bushels in 1903 on an area of 2,412,235 bushels. This year's production thus shows a decrease under that of a year ago of \$54,425 bushels; but, on the other hand, the prices obtained by the formers have represented from 20 to 30 cents.

year ago of 954,425 bushels; but, on the other hamd, the prices obtained by the farmers have ranged from 20 to 30 cents a bushel higher than a year ago, and accordingly as a money-producer this year's crop will easily eclipse that of any previous year in the history of the province. The area under crop is practically the same as a year ago, while the average, yield is also the same.

Oats and barley show big increases over the preceding year. The total production of the former cereal was 36, 289,979 bushels, compared with 32,053,

774 bushels in 1993, an increase of 3.254, 205 bushels on an acreage of 943,574 acres, being 88,993 acres in excess of last year, when the area totaled 855,093 acres. The barley yield aggregated 11, 177,970 bushels, with an acreage of 361, 004, an average yield of 20,54 bushels an acre. In 1993 the total was 8,707,252 bushels, acreage 326,537, an average yield of but 26,5 bushels.

With the exception of flax, which shows a falling off in the yield of 190, 234 bushels and a decreased acreage of 5,772 acres, all the other grains made good increases.

For the first time the department has figured on the production of corn, which according to the figures may be expected to become an important crop in the future. This year there was under crop a total of 2.471 acres, which produced \$2,123 bushels, or an average yield of 13 bushels an average yield of 13 bushels an acre.

The value of the butter and cheese products negregated the large sum of \$768,457, of which butter totals \$860,620,42 and cheese \$107,836,93. A total of 3,948,594 pounds of the former product was produced, and 1,172,140 pounds of the latter.
